This is also a good time to remember that industry is people. Whether it's one person as sole owner of a plant, or a number of persons pooling their resources to establish such a business, the basic fact is that we are thinking of individuals who invested their savings to set up the business. Admittedly their motive was to make a profit but they were also very much aware that no profit would be forthcoming until they had paid wages and taxes and made products that were wanted by the public.

While thinking about those services let's not overlook the difficulties that industry has to cope with. It has to do a variety of jobs for government bureaucrats, such as collecting taxes from employees and filling out required reports. Also, especially in case of larger firms, it has to deal with strikes and demands that are often based only on the fact that they are attainable if sufficient pressure is applied.

When we think of those things we are a little more aware of the meaning behind 82 from the west city limits. close behind with 1051/4. Afindustrial week. One might say that it's a time for consumers to thank those who put our products on the market, for working people to say thanks for their jobs, for government to say thanks for taxes and services.

While we're at it, let's remember agriculture as fitting in this category, even though it is cusomarily considered as a separate part of the economy. Farming is like industry in that it requires investment and management and involves the motive of profit, along with the risk of loss. So, let's include the farmers while expressing our appreciation for Texas industries.

All of that, of course is the over-all view of industry. And there's also a local view that deserves consideration. Actually our principal community concern is the number of jobs that industry is providing here. First let's remember people engaged in making products at the dress factory, the Valenite plant, the AMPI plant, the oil field, the meat processing plants and feed mills. Then think of services, like the hospital and schools, the electric co-op, and the stores.

City's Sales Tax **Revenue Sets New** Record of \$9,825

The city's revenue from sales tax continues to increase. After setting records for the second and third quarters of 1973, it reached a new high in the remittance just received from the state treasurer. The amount was \$9825.10.

Whether the result of increasing business or inflation or a combination of both, the volume of sales tax revenue has increased for four of the last five payments. It was \$8,-800.27 in January '73, and \$8,-889.18 in April, then fell to \$6,751.84 in July. In October it jumped to a new high of \$9,087.37. in January, 1974, to another high of \$9,142.88, and now to still another record of \$9,825.10. It is significant that the low payment applied to the first quarter of the year, perhaps reflecting a post-Christmas slowdown and income tax time.



Along with expansion the city needs a zoning ordinance so a home builder would know that an industrial plant would not be constructed next door. That would also pin point the area where commercial esta-




