



Just a few comments about the past Halloween leads a person to think that it was one of the best this community has ever had. Lots of folks noticed Monday that there was very little clutter and no apparent vandalism. An old tire or a hay bale could be seen here and there, but there were none of the usual reports of soaped windows, eggs splattered on buildings and automobiles, or tons of hedge apples, old tires and miscellaneous junk.

It seems that the community has suddenly grown up. A reason perhaps is that Father Placidus got through to common sense and conscience when he suggested that fellows with the urge to destroy or mess up should apply that urge on their own rooms or cars. He told them to smash or deface to their heart's content as long as they were the losers, but to remember that there is nothing funny about destroying another's property or causing another to clean up one's mess.

He said that a person can hardly claim to love God if he does those hateful things to a neighbor. Also that such mischief is equivalent to stealing because loss by damage is as bad as loss by theft and the offender is bound by conscience to make restitution.

Another likely influence is a few young fellows who are reported to have spent the night in support of law and order. They patrolled the town urging groups of prowlers to keep it cool and clean, also doing some clean-up on their own. They are known to have removed some junk and extinguished some tire and hay fires.

Those young men deserve to know that hundreds of home folks are grateful to them for preventing a big mess. They deserve congratulations for a gratifying turnabout of attitude, a switch from ugly observance to the golden rule. Let's hope that next year the good guys will have a number of companions doing still a better job of keeping the town clean and orderly.

Or we may not have to wait a year. The men concerned have learned by now that there's a definite satisfaction in preventing damage and giving the community something to be proud of. They might be inclined to apply that attitude at other times of the year, influencing others to litter less, make less noise, drive slower and more carefully, etc. They could help spread the word that would make vandalism and disorderly conduct increasingly unpopular.

In relation to trick or treat, Halloween also brought one of the nicest tricks ever in the community. Door bells sounded at the homes of several Sacred Heart football players and answering persons found a treat of candy, cup cakes, etc., with a paper banner reading "He's a Real Tiger" or a similar pleasing message. Again, a delightful switch from the usual Halloween activity by that age group.

Muenster Voters Favor Ford 3 to 1

By a ratio of more than 3 to 1, in a record turnout election, the people of Muenster supported the loser in Tuesday's presidential election. Combined votes of the two local ballot boxes were 719 for Ford-Dole and 232 for Carter-Mondale.

They also went for the loser in the senatorial race but not by an equally strong ratio. Steelman received 628 votes and Bentsen 290.

Total votes here in one of the Community's largest elections ever were 794 out of a possible 1012 in the north box, and 208 out of a possible 250 in the south box. In the north box Ford led 560 to 194 and Steelman led 496 to 231. In the south box Ford led 159 to 38 and Steelman led 132 to 59.

In doing so the community was in agreement with the county on both races but out of agreement with the state. Ford won 4737 to 4123 in the county and Steelman by 4650 to 3965. However both of them lost in the state and Ford also lost in the nation.

Carter was declared the winner early Wednesday when his electoral votes reached a total of 272, two more than the 270 needed. At that time the result was still undecided in Ohio, Oregon and Maine. Carter received his 272 votes from 22 states and DC whereas Ford received 231 from 25 states. Also at that time Carter led Ford 38,848,599 to 36,980,456 in the popular vote.

Nick Mosman died suddenly Sunday afternoon while watching a football game on TV. The apparent cause was a heart attack, but he was not known to have a heart condition and he seemed to be in normally good health.

Mosman was a native of Gainesville, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Nick Mosman Sr. He was a long time employee of the Gainesville Register, having started there at the age of 12 as a carrier. Advancing through the mail room he went to the composing department and spent all of his adult life as its foreman until the company changed its printing process three years ago. Since then Nick has been owner and operator of a service station.

Survivors are his wife, Helen; a daughter, Mrs. Cheryl Jones of Gainesville; Nick Mosman III of Gainesville; one sister, Mrs. Clara Mae Wiese of Gainesville; and two brothers, Richard and Bobby Mosman of Dallas.

Hornets Slay Knights 48-0

On a sloppy, rain soaked field, the MHS Hornets continued their perfect district record Friday night by overwhelming the luckless Lindsay Knights 48-0. It was a game featured by turnovers, of which six happened to the visiting Knights and five to the Hornets, and most of which could be charged to the slippery pigskin.

The trend of the contest shaped up in the first few plays. Lindsay fumbled on its second scrimmage play and Jim Koelzer recovered for the Hornets on the 23. From there two short plays gained a yard before Mark Sicking broke through for a TD. It was the first of three touchdowns for Sicking, plus another that was nullified by a clip penalty, also the first nice gain in a total of 123 yards, and a team total of 355.

After the touchdown Nick Walterscheid was ready for a place kick but a bad pass

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**Water, Sewer, Garbage
Rates Increased by City**

The Muenster City Council Monday night heard no objections to proposed increases of water and sewer rates. No one appeared at a special hearing on the proposal, so raises were approved as follows.

The new minimum rate is \$3.50 for 1,000 gallons. After that the next 19,000 will cost 70c per 1000, the next 30,000 will cost 85 cents per 1000 and additional thousands will be 80 cents per.

The sewer rate, determined by average water consumption during the winter months is \$1.50 for the first 1000 gallons and 30 cents each for additional thousands. And the garbage charge will remain \$1.00 per month more than the sewer charge.

Related increases apply to water deposits. The charge is \$5.00 to a home owner but \$25.00 to a renter. The reason is that sometimes in the past the deposit was not sufficient to cover the bill of people who moved without paying.

Responding to a report of heavy traffic on Mesquite Street, the council decided to confer with Commissioner Robert Bayer on the possibility of an FM Road project for the street.

Other new rates are \$2.50 per foot and \$4.00 per foot

And, a good report was presented on a recent hearing in Sherman concerning sanitary landfills of the area. Muenster's landfill north of town, was declared to be in good order.

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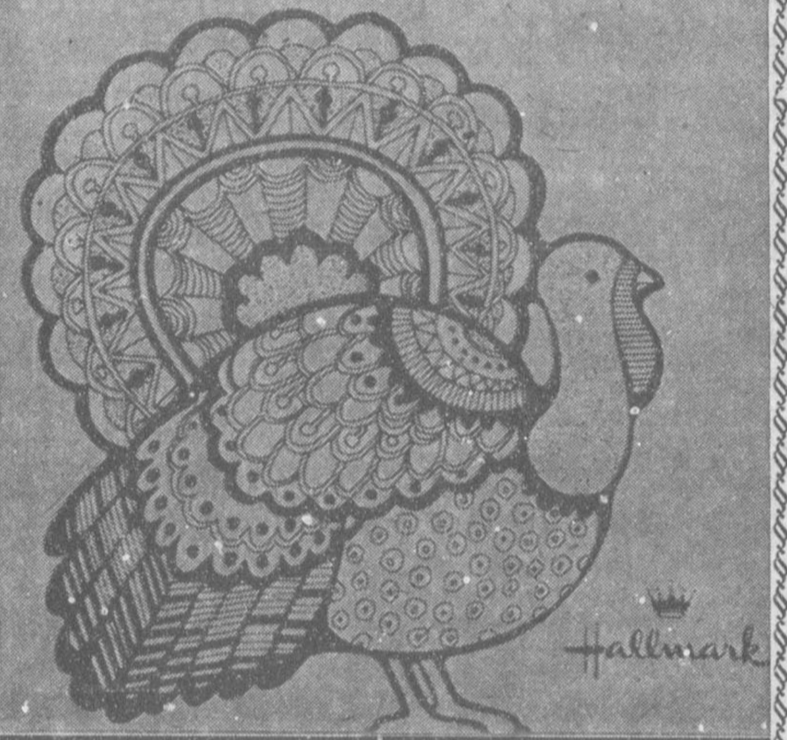
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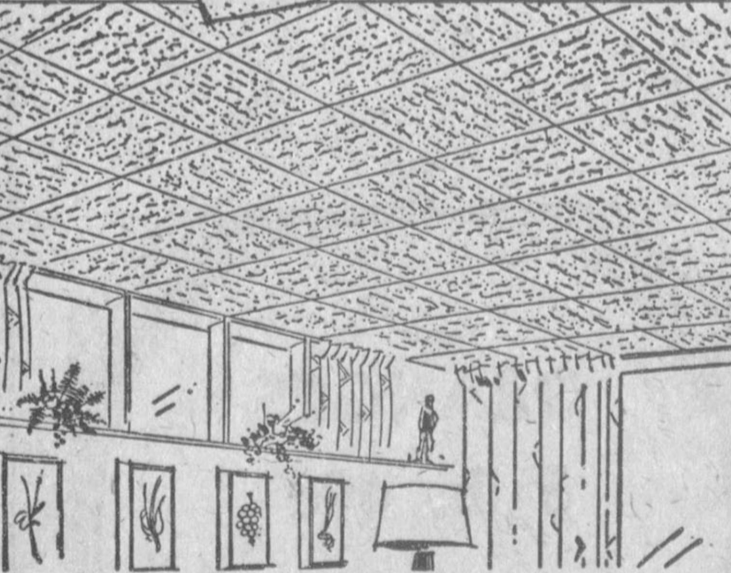


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
