

Talk was out weeks ago that a goal of the new ultra liberal congress was to eliminate the depletion allowance as an income tax deduction. Last week's action in the House indicates a start in that direction but brings up a big question as to whether the goal will be reached.

The next step needed is passage of the bill in the Senate, which is most likely to be followed by the president's veto. And then we come to the real test of the power of the liberal congress. Will it be able to over-ride the president's veto? Did the big liberals of this country actually reach their objective of a electing a veto-proof congress?

While awaiting the outcome of this test the nation will keep its fingers crossed, hoping that our old law making procedure is still intact and not turned over to an indirect dictatorship manipulated by George Meaney and associates.

It is understandable why the liberals zeroed-in on depletion allowance as a prime target in their legislative program. It is a convenient source of extra revenue to help support an extravagant spending program - a considerable place went to Bert Miller, son portion of which consists of the luxuries and fringe benefits, etc., enjoyed by those same congressmen. 

Engelke said society has reached the point of needing adjustment in both problems. Cities need to be relieved of some of their surplus whereas the rural communities need more people to give the economy a general up-lift. They are needed to generate more business in town, to put more children in school, to raise property values, to help provide the tax revenue for the town's health, recreation, security, streets, and other elements of progress, or even survival.

By way of tackling the project Governor Briscoe called for a state-wide study which recommended the legislative action authorizing the Texas Rural Development Commission. Purpose of that commission is to help communities that are trying to help themselves.

However, Engelke made it clear that the first and most important ingredient is self help. That implies careful study of local potential in order to set a practical goal, followed by aggressive local promotion and harnessing of local energies. Meanwhile it's advisable to remember that advice is always available from the Rural Development Committee.

The operator's capital Saint lo Relays gradually dwindles away and he should rightfully be compensated for the loss. The same applies to depreciation of equipment, and compensation is provided for it. So, why isn't it equally fair to compensate for the loss of producing resources? The depletion allowance is nothing more or less than a percentage of income set aside for such loss of capital. It differs from depreciation allowance only in that the compensation for depreciation is estimated on another basis.

Another point the legislators apparently failed to consider, or maybe just do not admit, is that the public will be gouged a little more. PUBLIC NOTICE SUMMARY PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION APRIL 22, 1975

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. No. 3)

Repealing Sections 48a. 48b, 51e, and 51f of Article III and Sections 62 and 63 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution, Article XVI of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide for the revision and consolidation of provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and to provide that all general laws that have established retirement systems and optional retirement programs for public employees and officers in effect at the time of the adoption of this constitutional amendment will remain in effect, subject to the general powers of the Legislature.

Provide that the amount a participating officer or employee contributes to the employee retirement system or the teacher retirement system shall be established by the Legislature but may not be less than 6% of current compensation and providing further that the amount contributed by the state may not be less than 6 nor more than 10% of the aggregate compensation paid to participating persons, except that in an emergency, as determined by the Governor, the Legislature may contribute more than 10% of the aggregate compensation paid to persons participating in state retirement systems.

Provide that the Legislature shall provide for local retirement systems created by any city or county for its officers and employees and shall further provide for a state-wide system of benefits for officers and employees of counties or other political subdivisons of the State which may voluntarily participate, and

to further provide that a state-wide system of benefits shall be provided for officers and employees of cities which may voluntarily participate.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising and consolidating provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and providing for a maximum state contribution to state systems of 10 percent of the aggregate compensation paid to individuals."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. No. 6)

Amending Article III, Section 24 of the Texas Constitution to:

Provide an increase in salary for members of the Legislature from \$400 per month to \$600 per month.

Provide an increase in the per diem rate for members of the Legislature from \$12 to \$30 for each day during each Regular and Special Session of the Legislature.

Provide an increase in the transportation allowance for members from \$.10 per mile to the rate prescribed by law for em-ployees of the State of Texas.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment setting the salaries of members of the legislature at \$600 per month and setting a per diem of \$30 per day during legislative sessions and a mileage allowance at the same rate provided by law for state employees."






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
