The Texas Legislature is doing lots of talking about a proposed presidential primary for 1980, its main issue being whether to hold it with or separate from the May primaries, to name party nominees for the general election.

Preference seems to be leaning toward combining the two primaries as a matter of convenience to voters and economy to taxpayers. Estimated cost of having the separate presidential primary is \$2 million. In addition voters would prefer just one trip to the polls, rather than two, as a saving on both time and travel.

However the proposal has a very definite fault. It does not provide a way for cross voters who wish to vote for the person rather than the party. It does not offer a selection comparable to that which the voter has in a general election.

By the Texas election process, with very few exceptions, the Democratic primary determines the winner of the office. Usually there is no Republican nominee, or if there is one his chances in November are very slim. Because of this fact a voter, regardless of his political preference, has to vote in the Democratic primary to have a part in the selection of local officials.

This circumstance presents a problem in combining party and presidential primary. The Democratic ballot would include only the names of the party's presidential candidates. A Republican party member, exercising his vote in selection of local officials would lose his vote in selecting his party's preference for president. The situation brings back memories of the old time pledge on Democratic ballots stating that the voter was obligated to support the party's nominees in the general election.

The end result would be that thousands of persons would have to give up their votes in selecting either the local official or the presidential favorite.

While it seems like a good idea to add the presidential primary, it is equally good to offer an unhampered choice, as presented on the general election ballot. In fact, this is the only proper way, because it offers the voter complete freedom from the beginning of the election process.

There is a solution to the problem. It is a composite primary in which voters can indicate presidential preference in either party along with selection of their party's nominees for local offices. This method appears like a way to get the desired information without the expense and inconvenience of separate elections.

Last week's news release by Senator Bentsen refers to a study by the General Accounting Office which reveals that federal agencies which clear their paperwork through GAO or the Office of Accounting and Budget, require US businesses to spend 69 million hours each year filling out government forms at a cost of over \$1 billion.

And that, he says, is only the tip of the iceberg. There are other agencies not required to make such clearance. IRS, for instance, estimates that businesses and individuals spend some 613 million hours a year on their forms. Also the Department of Commerce sends out 1.9 million forms requiring 45 minutes each and the Department of Labor sends out 600,000 forms requiring 2 1/2 hours each. Those estimates, furthermore, are made by the agencies themselves, which can be expected to play down the burden they are imposing.

We average people often wonder what happens to all the paperwork that is sent in to the government. How much actually serves a useful purpose? How much is unimportant statistics that accomplish little more than give work to lots of bureaucratic employees? How much is filed away and never processed? How much information is being demanded by one agency when it has already been provided to another agency?

Senator Bentsen likewise would like to know those answers as a basis for legislation to eliminate tons and tons of the paperwork. Let's hope he will have great success. We

In announcing the opening Herr said that principal concerns in building were to provide an ample number of bays to assure a minimum of waiting time as well as the latest improvements in equipment.

There are five bays. Cleaning wands, operating under a pressure of 1000 pounds, spray detergent, rinse water, wax or a white wall cleaner which can also be used to clean motors. It is coin operated, requiring two quarters for five minutes of spray.

Also available are two vacuum cleaners for car interiors.

The rating qualifies him to compete in the state UIL contest at Austin in May. Also qualified for state is Rene Stelzer, who earned the Division I rating in a vocal solo competition on February 3 at UT Arlington.

## Bloodmobile Will Be Here March 14

The community's next blood bank collection will be held on Wednesday, March 14, when the Bloodmobile of the Red Cross Blood Center, Wichita Falls, makes its regular visit to town. The collection is sponsored by the Sacred Heart Student Council.

Personnel of the blood center will have their facilities set up in the K of C Hall from 2 to 7 p.m. and will be assisted by people from the hospital and the hospital auxiliary.

The collection goal again is 100 pints, an estimate based on use by the hospital and hospital district. The program provides blood for transfusions to patients in the Muenster hospital as well as to residents of the hospital district who receive transfusions elsewhere.

Because of this arrangement the local patients and residents are able to get a better quality of blood at a better price. Experience has shown that blood freely given in this kind of program is less likely to cause infectious hepatitis than blood from many commercial sources. As regards price, there is no charge for the blood because it is donated, the only charges being for collecting, packaging, storing, transporting, etc. plus the hospital's charge for transfusion. Normally the charge is about half as much as for a transfusion with commercial blood.

## Soldier Transfers By Helicopter to Fort Sill Hospital

Examination of the patient after his arrival at the hospital revealed an injury requiring surgery at the right side of the chest. He said that he wished to be transferred to the Fort Sill hospital for the surgery.

After stabilizing the patient's condition, Dr. Martin Kralicko made two unsuccessful attempts to reach the military hospital, then called a friend, Capt. Harold Waite at Lawton, who made the necessary contacts to get a helicopter and attending medic on the way.

When the copter arrived about 8 p.m. the pilot found ample landing space on the parking lot south of the hospital and the area adequately lighted by headlights of the Muenster Police, Doctor Kralicko and an unidentified helpful motorist. Moments later there were dozens of additional car lights as people came to see about the activity. The estimated crowd was well over 100 when the helicopter left some 15 minutes later.

## Highway Project Detour Delayed By Bad Weather

Severe weather of the past two months made no distinction between old and new in its damage to local streets.

As related by Dale Terry of the Wichita Falls office of the Department of Highways and Public Transportation, the new road built to serve as a detour while the four lane road is being built to replace the overpass took a beating as well as the old streets around town.

As a result the project is being delayed for repairs to the road base. After that the road will be surfaced and ready for traffic, and work on the main project can start about April 1.

First step in that job is removing the overpass, which will require about a month. Work will start at the east side leaving the span over Maple Street until last, and the detour route will change slightly while that span is being torn down. Complete removal of the overpass will require about a month. And then work will start on the four lane surface road.

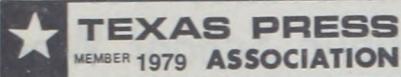

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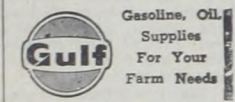

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## Second Call Made For Farming Count By Census Bureau

Farm or ranch operators who have not been counted yet in the 1978 Census of Agriculture still have an opportunity to be included, according to the Bureau of the Census, U.S. Department of Commerce.  
 Uncounted operators are urged to write for a farm census report form to (WYOC), Bureau of the Census, 1201 East 10th Street, Jeffersonville, Ind. 47132. The census has been underway since January 1, 1978.  
 Bureau officials remind farmers and ranchers that the census will include producers of many commodities not often thought of as agricultural. Among these are rabbits, goats, honey and honey bees, fish in captivity, worms, and ducks, pheasants, quail, and pigeons or squab, Greenhouse and such nursery products as sod, mushrooms, greenhouse vegetables, cut flowers, and bulbs are also on the list as farm and ranch products. Any commercial producer of these commodities should fill out a census report form. Bureau officials also remind farm operators that the quicker report forms are returned to the Bureau the less it will cost in follow-up work to complete collection of census data.

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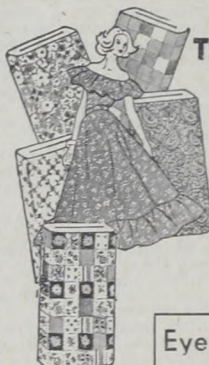

**Mail Service to Iran Suspended**

Suspension of civilian mail service to Iran has been extended to cover surface mail, the U. S. Postal Service announced today. The effect is to eliminate all civilian mail service between Iran and the United States.

Airmail service to Iran was suspended January 9, 1979. Postal officials said the latest action was taken because of the lack of reliable air and surface transportation either in or out of that country.

The suspension means no U. S. post office will accept civil mail bound for Iran until further notice. Mail currently in the postal system destined for Iran will be returned to sender. Postage will be refunded for mail returned because of the suspension of service.

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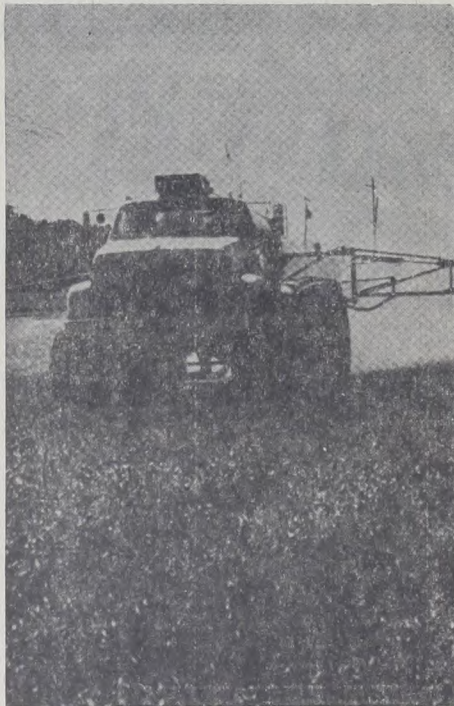

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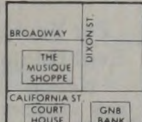

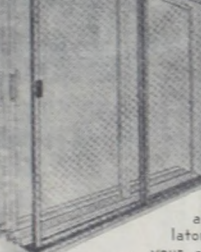

## Cost Trimmed on Proposed New Jail for County

After extensive eliminations from original specifications, the estimated cost of Cooke County's proposed new jail is more in line with ideas of the commissioners court, and prospects of construction are improving.

At last week's meeting the court was pleased to find that its architect had succeeded in trimming \$193,000 from the previous low bid of \$1,194,000. The reduction eliminates about half the gap between asking price and the \$800,000 on hand from Revenue Sharing Funds.

Relative to that fund the county faces a risk of having it reclaimed by the federal government if it is not used for the designated purpose of building the jail within a certain period. At the same time the county finds itself being rushed by the approaching expiration of a permit to pay lower wage rates. At first the county was told it had to pay the Labor Department's scale and commissioners balked, insisting on paying the lower local wage scale.

After about a year, while building costs went up and up, the county got its permit for paying the lower wage. But the permit has a deadline of March 26. If the project is not under way by then the permit can be revoked. The result is that the county is under pressure from two sources to hurry the project.

As a possible way of cutting cost, the commissioner's court has considered being its own builder and employing a manager to supervise the job. The low bid contractor, North Texas Construction Co. of Sherman, has offered to take on the project on either a contract or a management arrangement.
