Herb Philbrick of US Press Association to observe that some of the Washington workers may have budget problems but they are not likely to gain sympathy from us other workers who have to pay the federal salaries. Not when congressional secretaries are getting \$25,000 to \$30,000 a year. Nor when youngsters just out of school get \$14,000, \$15,000 and \$18,000 for civil service ratings of GS10, GS11, and GS12. Nor when some of those higher civil service ratings GS16-18, get \$37,800, plus a \$2.835 contribution to retirement, plus \$234 a year for life insurance and \$491 a year for health insurance.

And there are some other benefits such as 20 days (four full work weeks) of vacation a year, plus thirteen days for sick leave, and nine free days on the federal holidays. Besides there are other benefits. For instance, the federal worker who has budget trouble has a credit union arrangement for loans at really low interest rates.

What with the high cost of living nowadays, and more so the cost of high living in Washington, we can understand that some federal workers have a hard time making ends meet. But that doesn't mean they are entitled to more. Definitely not when compared with us other workers who get a lot less money for more hours of work.

One of the things wrong with this country is that taxeaters have a lot better deal than the taxpayers. The senators investigating federal pay scale ought to determine the pay of other people, including many self employed who work 60 hours a week or more for less pay . . . then bring federal pay in line with theirs.
