

Relative to the suggested change of name from Cooke County Junior College to something else, this column thinks the simplest and best change is just to drop the "Junior". After all, the word does nothing more than limit the scholastic scope and lengthen the name, neither of which is desirable.

Let's have a name that not only applies now but will still be OK if and when four year courses are available. Also, let's shake off the bother of using a superfluous word that detracts from rather than adds to the name. Most of us prefer the short names anyway.

From this standpoint, the proposed use of "Community" makes the name worse instead of better. A reason suggested for its use is that CCJC is not only a county college but that it benefits the entire community.

Obviously we do not have a meeting of minds concerning the dimensions of a community. The suggestion implies that the community is larger than the county, whereas a widely accepted view is that there are a number of communities in the county. Less than a year ago we recall that the Era community was first in Texas in an improvement contest. And we also have frequent references to communities of Hood, Rosston, Woodbine, Downard Fairplains, etc. All of which indicates quite clearly what people mean by the word.

By all means, let's not say Cooke County Community College. Let's not lengthen the name nor invite misunderstanding by using the word which doesn't mean the same to everyone. This column hopes that the regents will settle for the short and simple name, Cooke County College.

Back to the word community: we're getting tired of the social upstarts who lay claim the expression and give it an altogether different meaning. They speak of the black or brown community, the affluent or deprived community.





economic condition, not area. Well, why don't they use words that apply, or even create new ones? Why do they confuse the language by putting a different meaning on an old word?

As usually understood around here, community refers to an area in which the residents generally identify themselves with a certain town or city. Muenster, for instance consists of the space occupied by the city whereas the Muenster community includes the city and rural people who come here for church, school, business or some other interests.

In years past communities were identified principally with school districts in areas generally convenient to horse and buggy travel. Better roads and autos led to consolidation into larger districts, which was usually followed by consolidation of the communities. However some of the old original communities are still intact. Common interests and neighborly spirit has held them together long after they lost their schools.

Last week's issue of US News and World Report came out with the good news that something has been done about the insulting mural which desecrated the wall of the Bicentennial Center in Washington at its dedication on January 14. The mural, which was presented as a panorama of two centuries of American history, included pictures of Karl Marx, Friedrich Engels, Joseph Stalin, Mao Tse-tung and Angela Davis. Added insults were President Nixon in mustache and costume of a movie gangster and Tricia Nixon with Afro hairdo.

With exception of the Washington Star-News, the episode got little attention, but things started popping the next week after Howard Flieger denounced the outrage editorially in US News and World report. Letters and telegrams started flooding the magazine and the offices of senators and representatives. The editorial has been read into the Congressional Record three times.


that the mural is, as intended, a tribute to our country rather than an insult.


