



If you have been wondering what's wrong with our country you can get at least some idea from the fact that a very important event, a Senate resolution calling for a national day of humiliation, fasting and prayer has been shamefully ignored by the news media.

The resolution was passed on December 20, 1973 and the House of Representatives was urged to take similar action making it a joint resolution, but nothing was done up to March 26, even though the national observance is set for April 30. The House Judiciary Committee was too much concerned with Watergate to clear the resolution for House action. Imagine, those people would not spare just a few minutes to recommend public prayer asking God to help us out of the present mess. Their neglect is especially ironic in view of the fact that Divine help is needed more in Washington than anywhere else.

Likewise the media could find no time for the subject . . . neither the Senate resolution nor the snub it received from the House. Up to Monday, when a news release was received from a group of individuals in California, this column had heard nothing on the subject. And it wonders how few people saw or heard this before now. Tragic, isn't it that we can get abundant publicity on crime, violence, sex, drugs, streaking and political dirty tricks, but nothing on the subject that might be vital to the survival of our country.

Well, this paper is going to be an exception. It is one of the few announcing that next Tuesday has been proclaimed a national day of humiliation fasting and prayer, also one of the few observing that our country is drifting farther and farther from God, and making an awful mess in the process. Our only hope of getting back on the right course is to get back to the old principles of honesty, decency, thrift, patriotism, and hard work, along with a deep respect for Almighty God.

We've got to realize how the worldly wise way is lousing things up, how very much we need Divine guidance, how our willingness to pray is in itself the first step toward the right attitude. Even though the sophisticates don't agree, it's a good idea to observe the day as the Senate suggested.

The wording of the resolution, incidentally, is well worth our attention. Reading through it we're reminded rather convincingly of our total dependence on God, the appreciation we should feel for our many blessings, His original place in our government, and our recent drift away from Him. Nothing in this time seems quite as necessary as re-establishing the best possible relations with God.

Here is the text of the resolution. WHEREAS, it is the duty of nations, as well as of men to owe their dependence upon the overruling power of God, to confess their sins and transgressions, in humble sorrow, yet with assured hope that genuine repentance will lead to mercy and pardon, and to recognize the sublime truth, announced in the Holy Scriptures and proven by all history, that those nations are blessed whose God is Lord; and

"WHEREAS, we know that we have been the recipients of the choicest bounties of Heaven; we have been preserved these many years in peace and prosperity; we have grown in numbers, wealth and power as no other nation has ever grown; but we have forgotten God; and

"WHEREAS, we have forgotten the gracious hand which preserved us in peace, and multiplied and enriched us; and we have vainly imagined, in the deceitfulness of our hearts, that all these blessings were produced by some superior wisdom and virtue of our own; and

"WHEREAS, intoxicated with unbroken success, we have become too self-sufficient to feel the necessity of redeeming and preserving grace, too proud to pray to the God that made us, and

"WHEREAS, we have made such an idol out of our pursuit of 'national security' that we have forgotten that only God can be the ultimate guardian of our true livelihood and safety; and

"WHEREAS, we have failed to respond, personally and collectively, with sacrifice and

Co-op Members Hear Report of Big Year

Over 700 persons, including member-owners and guests, gathered in the Muenster High School Auditorium Monday night, April 22, for the annual meeting of Cooke County Electric Cooperative.

They heard Manager Mike Sloan report that sales reached a new high in 1973, however the net operating margin was some \$25,000 lower because of the energy crisis. Total of power purchased was 209,470,200 KWH, a gain of about 29,000,000 over 1972.

Because of the crisis the co-op had to pay \$282,372 in excess fuel adjustment charges. At the same time it had computer problems which delayed passing on the extra charge to consumers. In the end the co-op charged \$139,118 of the fuel adjustment cost to its customers. Had all of the excess been charged the operating margin would have been about \$118,000 more than in '72.

Sloan added that Brazos Electric now pays roughly three times the '72 price for its natural gas to generate electricity. That increase plus expected rising costs of transmission lines and generating plants, due to inflation, is expected to double wholesale cost of power in five or six years. Hence price to consum-

May 8 Scheduled As Next Date for Bloodmobile Visit

People of Muenster will make the next deposit in their blood bank on Wednesday, May 8, when the bloodmobile of the Wichita Falls Red Cross Blood Center comes here to accept blood donations.

Facilities for the collection will be set up in the K of C hall from 2:30 to 7:30 p.m. Technicians of the blood center will make the collections and will be assisted by local nurses and hospital auxiliary members.

The community's quota is 80 pints of blood, based on the average use here during a six months period. Considering that donations will be accepted from seventeen year olds and that three local organizations are seeking volunteers, the prospects of topping the quota are encouraging.

David Bright, hospital administrator, said that appointments are being made, by the KCs, VFW and Hospital Auxiliary in order to avoid rush and slack periods as well as to determine in advance about how many to expect. Anyone willing to donate is asked to contact one of those organizations or the hospital — or to come in without an appointment.

Because of this arrangement with Red Cross residents of the Muenster Hospital District and patients of Muenster Hospital are entitled to free blood for transfusions. Their only charge is for handling, packaging, storage, transportation, etc. The price of a transfusion is normally about half of that when commercial blood is used.

Dallas Cowboy Will Speak at SH Awards Banquet

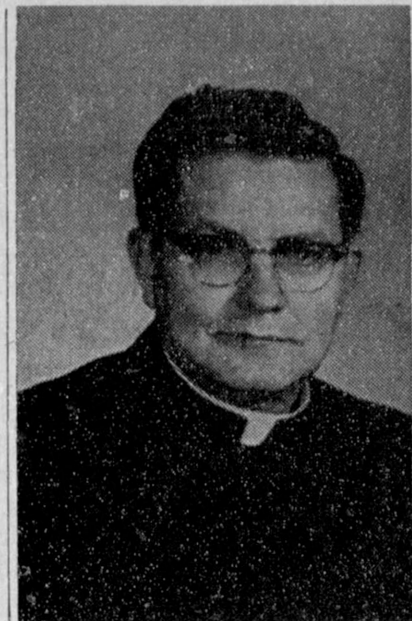

Graduation of 8th Grade Phases Out At Public School

Effective with the coming year, Muenster Public School will divide its grades to harmonize with the 1970 Principles and Standards for Accrediting Elementary and Secondary Schools.

Specifically this means dividing it into elementary and secondary departments, one to include kindergarten through Grade 6, the other being Grade 7 through 12. It also means that Grade 8 graduation will be discontinued and a sort of promotion ceremony will be established in kindergarten and sixth grade.

Accordingly, effective this year, the phasing out of eighth grade graduation will begin. The class will graduate as usual with the senior class. Also this year the sixth graders and kindergarten will have their first promotion ceremony. It will be a short program in the auditorium. Exact time will be announced later.

Remainder of the Grade 8 phase out will come next year when the class again will graduate with the seniors. However they will not wear caps and gowns. Also for the second year kindergarten and sixth grade will have the short simple ceremony on the last school day.

After next year there will be the promotion exercise for kindergarten and sixth grade plus the high school graduation. Also, baccalaureate services thereafter will be for seniors only.

The custom of school superintendents to be located away from school is arriving at Muenster. Effective on June 1, Superintendent L. E. Brunts will move his office to the Grewing Building across from Muenster Clinic.

The change was decided by the school board at its April meeting. And the purpose was partly to make one more room available at school, also to separate the functions of administrator and finance from the daily school activity of teaching, discipline, athletics etc.

He said that in most cases the new constitution doesn't really change state procedure but rather endorses changes that have been made. For instance, the present constitution requires taxation of both tangible and intangible property, but intangible is not taxed now so it is omitted as a future tax source. Likewise pay-as-you-go financing is required in the old constitution, but not observed, and is not required in the new one.

Roger Taylor's talk as outgoing president reviewed the year's record and looked forward to the coming year. He said that the chapter served its principal service of "leadership training through community improvement." Members have increased their own knowledge and skill while making Muenster a better community.

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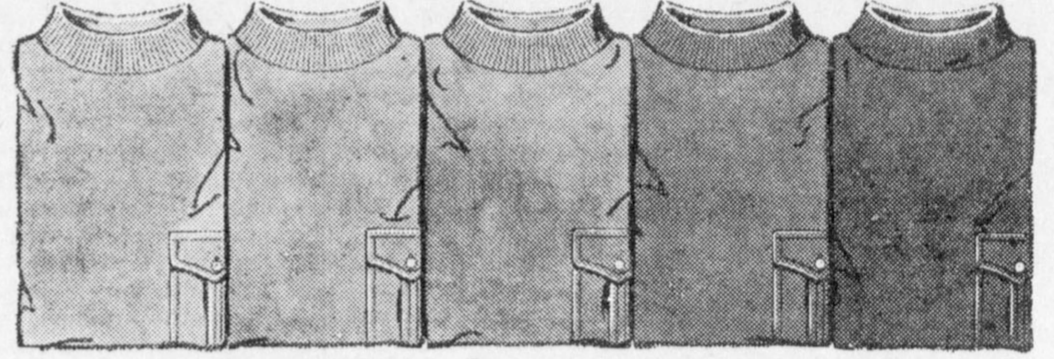
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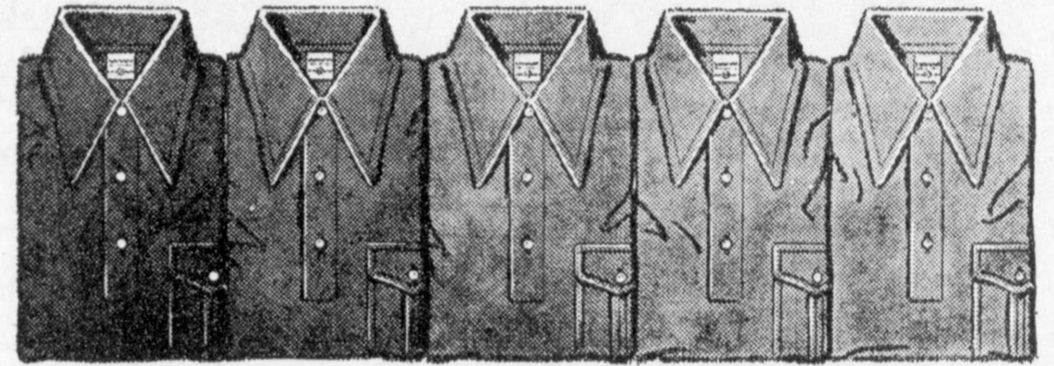
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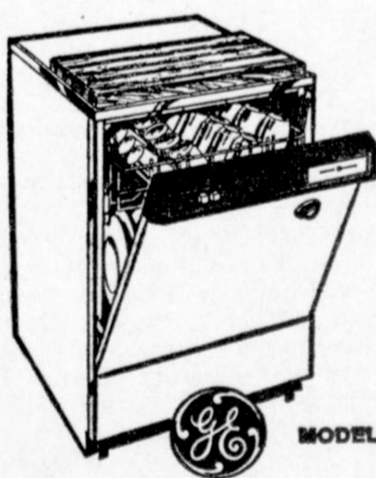
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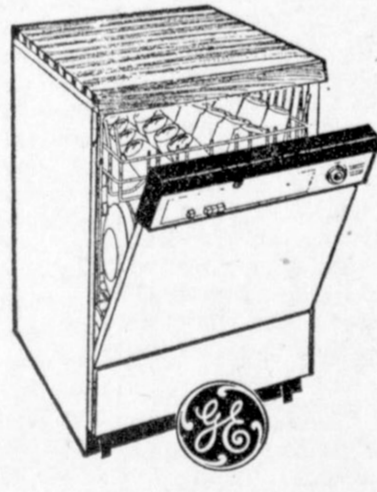


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47th Anniversary

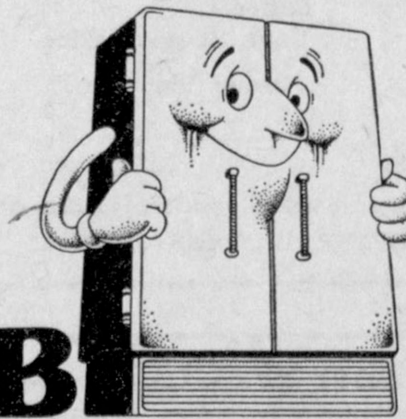

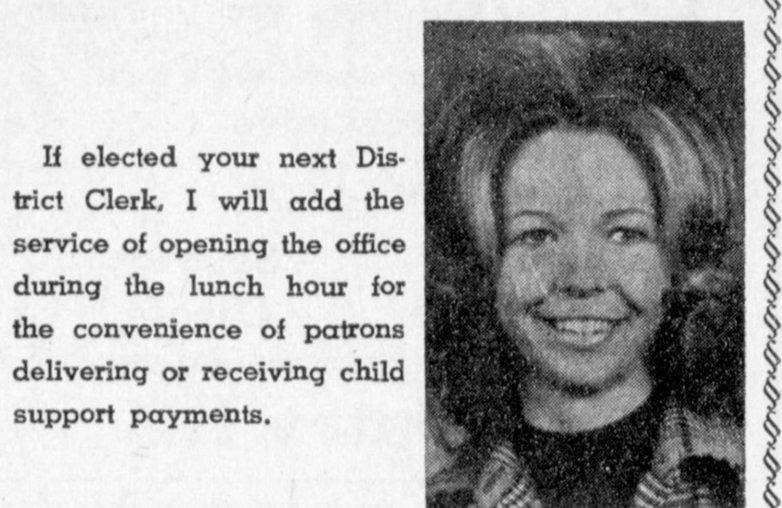

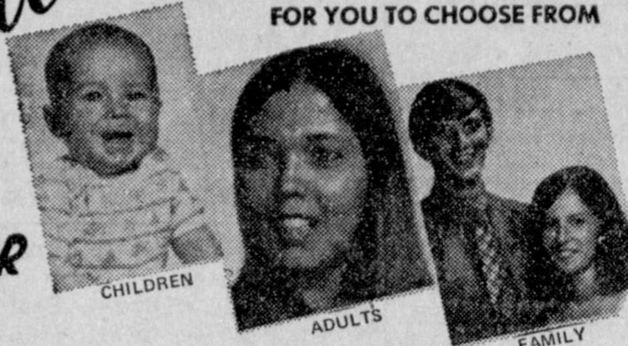

The meal was served buffet style and guests were seated at pretty lace-covered tables in the dining room, breakfast room and the spacious den.

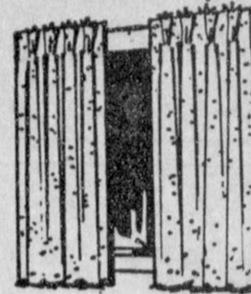

Community Garden Pressures Water

Something new has been added to the Willow Creek Gardens just below Weinzapfel's Lake on Maple Street Water siphoned from the lake is boosted by electric pump for adequate spraying pressure. Getting water on a garden has been speeded up considerably.

The area, improved to serve as community gardens, is divided into a number of plots, some 10,000 square feet, some 2500 square feet and some 900 square feet. Two have been leased and several more are available.

Water for the gardens is free, as much as needed. It flows by gravity from the lake in a two inch plastic pipe and branches out in one inch pipe to the separate garden sites.

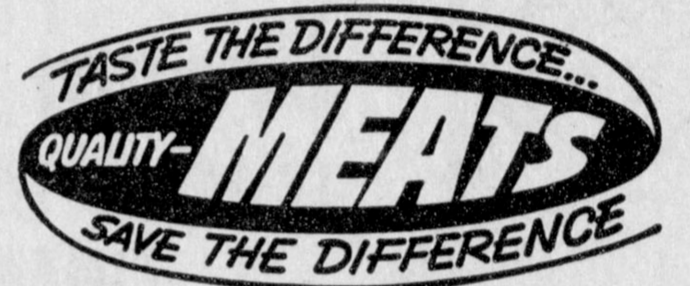

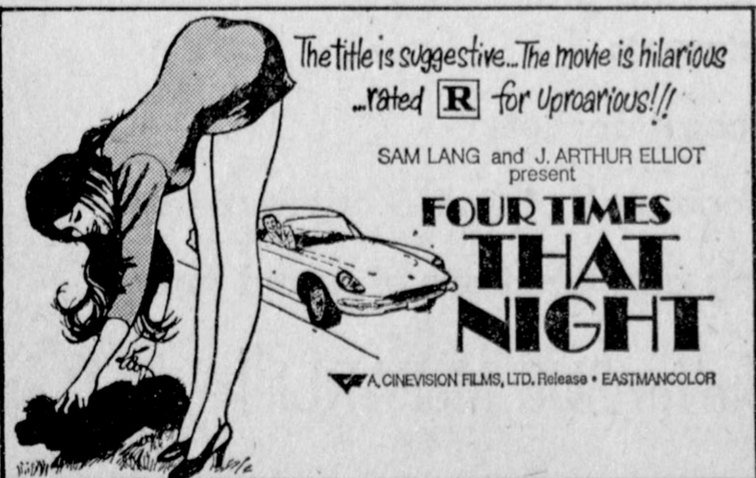
