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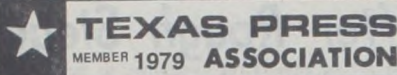

## Capital Highlights

AUSTIN — Texas' economy is in good shape, but is not recession proof, the comptroller's revenue forecaster told the House Ways and Means Committee last week.

Bill Allaway said the state's economic growth rate will likely decline from four per cent to three per cent in 1980, in line with a national drop.

Comptroller Bob Bullock's estimate that revenue for the next fiscal period (1980-81) will exceed \$21.2 billion — or \$2.8 billion more than the current budget — is based on these factors, Allaway indicated:

—A declining inflation rate, which would slow the growth of sales tax revenue.

—A possible recession this year or next.

—A good chance that the federal revenue sharing program will be reduced or cancelled. The program will expire in September 1980 unless extended. About \$111.2 million a year is now received from revenue sharing.

"We are not recession proof, as popularly believed," Allaway told the committee, "and probably less so as Texas becomes a more mature economy and a more-diversified economy."

Bullock's estimate is based further on assumptions that there will be a gradual recovery from the feared recession, and that federal policies will bring inflation under control by the middle of 1981.

Exports Soar  
Texas has become the sixth largest exporter of manufactured goods among the states, Department of Commerce

statistics show the value of Texas exports jumped to \$5.2 billion in 1976 (last year available) — a 160 per cent increase over 1972. Exported goods were then valued at \$1.9 billion.

An estimated 96,200 jobs in Texas were dependent on exports of manufactured goods, and nearly 60,000 of those were related directly to making goods for overseas shipment.

Texas is the top exporter of chemical products, but the industry provided only 6,300 jobs. Two-thirds of the machinery shipped for foreign sale from the state was construction equipment.

Early Primary Urged  
Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby said he will back legislation calling for revival of a Texas presidential preference primary on the second Tuesday in March next year.

The lieutenant governor indicated the bill would be introduced this week.

House Speaker Bill Clayton said he probably will go along. The legislation also would move party primaries for selection of Democratic and Republican nominees from May to July and runoff primaries from June to August.

Hobby said March is the earliest date the Texas presidential primary could be held under Democratic party rules.

The lieutenant governor's proposal is for a March vote that would not be binding on either party.

He acknowledged the issue will be a hot one in the current legislature.

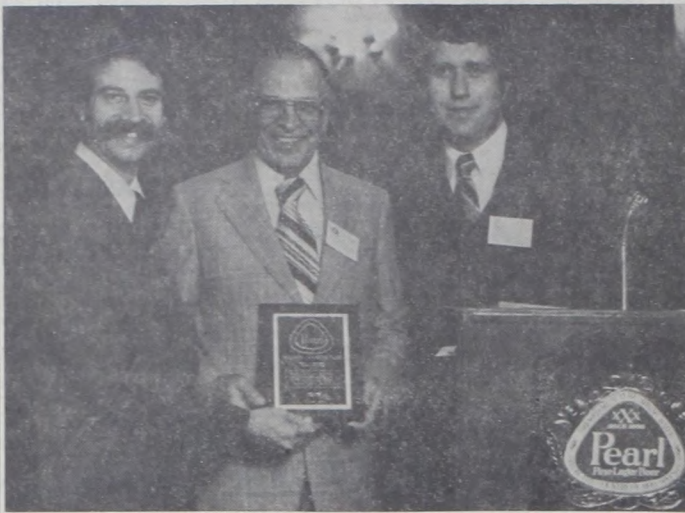

**Endres Repeats as Million Canner**

Urban Endres of Muenster has been named to the Pearl Brewing Company's "Million Canners Club" for outstanding environmental community service resulting in the recycling of more than 1 million all-aluminum beverage cans in 1978.

Endres, owner of the local distributing company for Pearl products, received the honors from Lutz Issleib, Executive Vice President and General Manager, and Tom Nichols, Director of Environmental Affairs, during a recent National Sales Meeting at the brewery headquarters in San Antonio.

Pearl Brewing Company, a major recycler of all-aluminum cans in Texas since 1973, annually passes recognition for its statewide environmental program on to selected distributors with the prestigious "Million Canners Club" award presentations.

Endres was among fifty of the more than 100 Texas distributors who recycle to receive the distinguished service plaque for 1978. He also received the award from Pearl in 1977.

"We are both pleased and proud of the continuing response our distributors are getting from the citizens of Texas," said Nichols in congratulatory remarks.

Since the local recycling center opened, 7,785,868 cans have been reclaimed through the recycling center at 315 North Mesquite. Cans are accepted Saturdays from 9 to 11:30 a.m.

"The outstanding support from the public has helped our Pearl recycling centers to affect both the Texas environment and economy in a positive way," noted Endres.

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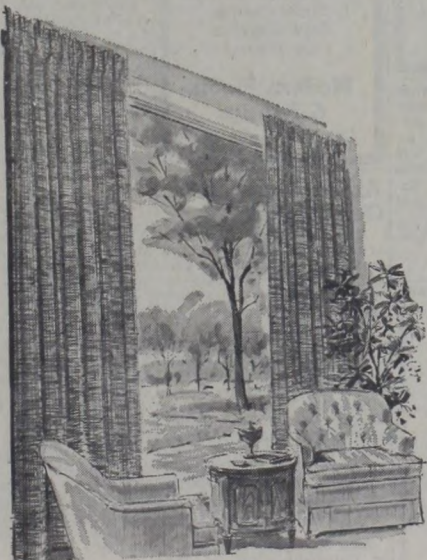

### Extension Service To Mail Series on Home Remodeling

Is home remodeling in your near or distant future? If the answer is yes, you will be interested in a Home Remodeling Mail Out Series which will start in February. The eight-topic free series is being planned by the County Extension Service Family Living Committee.

To enroll in the Home Remodeling Mail Out Series, call the County Extension Service at 665-4311 or 665-1966, or come by the office in the basement of the Courthouse.

Topics to be in the series include "Planning Remodeling Projects", "Financing and Business Considerations", "Evaluating the Structure of an Older Home", "Remodel Rationally" and "Selecting and Working with Professionals". Two rooms very often remodeled — the kitchen and the bathroom — will be included in the series, also. The last topic will be on "Energy Conservation for the Older Home."

In addition to the Mail Out Series, a Panel Discussion Program is being planned for March where prospective home remodelers can have additional questions answered.

Houses are remodeled for personal as well as economic reasons. As houses cease to meet the needs of the inhabitants, a decision has to be made. Should a new house be purchased, the present house be remodeled, or another house be purchased for remodeling?

The continually increasing cost has eliminated the purchase of a new home as a choice for many people. In addition to the cost of a new house, there are moving, decorating, landscaping and other expenses which can add several thousand dollars to the cost of a house.

Purchasing an older home to be remodeled can be found expensive if one can be found that is suitable for remodeling and can meet the needs of the owner. If the cost of buying and remodeling the house does not exceed the fair market value of other homes in the area, it may be a sound investment even though moving and decorating expenses are still involved.

Remodeling present housing is still the alternative chosen by many. Location is one of the main reasons for this choice. Satisfaction with the neighborhood, ties to friends, schools, and a cost factor may make the present house the alternative.

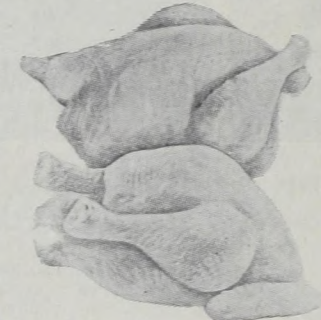

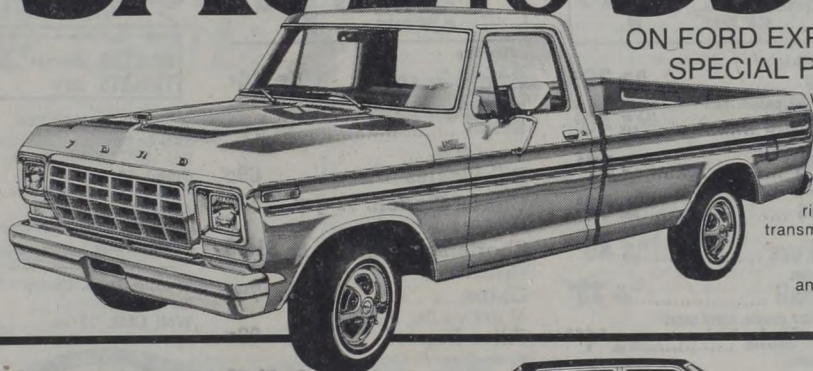

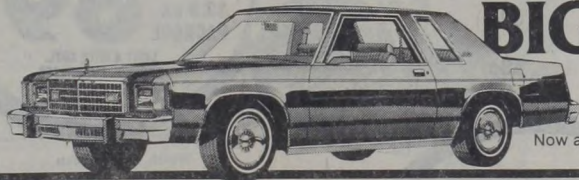

### Signs of Misused Land

Gullies or "critical areas" are probably the most obvious sign that land has been misused. A few exceptions, such as the Grand Canyon in Arizona and Palo Duro in Texas, are works of nature and are scenic attractions. There is nothing attractive, though, about our ordinary gully patches. Sheet erosion from wind or water may not be noticeable, but raw gashes ruin the looks of any land, whether it's on the "back forty" or in that new, expensive housing development.

In our area, most of the problem started years ago when much more of our land was being cultivated. Some of this land was not suitable for cultivation, and erosion soon made

it unprofitable. New ground was plowed up and the worn out fields became pasture or rangeland, left to grow whatever plants nature provided and often overgrazed. With all these handicaps nature provided enough cover to heal many small ditches, but some, especially the deep, steep kind, continue to slough off, leaving no cover of any kind.

Most of these raw ditches can be healed by shaping and sodding. This puts the land back to near its original shape and lets runoff water come down the slope slowly rather than pouring over the edge. In addition to healing the gully itself, shaping makes the land around and between easier to manage. Weed control, fertilization and livestock management are much easier when gullies are crossable.

Safety is another consideration. Riding a pickup or tractor over the edge of a gully only a few feet deep is hard on equipment and driver. Even walking is risky. Imagine taking a short cut through a gullied pasture on a dark night.

Fall is a good time to shape gullies; then sodding can be done the next spring. Gullies already shaped and plowed are ready to sod now.

Another method is to use bermudagrass to sod the area around the gullies, preferably the whole pasture. After the grass makes a good cover, usually in about two years, shaping can be done and grass set out at the same time. Careful bulldozer work can leave most of the grass roots near the top of the ground and if done in the spring, growth can start immediately.

Either way, fairly heavy amounts of fertilizer are needed and often some follow-up work is necessary to patch any small pot holes that form in the bottom. This can easily be accomplished without heavy equipment and former bad land will be both productive and attractive.
