As Ripley used to say, believe it or not - in all the years between the founding of our republic and the middle of World War II, federal government spending totaled about \$300 billion. And the current budget for just one year is over that amount. We're aware, of course, that

the government now offers many more services to many more people, and we're also much more involved with the rest of the world. But in spite of all that, does it make sense for the government to goof off in a single year as much as it previously spent in more than 170 years?

Something else to shatter your fiscal composure is the country's skyrocketing debt. It's estimated that by June 30 the amount will have reached \$480 billion, an increase of 34 per cent since January 1969.

In case you are interested, your personal share of that debt is \$2,262. We understand that we'll never have to dig up that kind of money to get Uncle Sap out of the red, but at the same time we ought to realize that we are paying about \$145 per person per year to pay the annual interest of \$29 billion. For an average home of four persons that comes to \$580 per year - a big price to pay for the extravagance of the past few decades.

In fairness we have to admit that neither the budget nor the debt is as bad as it looks. That's because we're dealing with inflation money, which is worth about a third as much as when the spending spree got started back in the early thirties. Current income is much higher nowadays enabling us to keep up with our own high cost of living and the government's cost of high living,

Proponents of the abundant cheap money refuse to admit any fault in our economic setup. Instead they insist that we never had it so good. Our standard of living is the world's best, also the best we have ever had. All of which sounds all right until we realize that conditions could be lots better if we had continued conservative policies and kept money value up to its original

Some fifty years ago school kids were told that thrift is a virtue. Put aside some funds for a rainy day, invest in security, and let your money draw interest. Since then thrift has been penalized by official policy. Inflation, caused principally by government extravagance, has wiped out the value of interest earnings besides decreasing the original value of investment.

Ask the person who bought insurance thirty years ago. He has less than half the security he originally intended to have. Likewise his savings bond or savings account, though increasing in cash value, does not increase in buying power. The result is that people who saved have seen the real value of their money shrink year after year. Regardless of the fact that current income has kept pace with inflation, the important point is that fixed income and savings do not keep pace, and the over all purchasing power of the individual is not as high as it should be.
