Next Blood Bank Collection Date Is January 22

Sponsoring organizations of the Muenster blood bank, with an eye on the increased quota year's appropriation to the for their next collection date, slight slow-down in the local city. Similar checks are due have started recruiting donors for their collection on Wednesdaý, January 22, when the Bloodmobile from the Red Cross Blood Center of Wichita Falls makes its semi annual visit here. As usual, it will be set up in the KC hall.

The quota hike is a result of increasing demand on the blood bank. David Bright, hospital administrator, said that use of blood in the local hospital plus that used in other hospitals by residents of the Muenster Hospital District has been going up steadily, and the local bank is now in debt to the Wichita Falls center. Accordingly the quota is raised from 80 to 100 pints.

To meet the goal, and hopefully to top it, the sponsors are contacting their regular donors and also urging prospective new donors including students from both high and here Thursday. schools. Sixteen year olds may be accepted if they have parental permission. Those 17 and Mrs. Henry Pagel over do not need special permission.

The local blood bank program is strongly recommended because of substantial savings to the blood users and the hospital. Since blood is given by the donors, patients do not have to buy it, as from a commercial blood bank. The only charge is for collecting, packaging, storing, transporting, transfusing, etc., which amounts to about half the cost of a transfusion using blood from a commercial bank. At the same time the hospital eliminates storage fees.

This arrangement is available to all patients in the Muenster Hospital as well as to residents of the hospital in other hospitals.

The idea of this kind of cigarette is brand new to this column, but it sounds great. It makes sense in that it prevents fire at the source instead of treating everything for resistance against fire. This refers to draperies, blankets, carpets, clothing, tents, sleeping bags and whole forests. If we have to have protective regulations this sure-

ly seems the most reasonable to adopt. Actually a small number of furniture people have been pushing that idea but the Consumer Product Safety Commission will not listen. Apparently they think there are lots more smokers than furniture makers, so they will get less

beefing this way. But somehow we get around to realizing that this is really everybody's problem. The extra cost of fire protection ultimately comes to us, and we pay it because of careless smokers. The whole situation points up bureaucracy's bungling way of doing things. It's like all this agitation for gun control laws and gun confiscation because of the crimes committed with guns. The mistake is in blaming the weapons instead of the criminal, and the only way to get at the crime problem is to crack down on the criminal instead of the wea-
