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The report is out that the next state legislature will be pressured to create a state utility commission for the purpose of regulating the rates we pay for electricity, gas, and telephone service. It seems we have here another case of official do-gooders who are determined to look after our interests, whether we want them to or not.

The implication, apparently, is that city councils all over the state, who have to approve the rate schedules before utilities can apply them, haven't been doing their job properly, so big government has to take over. It's an assumption that just doesn't make sense. Does anyone really think that an impersonal committee in Austin will be as responsive to local people's wishes as the members of their own city council?

**One excuse for creating the commission** is that rural areas have no city council to watch out for the citizens. That may be true, but it's also true that most of those areas get a fair deal anyway. And even if they did not, the solution is not in a group of strangers hundreds of miles away. Instead these people ought to be represented by a group closer to home, like the county commissioners. These are officials who, like the city council, are elected by the people concerned and responsive to them.

So, for urban folks, we consumers already are better represented by our city council than we could expect to be by a state commission. And for rural folks the commissioners court would be the better representative.

**But there's more to this issue.** The first being that it doesn't make sense to abandon a system that succeeds. Texas is getting along fine without the commission. On the basis of 1000 KWH of residential service it has a lower rate than 36 other states, and Dallas and Houston are considerably lower than most other large cities. For instance the bill per 1000 KWH in Dallas is \$21.14 as compared with \$51.23 in New York and \$41.33 in Philadelphia. We don't need the commission to improve our rate.

The same applies with reference to dependability and financial stability. Texas has had no blackouts or brownouts like the Eastern states, which have commissions. And its program to supply for the future is also better established.

**No matter how we look at this issue,** it's hard to imagine how any improvement can be expected by setting up the state commission. We're already better off than most states that have one, and the companies that serve us are better able to keep up the good work.

Facts like these make us confident that our senator and representative at Austin will not support such a proposal. Nevertheless it would be a good idea to let them know that lots of us would appreciate their turning it down. The support from us will feel comfortable when the other side starts pressuring them.

**This is National Education Week on Smoking . . . NEWS** for short . . . which has a twofold goal of encouraging smokers to kick the habit and discouraging them from smoking where they might cause discomfort or even illness to non smokers. A slogan they propose for more general acceptance is "Your right to smoke stops at my nose."

A news release from the State Health Department says that NEWS seeks to dramatize the need for greater awareness of the discomfort smokers may cause to both themselves and others. This refers not only to the odor which many people find offensive but also to an increase of carbon monoxide in the air, which is inhaled by both smoker and nonsmoker. One such case concerns a tightly closed nightclub in Dallas in which a number of people were made ill by the recycled smoke filled air.

**Considering that only a third of the people are smokers,** these points deserve serious thought, and public attitude is gradually moving in that direction. Many public places that used to permit smoking do not permit it now. Probable reasons are the anti smoking campaigns of recent years resulting in decreasing numbers of smokers but also

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## Alcoholism Will Be Discussed at Local Meetings

The staff of Muenster Hospital as well as other groups of the community will soon have an opportunity to attend an educational program on alcoholism and ways of treating the problem in general hospitals.

The opportunity derives from an Alcoholics seminar in Austin attended by Mrs. David Walterscheid, head nurse of the local hospital, on January 6-8. It was sponsored by the Texas Hospital Association in cooperation with the Texas Council on Alcoholism.

Muenster Hospital was one of 36 in Texas invited to send a representative to the seminar on a grant, subject to an understanding that information received there would be made available to the community. A number of programs on the subject were presented and each person attending was invited to choose the one he or she preferred to present. The sponsors then will provide the various materials included in the program. Mrs. Walterscheid said hers are expected soon, and when they arrive she will be permitted to use them for five weeks.

Her first presentation will be to the Muenster Hospital staff. It will promote an overall better understanding of alcoholism and tell recommended ways of treating it in a general hospital. After that she will be willing to appear at meetings sponsored by local organizations.

David Bright, hospital administrator, said he is very pleased with Muenster's prestige in being one of the state's 36 selected to attend the seminar, and even more pleased that the community can have the benefit of the latest thinking on alcoholism.

## Bloodmobile Will Be Here Wednesday

Another semi-annual deposit in Muenster's blood bank will be made next Wednesday during the regular visit of the bloodmobile from the regional Red Cross Blood Center of Wichita Falls.

Facilities for collection will be set up in the KC hall from 2 to 7 p.m. The center's technicians will accept the blood and personnel from the hospital and the hospital auxiliary will assist them.

The quota is 100 pints, an increase of 20 over that of previous bloodmobile visits. The reason, as explained by David Bright, Muenster Hospital administrator, is that blood used by the local hospital plus that used in other hospitals by residents of the Muenster Hospital District has been increasing. As a result the local bank is overdrawn at the blood center. To square the account and also provide for continued increased need, a new goal of 100 pints has been adopted.

To meet it, and hopefully to top it, the sponsoring organizations — KC, VFW and Hospital Auxiliary — are soliciting more extensively. Besides reminding the regular donors they are contacting prospective new ones. Also, they have invited students from both local schools and the Lindsay school. Sixteen year olds may give if they have a slip indicating parental permission. Those 17 years and older do not need the special permission.

## Sister Frances Hofbauer Dies

Sister Mary Frances Hofbauer, 68, a member of the Olivetan Benedictine nuns for 48 years died Saturday at the order's convent in Jonesboro, Ark.

She had been in poor health for about two years after a light stroke left her slightly paralyzed, but continued teaching at Holy Souls School in Little Rock. A medical exam on October 12, while she was at the convent for dedication of its new home, revealed that she had cancer, and she did not report back to her teaching assignment.

Funeral services for Sister Frances were held at 2 p.m. Tuesday in the convent chapel and burial followed in the order's cemetery on the convent grounds. Attending from here were Mr. and Mrs. Clem Hofbauer and their daughter, Mrs. Wm. Hermes.

Sister Frances, formerly Gertrude Hofbauer, was born at Tours, Tex., on March 31, 1906, a daughter of the late Joseph and Louisa Hofbauer. The family moved to Muenster in December 1911, and she attended Sacred Heart School.

She entered the convent in June 1924 and made her profession as a member of the order on August 15, 1926, the only native American in a class of twelve, the others being from Switzerland. Since then she has been a teacher and attended a number of summer sessions until she received her bachelor and master degrees. She taught in both elementary and high school, spending several years on the Sacred Heart School faculty.

Survivors are a brother, Clem, of Muenster, and a number of nephews and nieces.

## Four Areas Ask to Join Hospital District

Assembly of a new legislature at Austin brings up the subject of hospital districts in Cooke County, an issue that has been cooking for more than a year.

It is related to Gainesville's need of a hospital expansion and improvement program, which can best be accomplished by creation of a hospital district. The program is similar to the one which has been in effect here for ten years.

Proposed area of the district was all of the county which is not included in the Muenster Hospital District. But many of the people who are close to the Muenster district

objected. They wish to be annexed to Muenster rather than included in the new county district.

Four separate areas have expressed that wish in the form of petitions. They are the communities of Rosston and Hood, the part of the former Myra school district which was annexed to Muenster school district, and also other rural area of the Myra community plus the town of Myra. All of those areas include a large percentage of people who have been coming to Muenster — to the doctors and hospitals, the churches, schools and business firms. Since they identified themselves with Muenster in those ways they wish to be identified also with the hospital district.

At the same time the Muenster Hospital District board is eager to have them. Al Trubench, chairman, said that "they have supported us through the years, and we think it is only fair to welcome them into the district." Besides, he said, this is a matter of survival to the Muenster hospital. Many people are inclined to patronize the hospital of their district, "so we want them in our district. We need them to keep in operation." Trubench said that the hospital can't stay open on the business it receives from the Muenster district.

When the new legislature convenes it will be visited by representatives of the Muenster district asking for legislation authorizing annexation. Also it will be visited by a group seeking creation of the Gainesville Hospital District. Hopefully the two will be in agreement over a dividing line between their districts.

An effort toward that agreement is currently under way. Trubench, Rufus Henscheid and Jimmy Jack Biffle had their second meeting last Friday with three people from Gainesville. "The line still is not drawn, but we're making progress," Trubench said.

## C of C Members Begin Plans for Election, Banquet

Plans for the election of officers and the Chamber of Commerce banquet claimed the principal interest of Muenster C of C members at their luncheon meeting Tuesday. Following discussion they voted to let directors pick the date, near the end of February, and also decide on the place, menu, program and other related details, and to name a nominating committee for the election.

They also decided to reduce the fee for individual membership from \$15 to \$12.50 a year, which is half the charge for membership of a business firm.

Another decision was to change the March meeting from the second to the first Tuesday, the purpose being to schedule the appearance of Dennis Engelke, field representative of the Division of Community Services in the Texas Department of Community Affairs of the Governor's office. He will spend a week in the area served by Cooke County Electric Co-op under sponsorship of the co-op.

Gene Davenport of the co-op reported on the man's availability. Likewise he called attention to a Chamber Leader's Workshop sponsored in Graham February 13 by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. Members favored sending representatives to the meeting.

**Mrs. Yeats Talks To HD Members On Maintenance**

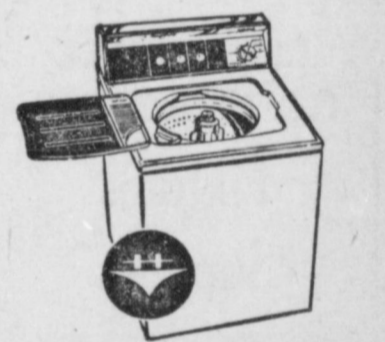

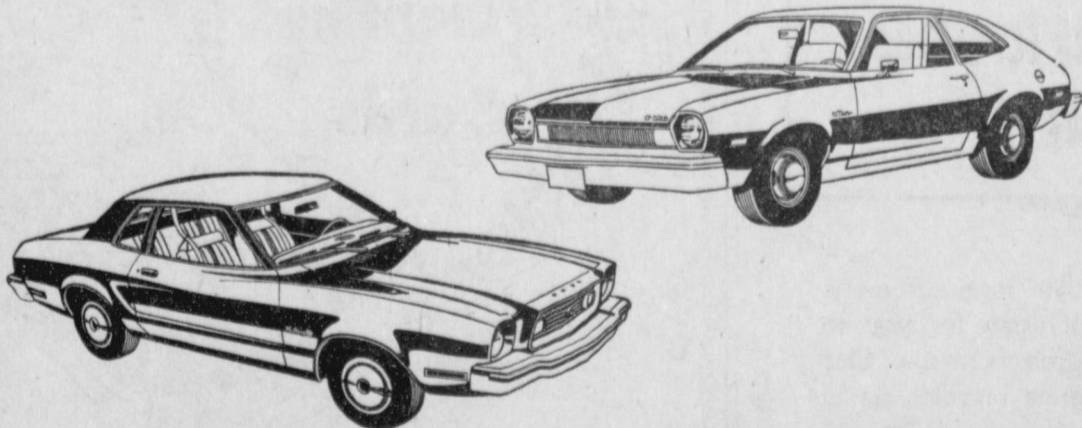
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
