Efforts have been made to correct that situation but it just did not work out. Soft hearted people were not willing to keep some poor fellow from driving just beacuse he could not provide liability insurance. Then after a crash it was admitted that you can't get blood out of a turnip.

Doing something about that absurd arrangement is long over-due. But, admitting that the previous attempt to require liability insurance from everyone did not work out, we can't imagine any solution other than providing for one's self. This is more like other insurance, like hospitalization or fire insurance. They enable one to provide his own protec- probably the most highly detion. Why not have a similar system for car insurance?

The objection from trial lawyers is understandable. They have enjoyed lots of fat fees in hot court cases to determine whether insurance was payable or not. They claim that no fault will cost more because all claims are payable but the bill's supporters say it will be less because most of the big legal fees will be eliminated. That seems reasonable. With standards established the rate of pay for any damage ought to be mostly routine.

Something else about auto insurance seems grossly unfair to this column. When a youngster becomes a driver the insurance rate suddenly goes way up - because the records show that boys of that age have the highest accident

record. However there are other records showing that some boys go completely though their Dallas. "reckless age" without ever Ray having an accident. Still they have to keep paying the high rate year after year.

Why can't something be done about this injustice? Why can't a young man's rate be dropped if his record shows no blemish after the first year? Better still why isn't he started with a low rate and allowed to keep it until his record justifies a raise? Still another gripe: We

know that a person's rate is raised after an accident, but it isn't lowered no matter how long he drives without an accident. If an insurance company has made 100 per cent profit on a customer for a number of years, the customer ought to deserve some kind of reward.

This column can name an insurer who paid for years, including the higher rate for teen agers, but has never made a claim on the policy. Isn't a reward for that kind of record about due?

In the current climate of detente it isn't surprisng that the media tends to overlook an incident here and there, but to bypass the murder of impartant people seems like overdoing it.

2.5 Mi Extension

Work in Cooke County is included in the 1974 Texas Farm to Market Road Program approved by the Texas Highway Commission.

This work includes the development of 4.8 miles of Farm to Market Roads in Cooke Robert H. Schleider, Jr., of the Texas Highway Department in Wichita Falls, said the estimated cost for the work is \$138,800.00. The work involves two projects.

The first of the two projects will be from the junction of F. M. 373 and F. M. 1630, 5.2 miles followed by all the red tape of south of Muenster, south for a distance of 2.5 miles. The second project will be from U.S. Highway 82 in Lindthe distance with the remainwhere the new road will be located. The project includes grading, surfacing and structures.

Across the state, the program includes work on 565.9 miles at an estimated cost of \$21.4 million.

Projects in the program were proposed by counties in consultations with district engineers of the Texas Highway Department. The FM program is a partnership effort between the counties and the Highway Department with the counties providing necessary right of way and the Highway Department providing for construction and maintenance.

Texas now has some 40 thousand miles of paved Farm and Ranch to Market Roads, two books on swimming. veloped system of secondary roads in the nation.

Originally conceived to get the farmer out of the mud, the FM system provides allweather roads for agriculture in the state. Now, FM roads also serve many recreational areas in the state as well as providing access for new industrial development in many

smaller cities and towns. The 1974 program provides additional financing for previously initiated projects totaling 392.8 miles. New construction in the program accounts for 173 miles.
