Perhaps you have wondered whether the frequent and insistent demands for President Nixon to surrender his tapes to his prosecutors is somewhat similar to requiring a defendant to testify against himself. Just take note of what is implied in the demand. These people, apparently unable to make a case on their own investigations, are insisting that the accused provide the confidential tapes from which they hope to obtain an occasional bit of incriminating evidence.

No doubt people sympathetic to the persecution would compare this to the case in which an accused embezzler has his books seized for examination. Nevertheless the column still asks whether the demands for the tapes isn't actually an attempt to make the man supply evidence against himself. We wonder whether some of the committee haven't felt a bit guilty about making demands on the president which are not made on average criminals.

It seems that while some people are making a howl about political dirty tricks some others have equal right to howl about legal dirty tricks.

This week's public reaction following the IRS order to President Nixon to pay almost a half million dollars in back taxes and interest has been surprising, and it may be a sign of what's to come if the impeachment enthusiasts have their way that verdict from the House could prove very unpopular. In fact, a few wishful thinking Republicans are already predicting that the nation will have had a belly full of Watergate by the time election rolls around and will respond by voting out some of the principals of the witch hunt.

Well, if the reaction to the income tax crack-down is a sign, we can imagine that more pressure on the president might generate more sympathy for him. And why not? Anybody knows that the irregularities and dirty tricks and attempted cover-up with which the president and his party are being accused are no worse than have been done on the other side. Watergate itself isn't near as smelly as the hypocrisy of the sanctimonious characters who are pointing the accusing finger.

In this column's opinion the solution should be patterned after the one Our Lord proposed when the mob brought Him the woman accused of adultery. "Let him who is without sin cast the first stone." The mob dispersed, and the Judicial Committee ought to do likewise.

However, let's not overlook the Lord's admonition to "sin no more." Following this it would be a good idea for the legislature to establish standards to keep politicians more ethical in the future — and thereafter to lower the boom on the violators of both parties.

Regarding the blow Nixon received in the income tax ruling, it is noteworthy that IRS did not claim it was tax evasion. Rather a mistake in claiming exemptions that are not allowed. Most likely that's true according to the regulations, but the point is that such exemptions have been taken by other presidents. LBJ and Kennedy were not hesitant about entertaining for the family, improving their property or hauling the family on the president's plane. Nor was LBJ hesitant about taking a fat deduction for his gift of personal papers.

Nation wide reaction following the IRS verdict seems to indicate a feeling that Nixon got a raw deal. Hence the multitude of reports about people who want to help him pay. The White House promptly said that all contributions would be returned to the sender. After which Paul Harvey observed that people who really want to help can leave the return address off their letters.

Congressman Omar Burleson reports that the House last week passed a bill to create a Consumer Protection Law designed to protect the public's interest with regard to price, quality, purity, performance, durability, etc., of the things we buy.

Some congressmen have the idea that we need this additional care even though a number of other departments and bureaus already are doing those things for us. In fact this new bureau is intended as an

## Garden Club Hosts Civic Pep Meeting

A pep meeting on what to do about making Muenster a better place to live and make a living was hosted by the Muenster Garden Club at its regular meeting Monday night in the Sacred Heart library. Some thirty visitors were there as representatives of the principal civic and fraternal organizations of the community.

Mrs. Arthur Endres, chairman, got the subject under way by calling on Leonard Endres, Bertha Hamric and David Bright to present a general idea of the community's assets and needs and ways to get things done.

Endres said that the greatest assets here are the talents and energies of its people. He observed that the community rates a high grade in that respect because a larger than average percentage of its residents have had the ambition to get a college degree.

He referred to the need for payrolls but was undecided whether an industry is more desirable here or within commuting distance from here. Some industries can be a burden to a town whereas a residential town for workers employed elsewhere can be a basis of local growth and progress.

Mrs. Hamric pointed to the reviving chamber of commerce as possible leadership in improving business and industrial progress and emphasized the need for an industry with higher pay scales, to supply the principal income of a family rather than just the supplemental income, like the dress factory.

Also she called for development of small local businesses to supply essential services like plumbing or woodworking. And there's room for expansion of present local business if more local people will develop skill in building trades or automotive or electronic work.

A handicap to be overcome, she added, is the shortage of housing and housing sites. Toward a solution she suggested extension of city limits and zoning laws.

Mayor Bright warned about too much pride and satisfaction in the home town. He said that the "4 country" TV presentation showing the seamy side was disappointing to many, but true — something to be remedied if we want a better image.

## Local Trackmen Run in Class B Qualifiers Meet

Sacred Heart's track team and Muenster High trackmen who have qualified for the regional meet at Stephenville next week participated Saturday in a Class B qualifiers meet held on the Saint Jo track. It was a practice meet for both, the Hornets being in class A and the Tigers being a private school ineligible for UIL competition.

The Tigers with their full team scored 62 points for second place behind Lorraine's 88.

David Krahl was first in the 100 yard dash with 9.8 and second in the 220 with 22.6.

John Bartush was first in the mile, Bruce Fuhrmann second in the 880, Dan Voth fifth in the 440 and Mark Hess third in the 330 hurdles.

In addition the Tigers were second in the mile relay run by Mark Hess, Danny Voth, John Bartush and Davy Krahl.

Next action for the Tigers will be in a meet Friday at Marietta, Okla.

Muenster High entries were the five Hornets who qualified for the Class A regional meet at Stephenville next week Friday and Saturday. They are Louis Koelzer, Dan Sicking, Mark L. Sicking, Lyle Klement and Dean Sicking.

At Saint Jo, Louis Koelzer was first in the 330 hurdles and second in the 120 hurdles; Dan Sicking was first and Mark L. Sicking second in the 880 yard run; and Lyle Klement was third in the mile run.

## Voting Is Light in Three Non-Contested Elections

As expected, Muenster people stayed away in droves from last Saturday's combined election for city council, school board and hospital board.

Without a contest on any of the three ballots, more than 90 per cent of the qualified voters did not bother to go through the formality of making their mark. Only 62 votes were cast in the city election. A few additional votes from outside the city upped the

school and hospital election totals to 76 each.

Actually there were five elections on three ballots. Added to the local school board ticket were the listing of candidates for the county school board and the county college board. Two contests for the college board were the only choices offered to the local voters.

In those Don Howeth defeated James Spires 56-15 for Position 6 and Boyd Ware defeated Billy Parr 39-27 for Place 7. Howeth and Ware also led in the county wide voting.

On the county school board ticket Herman Hartman, unopposed, received 71 votes for member at large, and also had no problems with voting elsewhere in the county.

In the local school board election Adam Wolf received 74 to succeed Ray Wilde and Robert Bayer received 70 for re-election. Others serving on the board are Urban Endres, Dan Hamric, Mrs. James Waltercheid, Ray Swirczynski and Ed Cler.

Voting was also routine for the Muenster Hospital Board. Norbert Walterscheid received 72 as successor to Sylvan Walterscheid, and unopposed incumbents received votes as follows: Albert Dangelmayr 68, Norbert Felderhoff 62, Rufus Henscheid 66, Ray Voth 72. Others on that board are Al Trubenbach, Jimmy Jack Biffle, Paul Fetch and Al Felderhoff.

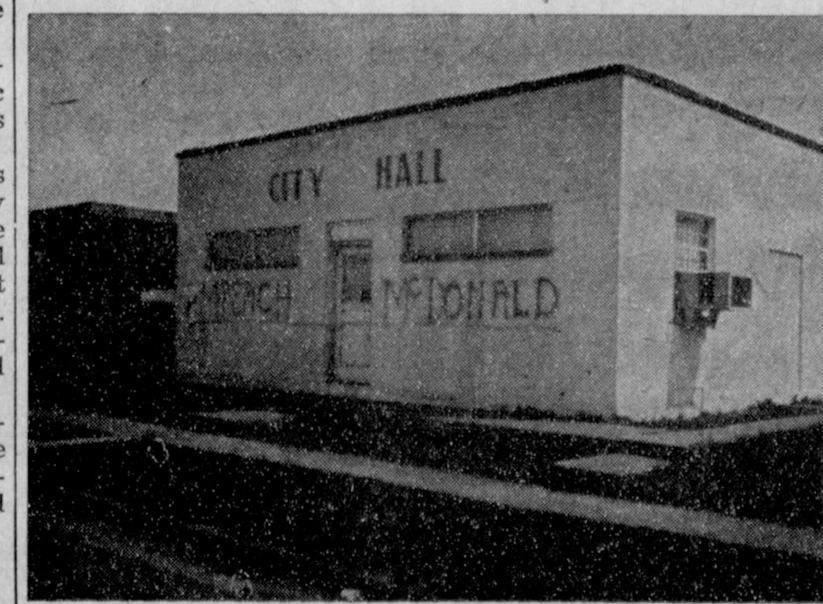
In the city election Richard Grewing and A. T. Tuggle, incumbents, received 51 and 52 votes respectively and Leo Hess received 55 as successor to Rody Klement. Others now on the council are Mayor David Bright, Herbert Miller and Mrs. Arthur Endres.

## April 30 Deadline Set for Filing as Farm, Ranch Land

The filing deadline for owners of Cooke County land which produces a crop (meaning farm and/or ranchland has been extended until April 30, 1974, according to Mrs. Jo Hillis, Cooke County Tax Assessor-Collector. Several hundred forms have been obtained, properly completed and returned to the tax office; however, Mrs. Hillis believes there are several hundred other farmers and ranchers who probably would qualify for agricultural assessments under the terms of Article VIII, Section 1 (d) of the State Constitution who have failed to obtain the form and return it to the tax office.

To be considered for agricultural assessment, the natural owner must make application every year with each taxing jurisdiction in which the property is located and this application must be approved by the respective jurisdiction; otherwise, the property must be assessed at the fair cash market value the same as other properties which are not engaged in agricultural production. All owners of farm or ranch land who have not obtained an application form are urged to come by the County Tax Office and obtain a form as soon as possible in order that they may return the application on or before April 30, 1974.

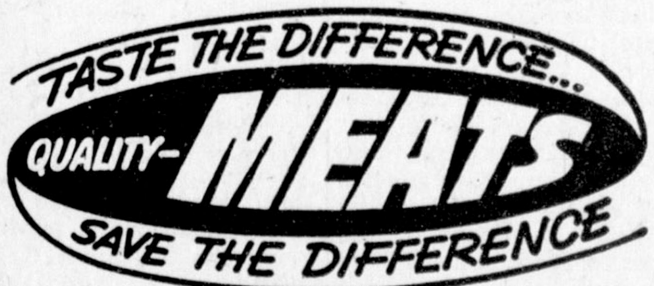

A meeting will be held in Room 412, Science Building, Cooke County College, Monday, April 15, 7:30 pm. to present the pecan story.

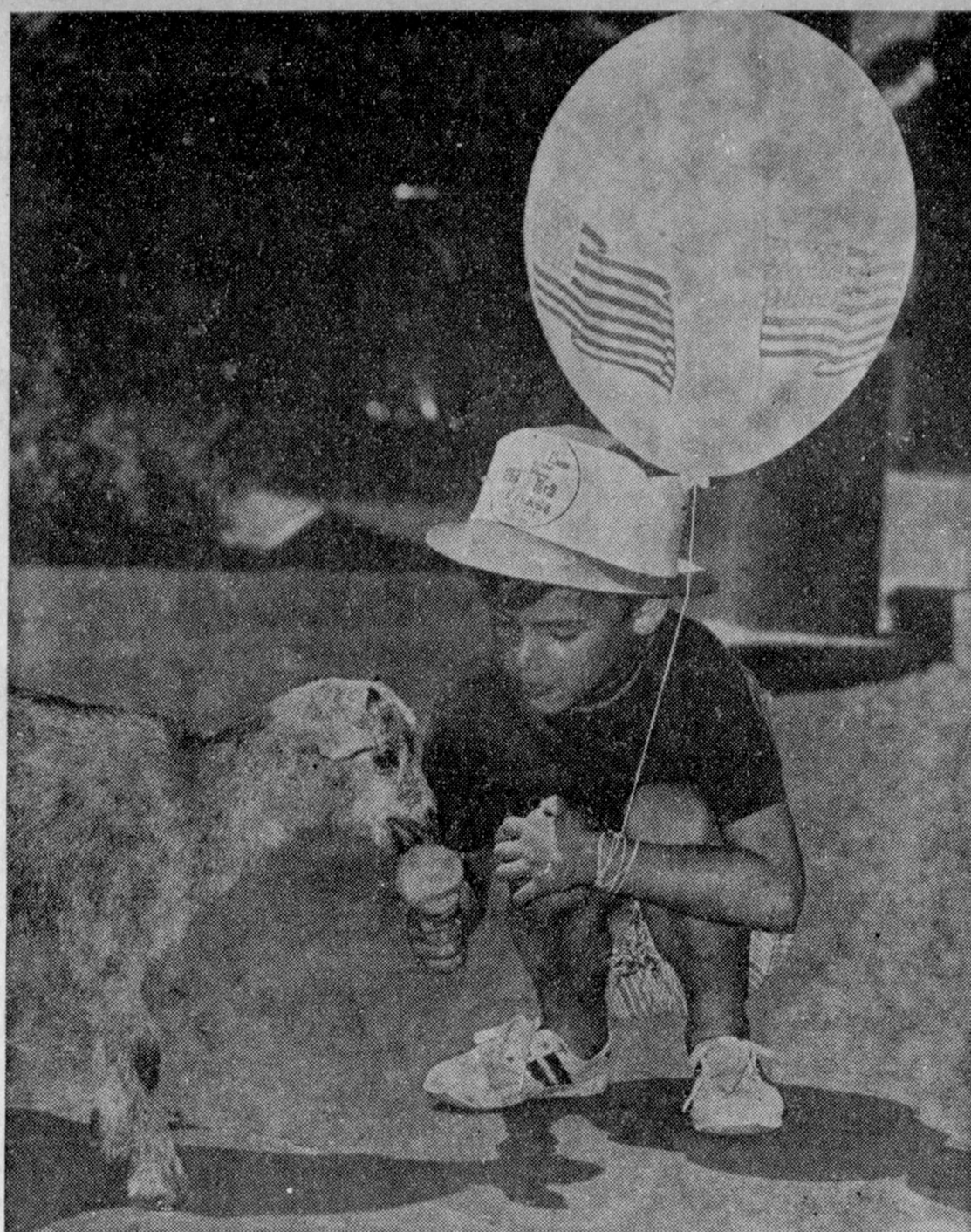

There will be time for questions regarding your problems. You are invited to attend. Bring your friends and neighbors.

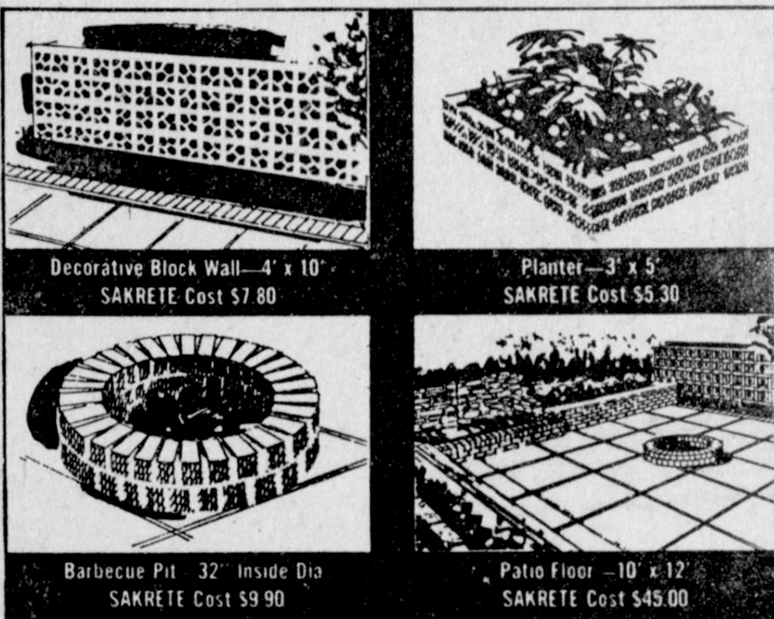

He has established himself as a leader of the fiscal conservatives having authored a Constitutional amendment allowing the people to vote on whether they wish to limit highway department spending on new highways and having co-authored an amendment limiting the incurrence of state debt by Universities and Colleges. In so doing he has made himself the target of several "big money" interests which have benefited from massive government spending programs in these areas.

Sullivant said, "Although I am unopposed in this year's election, I hope to visit with as many of my constituents as possible during the 30 day recess of the Constitutional Convention. I consider it absolutely necessary that I know your feelings about the issues facing our State in order to accurately represent them in Austin."

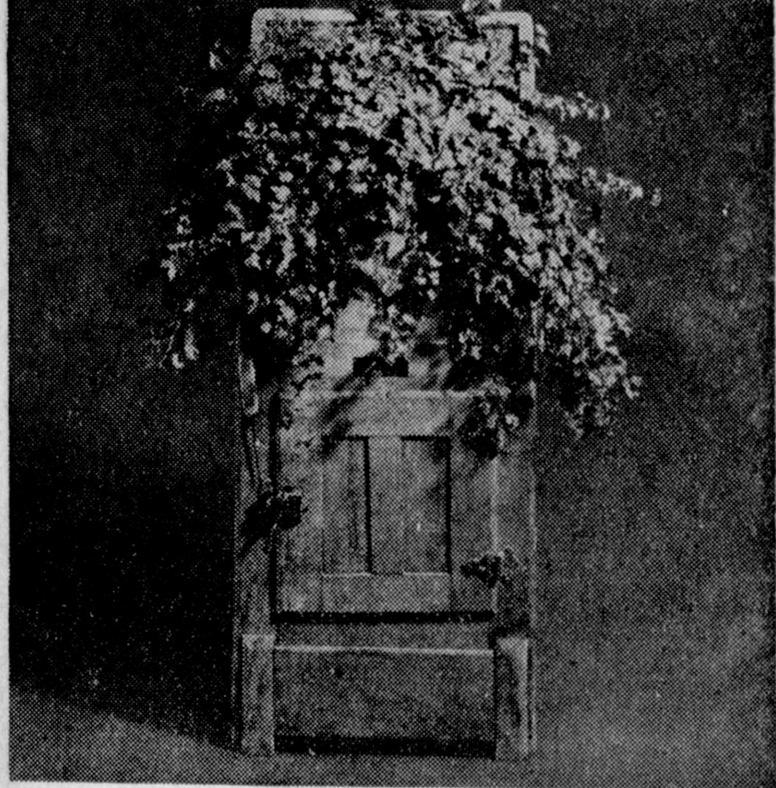

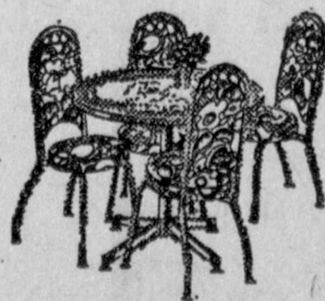
