Hesperian Invites Applications for SS Direct Deposit

Hesperian Savings has begun accepting applications for the direct deposit of Social Security checks, according to Robert Welch, president of the association.

"This is a new program, in which we are participating with the U.S. Government whereby the Treasury Department will deposit Social Security checks, directly with us, for anyone requesting it,' said Welch. "The purpose is to stop thefts or accidental loss of these checks, and to speed up the receipt of the funds by the recipient."

Welch said there are several additional advantages with the plan. "The recipient of Social Security can actually earn more interest because the checks reach us earlier for deposit and we pay interest from the date we receive the check until any of the funds are withdrawn. And, of course we continue to pay interest on money left on deposit," Welch said.

The Direct Deposit Plan offered by Hesperian Savings, will allow the recipient to have his check deposited to either a passbook or any of the various certificates of the association, all earning the current interest rate which Welch states is the highest in the State. "And, of course, each depositor's accounts are insured to \$40,000 by the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation, an agency of the Federal Government. Hesperian Savings also offers free Notary Service and will waive the service charge on the purchase of Travellers Checks for these customers,"

Welch said. The Direct Deposit Plan is easy to initiate. "The recipient of the check should bring his next check to Hesperian Savings office so we can get the necessary information from it," he said. "Then, the customer simply fills out a brief form required by the government, and that's it."

Welch said the new program will go into effect immediately.



Early Application Not Required by Social Security

"It has come to the attention of the Sherman Social Security Office that those approaching retirement age in Cooke County have two misconceptions about applying for social security," according to Gus Jones, District Manager. "They mistakenly believe that they should apply air months in advance of ply six months in advance of retirement, and they do not think it is necessary to bring any evidence when filing a

Jones pointed out that three months in advance of attainment of retirement age is the earliest that a social security claim can acutally be filed. Also, when applying it is essential to bring a copy of the previous year's tax return (including Schedule SE if self-employed and copies of all forms W-2 if an employee), evidence of date of birth, social security numbers of all applicants, proof of military service since 1937, and any de-pendents in the family who will be applying should ac-company the applicant if pos-sible. "We welcome questions about retirement in advance, and we can advise you what proofs will be needed when you do file," Jones added.

In 1854 Reverend Leopold Moczyzembu brought over to Texas more than one hundred families. They settled in and near Panna Marie, named in honor of the Blessed Mother. The loyal parishioners brought with them the cross and bells from their original village in the old country. Panna Marie is the oldest Polish parish in the United States.

After nine weeks on the ocean the weary though undaunted band of liberty-seeking Polish immigrants landed at Indianola in December of for an election. 1854. They succeeded in securing Mexican carts into which they piled their possessions. Lord that only one of them At once they set out for San Antonio in search of Father Leopold. Immediately after that happy meeting, Father Leopold took his people to at this destination they camped as best they could until they were able to provide for themselves with temporary shelter. They constructed houses out of pickets; the roofs were covered with straw. These poor immigrants lacked food and sufficient clothing and were fearful of Indian raids in the wilderness.

The colonists arrived in their new home on Christmas Eve. They held their traditional service under a giant live oak which still stands as a living monument to the first public act of worship of these brave people.

The first winter would indeed have been a terrible experience had not Mr. Twohig sent loads of corn and W. G. Butler had a herd of beef cattle driven over for winter meat. This was true Texas hospitality.

During Father Leopold's time three groups of immigrants arrived. They found the church the center of parish life, the school where the children learned the truths of their holy faith.

Panna Maria was the first strong Polish settlement in the United States. Other settlements soon developed in south and central Texas, each having a rich heritage of suffering, privation and genuine contribution to the growth of Texas. Holy Cross Parish in Yorktown, Texas, was established in the early 1850's; St. Stanislaus Parish in 1855 in Bandera Texas; St. Hedwig in Martinez, Texas in 1855; St. Michaels in San Antonio, Texas, in 1855; St. Anna in Kosiusko, Texas, in 1892; Holy Trinity in Falls City, Texas,

SCS Brochure on Needs and Habits Of Birds Available

People who enjoy having birds around their homes will find a new Soil Conservation brochure, "Invite Birds to Your Home," a big help in planning and landscaping for birds.

The brochure, written by Olan W. Dillon. Jr., SCS biologist, tells the birdlover how to satisfy habitat needs of nesting and wintering birds with trees, shrubs, and food. It tells how a conservation landscape plan used in the selection of trees and shrubs will beautify your yard and attract the kinds of birds you like.

"A conservation landscape plan will guide you in placing bird-attracting features near a window, patio, or terrace so you can observe the many varieties of birds that accept your invitation," Arlin Naegeli, SCS soil conservationist at Muenster states.

Even birdlovers in dense residential areas can attract birds by providing water for drinking and bathing and living fences and other shrubs for cover. "A single plant, the elderberry, is used by 51 species of birds and will dress your yard nine months out of the year with its white flower clusters and red-black berries," Naegeli said.

"Invite Birds to Your Home" will tell you the kind of food preferred by different kinds of birds, and how you can provide for them during foodshort winter months.

DPS Predicts 42 Will be Killed in Labor Day Traffic

State Public Safety Direcor Wilson E. Speir today estimated that Labor Day Weekend traffic in Texas will

claim 42 lives. The holiday period extends from 6 p.m. Friday, August 29 through midnight Monday, September 1. During a comparable period last year, Texas traffic killed 51 persons.

"Traffic will be particularly heavy near recreational areas such as beaches, lakes and campgrounds. Actually, in these situations, motorists need to be extra watchful for children playing and other pedestrians. Also, persons towing recreational vehicles and boats should be mindful of extra stopping distances and other problems unique to trailers," Speir said.

The DPS director called on motorists to cooperate in law enforcement efforts to hold speeds down during the holiday, noting that "excessive speed is still our top accident problem."

He also urged motorists to work with officers to eliminate the serious threat posed by drunk drivers.

In an effort to reduce the toll, Speir said extra DPS troopers will be on duty statewide. He said troopers and local officers will be especially watchful for speeding, reckless and drunk drivers.





How to save electricity with refrigerator-freezers

- 1. Defrost regularly. More than 1/4" of frost will act as insulation and causes your refrigerator/freezer to work harder to maintain a proper temperature. Replace worn door gaskets to prevent cold air loss.
- 2. Keep refrigerator temperature setting between 35° and 40° freezer setting at 0°. (Use thermometer to check.)
- 3. Adjust temperature up 2° or 3° if you'll be away several days.
- 4. Don't leave door open unnecessarily. Close quickly. 5. Avoid overcrowding. It restricts cold air flow around food and
- overworks unit. 6. Cover all liquids placed in frost-free units. (Moisture causes frost and needless defrosting.)
- 7. Keep condenser coils on back and bottom of your refrigerator/ freezer free of dust for more efficient operation.
- 8. Cook double recipes and freeze half for future use.

Tax Cuts For The Self-Employed

Tax cuts to combat recession have been making front-page news. Yet this year many of the seven million self-employed Americans who could take some new tax deductions, and substantially cut their federal tax bill, know nothing about this opportunity.

The chance to save money comes with an Act passed by Congress last year, the Employee Retirement Income Security Act, a forbidding title that signals a major change in our pension laws. Under it, if you are self-employed, you can put a maximum of \$7,500 or fifteen percent of yearly earnings-whichever is the lesserinto a fund for your own retirement. Whatever you contribute is an unqualified tax deduction. More than that, any earnings on your contributions also accrue tax free.

Eventually, of course, you will withdraw your money and you will have to pay taxes then. But normally that will be only when you reach retirement. And at that stage your income-and your tax bracket - will almost certainly be lower, probably significantly lower, than they are while you are working.

The principle of building for retirement through a fund that is tax-sheltered is not new. It was embodied in the well-known Keogh plan named for the Congressman who introduced the legislation establishing it backin the fifties.

The new development is that the tax-deductible contributions

threefold, in fact - from the previous maximum of \$2,500. Those able to put away the new maximum of \$7,500 will see a healthy cut in their annual tax bill. However, you may prefer to set aside less than the maximum. In that case, any smaller amount is allowable - and you can vary that amount from year to year. So you need not worry that a bad year for your business will saddle you with a heavy burden.



On the other hand, you can make additional contributions, over and above the maximum. of up to 10 percent of your yearly income — up to a limit of \$2,500. This additional voluntary contribution is not tax deductible, but any earnings on it are tax sheltered until you withdraw it. So once again you can defer paying income tax until the time when you are likely to be paying at a lower

You also have a flexibility in

lecting from your retirement fund. This can begin any time after you reach 591/2 years even if you are still working but before you are 701/2. And it can be as a lump sum or a steady income.

Another point to note is that if you adopt a Keogh plan and have employees, the law requires that you make certain contributions on their behalf. The new law allows a number of ways for you to build up a retirement fund - among them, through a savings bank, or variable annuities or a trust. A popular way is through mutual funds. They account for about one out of three of all existing Keogh plans with a total of around one billion dollars.

If this way of planning for retirement appeals to you, there are plenty of people who can give you advice - for example, a stockbroker, or a tax accountant or a mutual fund. But not, please, any old well-intentioned stranger. With the right advice - and a proper balancing of risks against the possibility of capital growth - the new pension law could be your launching pad into the sort of comfortable retirement everyone wants but which so many ne-
