Family Hobby of John Sicking Is Tractor Pulling

When the annual Southwest Farm Show opens this weekend in Fort Worth, the Johnny Sicking family will again be there for its principal entertainment event, the tractor pull. The family, featured in the March issue of Progressive Farmer as a family of tractor pullers, includes Mr. and Mrs. John Sicking and their four sons, Kenneth, Gene, Jerry and David, all ardent competitors in the new farm sport since it was made a part of the Southwest Farm Show in 1972.

Mrs. Sicking is the newest of the family's champs. She was Powder Puff winner in the 12,000 pound stock class in the 1974 tractor pull at Gainesville. Gene was first to get into the action when he competed in a local event at Madill, Okla., in 1972. Kenneth was next winning 5th in the SW Farm Show in 1973. Combined the family has been in the money nearly three dozen times. It has eleven first places

and nine second places, and every member has at least a second place trophy. Cities competed in are Gainesville, Fort Worth, La Grange, Waco, De Leon, Greenville, Madill, Okla. and Stuttgart, Ark.

Their best money maker is a used Allis Chalmers 190XT diesel which had a locked transmission after being run without oil. After about 50 man hours of work and \$2,500 in parts they had a hot machine that earned \$1800 in prize money within a year. The Sicking business operation likewise is a family affair. Gainesville Unit Of National Guard Wants Enlistees

Recruiters of the Gainesville National Guard unit are spending this month seeking enlistees of ages 17 through 35 for their outfit, which is identified as Company C, 4th Bn., 112th Armor and located at 104 W. Hird in Gainesville.

Sgt. Donald Fisher and PFC Leon Klutts are the recruiters asking men with or without previous service record. Their goal is to increase the unit's strength 100 per cent or more.

Klutts said the unit is composed of lawyers, bankers, clerks, college students, dairy farmers and various others willing to help safeguard the country in peace time.

Another concern of the Guard is natural disaster such as flood, storm or earthquake. The Guard then is called on to help rescue people and care for them as well as protect property.

The recruiting appeal is directed to age groups from high school seniors to veterans. They will be on duty two days a month for four days pay, plus be eligible for benefits of retirement, insurance and PX privilege. In addition the younger men can get school expenses paid plus a salary while learning a trade. And veterans can qualify for part time jobs averaging a salary of \$50 per weekend.

Writing Contests Sponsored by CCC

As a part of its Fine Arts Festival, Cooke County College has opened its annual creative writing contests, one for Cooke County College students and one for non-students. Divisions for each contest include the short story and the poem.

Any person who does not have full-time or part-time student status at CCC during either semester of the 1974-75 academic year is eligible for the non-student contests. In the past, participants have included homemakers, doctors, farmers, bankers, military personnel, and students enrolled elsewhere than at CCC from junior high to university level.

Dr. Ona Wright, chairman of the English Department and director of the contests, will receive entries until one o'clock on April 4. All entries must be typed and double-spaced. A title page should contain this information: CCC Short Story (or Poetry) Contest, title of the entry, contestant's name, contestant's address. Only the title should appear on the pages of the entry itself. The contestant must not put his name elsewhere on the entry.

No more than one entry is acceptable in each division, poetry not to exceed 100 lines, a short story not to exceed 5,000 words. The only other restriction is good taste in language and subject matter. Awards of \$30, \$20, and \$10 for first, second, and third places in each division will be made on April 21, 10:00 a.m., in Room 412 of the Ruth Schlaudroff Science Building.
