

People generally are not very much shaken by reports of the big spending in Washington, so the West Texas Chamber of Commerce a few days ago translated figures into terms that are more easily grasped.

It chose the next federal budget proposed by President Nixon as an example. The amount is \$304.4 billion. Based on Chamber of Commerce calculations Texas taxpayers bear 4.97 per cent of the U.S. tax burden, so our state's share of the budget is \$15.1 billion.

Well, how much is \$15.1 billion? According to some of the facts taken from the latest Texas Almanac, here are several comparisons that make the figure more understandable.

Based on 1971-72 spending, the state government of Texas could operate on it for nearly four years and nine months. It would be enough to give every person in the state almost \$1,350. Or it would be enough to buy all of the crude oil and natural gas production in Texas for nearly two and a half years.

Also, it exceeds by \$3 billion the total assets value of all state chartered banks in Texas. And it is \$4.3 billion more than the total deposits in those 700 banks.

The \$15.1 billion is the approximate value of all crops and livestock produced in Texas in four and a half years, of all Texas railroads for the next 250 years, based on 1971 income.

Deadline for filing candidacy 1964 to Jan. 25, 1974. is March 6, 30 days before the election. At this time no candidates have announced.

Council Ready to Reduce Garbage Charges to Needy

Special rates to the needy for garbage and trash service will be determined by the city council on individual basis according to a decision by the members at their regular meeting Monday night.

They agreed on a form to be filled out by the applicant, and each application is to be considered on its special circumstances in determining what the customer will be charged.

In other action the council approved an increase of fire insurance coverage for the city hall and its contents as well as the books and furnishings of the library. The purpose was to make adjustment for increasing values due to inflation.

The members also approved a rate increase requested by Cooke County Electric Co-op in the area it serves in the city. The rate allowed is identical with that charged to TP&L customers.

The council also noted that it is time again for Muenster to host the monthly meeting of North Texas Utilities Association, which includes about 35 towns in this area. Following dinner the group customarily discusses problems, new regulations and new techniques in the operation of water and sewer departments. About 100 visitors are expected for the March 13 event.
