



All over the country last week commentators were saying that Ronald Reagan committed political suicide in his announcement that he had selected the ultra-liberal Senator Schweiker as his running mate if he receives the party's nomination at the GOP convention. President Ford obviously considered the statement a big break in his favor, which seems to be backed up by reports that Ford has been gaining in delegate strength.

To conservatives this is a disappointment. If their champion has indeed committed a huge blunder they are left high and dry with considerably less choice than they hoped for in the general election. Also, if it is a fact, as some people say, that conservatism is gaining strength, the GOP ticket seems to be hurt more than helped by adding the Schweiker liberalism. Lots of people would have been happier with a name which weakened the conservative character of the ticket.

While wondering about the possible disaster resulting from Reagan's decision, we have to assume that he doubtless thought it out very carefully, realizing that many supporters would feel let down but also that a certain element of the electorate would be pleased by the blend of political principle. If GOP delegates should adopt that line of thought they might come around to the idea that the Reagan-Schweiker combination is the best bet for November. After all, that is the number one objective. The party platform, no matter how meritorious, doesn't have a chance until the party is in control.

By contrast with Reagan, President Ford seems to gain political favor from implications that he leans toward a strong conservative, like John Connally, as his running mate. But then a person has to wonder whether, after all, Reagan had some method in his apparent madness. Considering that Reagan and Ford are both to the political right of Carter and Mondale, strategy would seem to suggest an appeal to the middle rather than the far right as a way of strengthening the GOP ticket. Perhaps Reagan's strategy was not so far out after all.

Throughout the campaign for nomination, Jimmy Carter amazed the country with the success of his smile while evading the issues. It was hard to say where he stood on what. But the situation changed considerably with approval of the Democratic platform, reported to be written almost wholly under the close supervision of Carter aides. The planks of that platform point to another round of the New Deal and the Great Society.

In addition, there were references to Watergate at the New York convention, a possible sign that it will be an issue. On this one the Democrats had better think again lest voters be invited to compare the sins of both parties. Sex scandals and living it up at taxpayer expense are as objectionable as the attempt to cover up for bungling burglars.

Back to the Demo platform, Carter has been trying hard to present the conservative image, which is hard to reconcile with principles adopted at the convention, like some of the following planks: Passage of a comprehensive national health insurance program and a guaranteed minimum income program. Adoption of the Equal Rights Amendment. Opposition to an amendment outlawing abortion. Revision of the Hatch Act to allow federal workers to participate in partisan politics. Reduction of the US unemployment rate to 3 percent within four years.

Prime Minister Trudeau of Canada really put his foot in his mouth in the effort to excuse himself for banning Republic of China athletes from the Olympics. "How would you Americans like it if some small group were to go to the island of Puerto Rico and then claim that they were the United States of America? You wouldn't like it one bit."

Well, it so happens that the small group calling itself the Republic of China, is a remnant of the former great nation by that name, the people

FB Board Rejects Tax Suit Proposal

A proposal to bring a tax suit against the Cooke County Commissioners Court was voted down 13-10 Tuesday night in a special meeting of Cooke County Farm Bureau directors.

The issue had been presented by Attorney Richard Stark who assisted the Farm Bureau's tax committee, and specified that farm dwellings are tax exempt on land which are taxed according to production. They are not tax exempt on land that is taxed on speculative rather than productive value.

Stark said the exemption is allowed in a 1967 amendment to the state constitution but came to light only recently in a Texas Supreme Court case. On that basis he maintained that present tax assessments, which do not allow the exemption, should be revised.

Another matter proposed for suit was taxation based on location. Beside a good road or near to town, for instance, land is assessed higher than similar land on dirt road or more distant. That issue was soon dropped, however, when it was pointed out it applies only to land that is not taxed according to production.

Concerning tax exempt dwellings, Stark said the object of a suit is to get the landowner's due by making the county observe the constitution. However consideration of the Farm Bureau's

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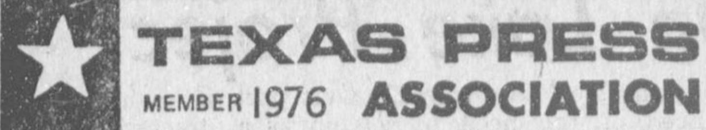

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Swirczynskis Vacation in Norway, Poland, Germany

Mr. and Mrs. Bob Swirczynski and granddaughter Dea Swirczynski have returned from a month long vacation traveling in Norway, Poland and Germany. The trio left June 21 from D-FW. With them at the airport awaiting their flight were their daughters Sonja Swirczynski and Mrs. Jill Kralicke. From New York they flew to Stavanger, Norway to visit their son Roy, Dea's father. But before they were able to get under way, they were delayed six hours by a Canadian ground control strike. After two hours in a Scandinavian Airlines System waiting room, they boarded a SAS 707 and were grounded four more hours. Grounded air traffic was lined up for miles and no

food was served until they were airborne. The Swirczynskis said there was no complaining from passengers who spent time getting acquainted in a party atmosphere. When they reached Norway they were met by friends because Roy was at work. They went to the same apartment used when they visited in Norway last year. During the eight days spent in Norway, in cool 60 degree weather, they drove in the mountains, countryside, past farms, sailed on the North Sea and visited friends they met last year. They saw the Phillips Oil Field Yard, which covers acres on the North Sea, and is owned by Phillips and the Norwegian government. They also saw the Heliport owned by the oil company, to transport employees to drilling platforms 50-250 miles farther out in the North Sea. Stavanger is the Oil Capital of Northern Europe.

Many summer hotels and apartments are being built there, also an automatic car wash, laundromat and an All-American grocery store.

The Swirczynskis attended the American Bicentennial Mass, sung in English, and afterwards were invited to a coffee, and then saw the American school in Stavanger. They also visited a milk farm where 100,000 milk were being raised for their fur. The milk were beautiful in colors from deepest black, brown and snow white. Scandinavians are the biggest milk producers in the world.

Roy Swirczynski accompanied his parents to Warsaw, Poland and they stopped in Copenhagen, Denmark, enroute to take Dea to see the Tivoli and the Fairy Tale Garden, the world's greatest amusement park.

The Swirczynskis said Warsaw is a beautiful unusually friendly city and a thousand year old history with monuments of the past but modern at the same time, and is convenient to explore on foot. They saw the Old Town Square, built in the 14th century and now a complex of fine, reconstructed medieval buildings.

At the History Museum, they saw a film about the fate of Warsaw during the Nazi occupation, the destruction of a city of a million people, and the reconstruction of a new city of over 1,500,000 (considered one of the Seven Wonders of the 20th Century).

They saw St. John's Cathedral, visited the Grand Opera Theater and the 600 acre Park of Culture, the Belvedere Palace where President Ford stayed on his trip to Warsaw, and where tourists must wear scuffs over their shoes if they wish to tour the Palace.

Other highlights of the Warsaw visit were the Chopin statue and birthplace where Sunday concerts of Chopin's music are held at the foot of the statue. Also the American Embassy and Warsaw University with its 15,000 students and located in several palaces.

Warsaw also has a modern impressive Eastern side with department stores, hotels and theaters. The movie, "Jaws" was showing when the Swirczynskis were there and tickets were 25 cents apiece. A three-course meal cost \$3.00.

A lot of poultry and fruit, cherries and strawberries are used in Warsaw. Most of the beef goes to Russia. Everybody in Poland works. Poles are soft-spoken and very patient, but drive fast and hazardingly.

The hotel where the Swirczynskis stayed was on the Vistula River where service was of the very best but very reasonable. Gift shops preferred the American dollar to the Zloty.

Bob Swirczynski was especially interested in traveling in Poland because his grandparents the Robert Swirczynskis left from Gdansk, Poland, the port on the Baltic, 30 miles from Warsaw, when they came by boat to America in the latter part of the 1800s.

The Bob Swirczynskis enjoyed driving in the countryside, seeing fields, meadows and forests of pines, fir and spruce and flowers, flowers everywhere.

When Roy returned to Stavanger, his parents and Dea remained two days longer and then flew to Frankfurt, Germany. There every means of travel is available, subway trains, streetcars, buses, escalators down to the underground A, B and C levels.

In Frankfurt where apple cider taverns are popular, there are also real Bavarian beer halls. There is also a lot of early Gothic architecture and the International Banking Center, St. Paul's Church where JFK gave his memorable address to the German people.

The Swirczynskis also took the famous "Tour of the Rhine" and then drove to Wiesbaden Eltville, Geisenheim and Rudesheim, the Pearl of the Rhine. The trip down the Rhine was magnificent, with picturesque views of castles and small villages. They saw the Wiederwald Monument, the Germania statue 32 feet high and looked down on the Rhine from the city of Bingen, where vineyards grow everywhere.

Grapes are harvested in September and October. They visited famous wine cellars, strolled through the villages and saw the famous "Lorelei". The last Sunday in Germany they attended Mass in the Cathedral of St. Bartolomew, climbed 383 very narrow steps to the tower for a magnificent view of the city. They visited the Henninger tower, with silo storage capacity for 16,000 tons of barley, enough for 200 million glasses of beer. The Swirczynskis concluded their German tour after seeing the two revolving restaurants atop the Henninger Tower.

When they returned to D-FW after a month's travel, their daughter Sonja again met them and the next day Mr. and Mrs. Bob Swirczynski and Dea returned to Münster.

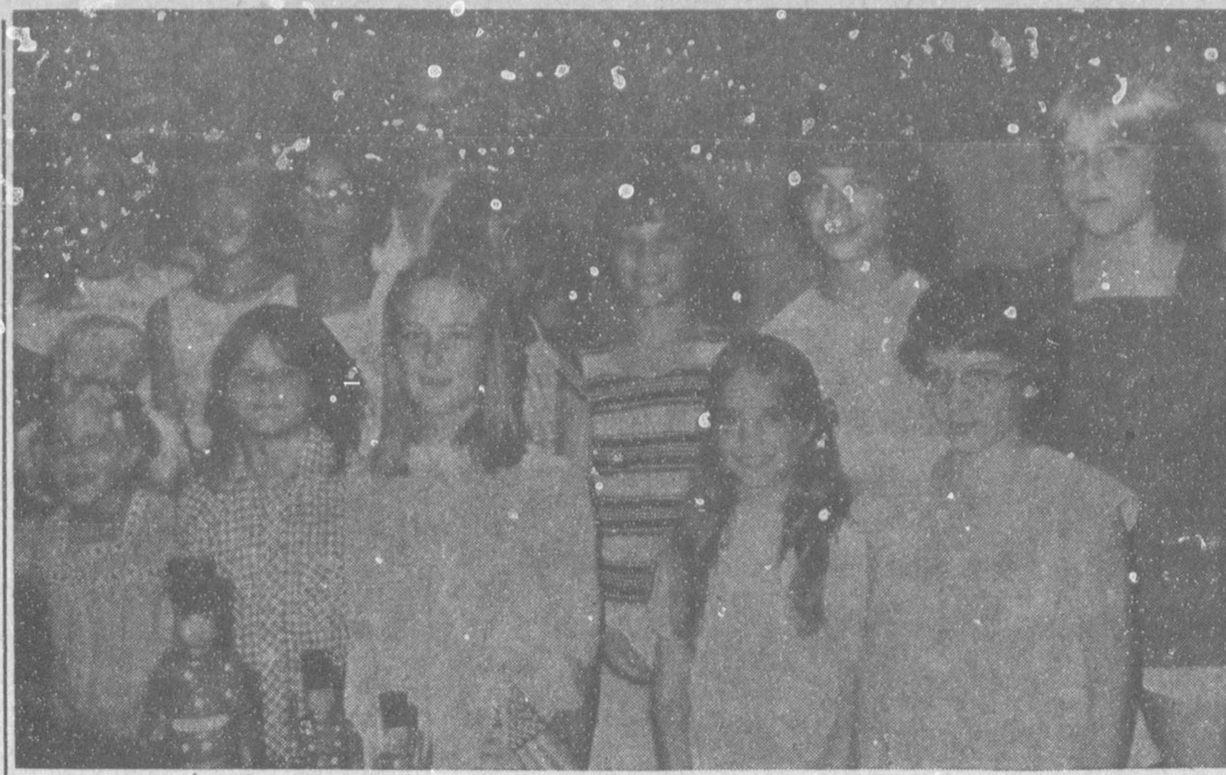

More and more gardeners in Cooke County are "doing their thing" in their backyard or just wherever they can find space, according to County Extension Agents Neil Tibbets and Evelyn Yeatts.
