Muenster Mutual Concert and Dance Reports Moderate For Spring Benefit Losses for 1974 Another of the better years

in the history of Muenster Thursday at the 81st annual general meeting of the organization.

amounted to \$17,772.43 and ter. other operating expenses upped the total cost of operation to \$35,784.55. Among items included in the expense are salaries and expenses to officers and appraisers, postage and printing and special expenditures of \$7,578.08 for catastrophe insurance and reinsurance.

Total insurance cost per \$100 were 43.5 cents in 1972, 12 cents — lowest in the mutual's history — in 1971, 15.5 in 1970,

Total income for the year was \$76,597.49, which is more than twice the organization's expenditure. The favorable balance enabled the mutual's assets to gain by \$40,812.94 for the year. Total assets now are \$299,079.19, which is slightly below the 2 per cent of total insured valuation as recommended by the state insurance commission.

Sullivant Writes High wind that howled First Bill Passed In 64th Session

Representative Bill Sullivant of Gainesville introduced the first bill to pass either House in the 64th Session of the Texas Legislature. It was designed to take advantage of a bill which President Ford signed into law December 31, 1974, making available federal funds for extended unemployment benefits. Under this measure, unemployed persons in Texas can receive approximately \$5,000,000 in benefits at no additional cost to either the employers or State of Texas.

Council Proposes Parking Ban on Highway in City

Improved traffic control on Highway 82 through Muenster is the object of a proposal to be considered by the city council at its regular meeting on Tuesday, February 3. In that regard it will have an open hearing on a proposed ordinance which prohibits all parking on the highway from the east city limit to Main Street.

As pointed out by City Superintendent Steve Moster, the State Highway Department proposes to establish two traffic lanes in each direction plus a center lane to be used only for left turns.

Total floor space is about 30,000 square feet. The upper level will be occupied principally by office and labortory.

The factory will have capacity to process over a million pounds of milk into cheese or powdered milk in an 18 hour day. In case the product is cheese it will use the condenser to convert the by-product, whey, into condensed whey. The present plant can process about 300,-000 pounds of milk in 18 hours.

The condenser, used for making both the powdered milk and the condensed whey, will not be a part of the new building. It will be added to the present plant.

To supply raw material for the expanded operation, AMPI will have almost four times its present milk storage space. There will be three 50,000 gallon tanks with combined capacity of 1,275,000 pounds, as compared with the present 350,000 pounds.

The receiving area will have accommodations for three trucks each unloading at a rate of 2000 pounds, more than 325 gallons, a minute. Six trucks can be unloaded in less than an hour. The truck will be weighed by a scale which is read remotely inside the

The entire facility will be good looking, inside and outside. Sparkman said that Muenster is fortunate in doing its building when the comment elsewhere to be moved

Another part of the project s a sewage pre-treatment plant. This facility is required of all large plants whose commerical sewage places an abnormal load on a city sewer plant.

Beginning February 1, the majority of motor vehicles operating in Texas may be eligible to use the new "multiyear" license plate, renewable annually for five years of driving. According to Bob Townsley, Director of the Highway Department's Motor Vehicle Division, approximately 9.2 million renewal notices are already in the mail to vehicle owners announcing the

"Motorists will notice no change in the registration procedure this year, said Townsley. "Only the license plate to be issued will be dif-

AUSTIN - Agriculture Commissioner John C. White has advised farmers and ranchers to buy baling wire now to prevent shortages during periods of peak demand.

White said the two major suppliers of baling wire to Texas, Colorado Fuel and Iron and Armco Steel Co., are working at full capacity but are likely to cut back on production if the flow to market is not steady.

"If this happens, there won't be enough baling wire to go around when everyone wants it during the haying season in the spring and summer," the commissioner said.



Use Fertilizer, Not Salt, to Melt Ice on Sidewalks

Using salt to melt ice on sidewalks, streets, and driveways can injure nearby trees, shrubs, and lawn grass, says Neil Tibbets, County Agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Salt may drain into the ground when ice melts and damage the root systems of nearby grass and shrubs," he pointed out.

"Salt in the root systems of trees can cause partial or complete burning of leaves and may result in the loss of valuable trees and shrubs. Patches of dead grass may also result. These effects may not show up until early sum-

He suggests using ammonium fertilizer instead of salt to melt ice. Ammonium nitrate not only melts the ice, but fertilizes shrubs and plants in the lawn.

"Any commercial fertilizer that is high in nitrogen and potassium can be used.

"Care must be taken to use only fertilizer to melt the ice," cautions Tibbets, "as a high concentration of fertilizer in the soil can also damage plants."

Sand can also be used to melt ice on sidewalks and driveways. It provides good traction for cars and pedestrians and is no more damaging to floors and rugs than salt.
