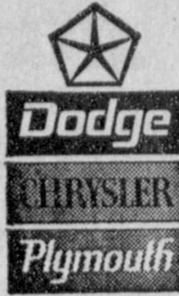

Adds Six Members**

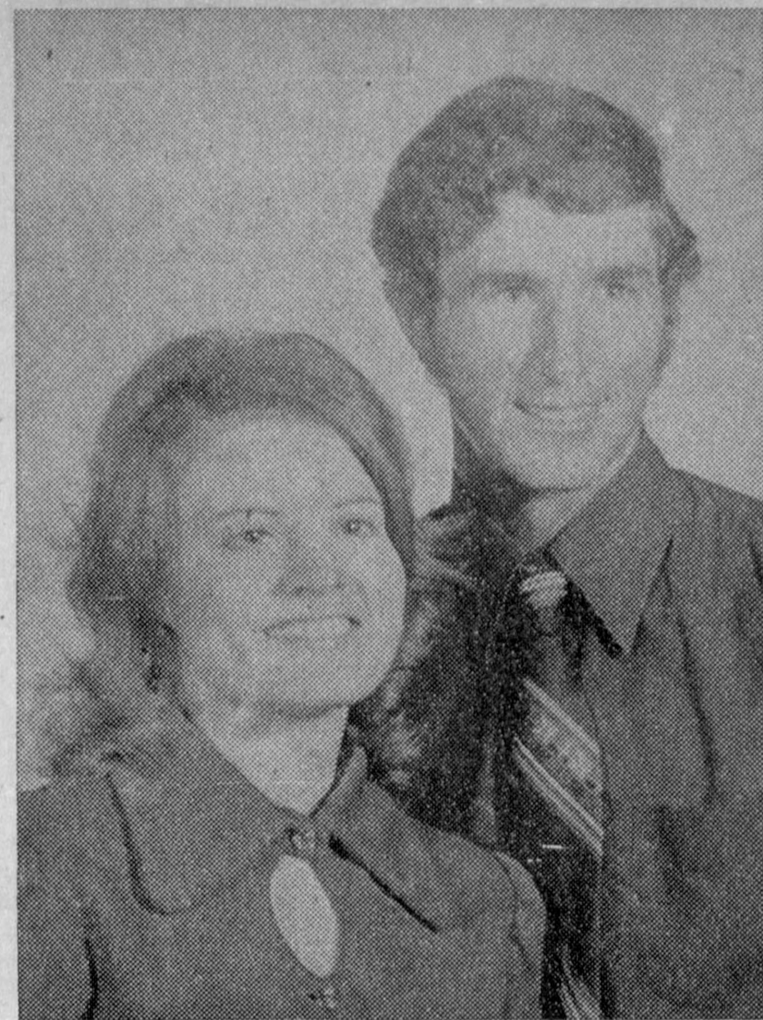

Mouth Syphoning Of Gas Dangerous And Can Be Fatal

Using your mouth when syphoning gasoline is extremely dangerous and can be fatal, the Texas Medical Association warns.

Gasoline is a poison which acts as an irritant in the digestive tract. In the lungs, however, it is most often fatal. Relatively small amounts of gasoline in the stomach will cause pain and discomfort, irritate the digestive tract and can cause ulceration and other complications. However, should a person who has swallowed even a small quantity of gasoline vomit, there is extreme danger of some of the gasoline entering the lungs.

Even one or two drops of gasoline in the lungs can be fatal. The gasoline causes chemical pneumonitis (new-mo-night-us), a condition causing permanent damage to the lungs and frequently leading to death.

Recent deaths in the U. S. have been reported as the result of syphoning gas by mouth. With today's gasoline shortages there is the dangerous potential for more of these deaths.

If you do swallow gasoline

or discover someone who has, do not induce vomiting. Keep the person calm and get them to medical care as fast as possible. But remember — do not induce vomiting. Gasoline is a pain in the stomach, but a killer in the lungs.
