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That guy Ramsey Clark is at it again. The former Attorney General and recently defeated candidate for US Senate, who disgraced this country during the Vietnam war by joining Jane Fonda in treacherous travels and interviews supporting the communists, has been the leading figure in a money raising drive to send medical equipment to North Vietnam. As if to emphasize the destination of that equipment, the co-chairman of the fund raising drive is Cora Weiss, whose pro-communist sympathies have been widely reported in the media.

To date, it is reported, "close to a million dollars has been raised to send medical equipment to the people of North Vietnam in the name of peace and humanity." Like most communist statements this one is intended to mislead rather than inform. It implies that the North is the victim in the renewal of hostilities in Vietnam, and it talks about peace and humanity when the actual goal is conquest and enslavement.

The correct story is that the Reds are presently killing and maiming thousands of South Vietnam women and children by savage attacks on homes and villages. They are the aggressors, not the victims. But Clark and his kind are not pointing out those facts, nor that there is no fighting in North Vietnam, hence little call for medical help.

All of which points to a likelihood that the Red relief drive is getting many donations which are intended for the victims.

Along with this probability we are inclined to wonder also whether any medical supplies are being furnished, even to North Vietnam. When reds get hold of the money they'll use it as they please, which, as most people know, will be to support the war and not to help women and kids.

This all adds up to a rather ironic twist. President Ford has just asked Congress to give military help to South Vietnam but chances of a favorable response seem rather slim. Meanwhile the red-sympathizers, who are sabotaging the best interests of our country, are getting big donations, often under false pretenses, in support of our enemy.

The rate of murder in US cities has more than doubled in the past ten years, according to the FBI. As an example, a Detroit-born resident now has 1 chance in 28 of dying violently. And in many cities people are fearful of their lives when they walk the street.

The present economic strain may have some bearing on this fact. Frustrated and desperate people may turn to crime if they are weak in conscience. But we also have another problem in the public's attitude to crime, as gradually acquired from the fare of violence in many TV programs.

As pointed out by a noted psychology instructor of Loyola U, Roderick Pugh, his impression is that the more people see people getting shot, stabbed or wiped out, the less inhibition they have against doing it. This applies even more so when the disgusting and repulsive side of violence is emphasized.

Another side effect is a tendency to avoid involvement where crime is concerned. Too many people have become indifferent and uncooperative. As when homicide detectives try to investigate a barroom murder and find all potential witnesses claiming they were in phone booths or washrooms. Or there's the cold impersonal attitude, as when people make up betting pools on the number of violent weekend deaths. It seems our nation is building an immunity to the horrors of violent death.

But that's only the beginning. TV presentations are mild compared with those of the R rated movies, which seem to have the goal of portraying both violence and sex in the rawest possible manner. Their intention apparently is to show crime itself rather than a plot including crime. Even the police stories seem to feature the brutality of conflict more than the science, finesse and technicality of law enforcement.

Some apologists for academic freedom claim that the portrayals must tell it like it is, regardless of how brutal or (Continued on Page 10)

## Boundary Decided For Hospital District

The line has been drawn between proposed hospital districts of Muenster and Gainesville and principals are happy on both sides.

An agreement was reached last Thursday night when areas occupied principally by the communities of Myra, Hood, Rosston and Leo were approved for annexation to the Muenster Hospital District and the balance of the county was approved for the Gainesville District.

People of those four areas had petitioned last year to be annexed to Muenster and the district was seeking legislation to authorize an election. However Gainesville was also seeking legislation to set up a district which included the same area. After several meetings of hospital board personnel, a compromise border line was drawn between the districts. It is the boundary which will be specified by each district as it seeks legislation authorizing an election.

In Muenster's case that election will be two-fold, one deciding on whether residents of the four areas wish to come into the district, and the other deciding whether present residents of the district wish to admit them. The balance of Cooke County will have one election to decide for or against establishing a district.

In accordance with the compromise, the Muenster district got its program under way

## City Discusses Ways to Cope With Burglaries

Organization of a citizens patrol as a way of preventing future burglaries or possibly apprehending law breakers, was discussed favorably at the regular meeting of the city council Monday night.

Alarmed by three recent burglaries and the theft of an automobile, a group of four persons met with the council to consider an alarm system to alert officers in case of a break-in and also a citizen patrol to keep the town under observation.

The visitors were Dennis and Al Hess, Norbert Koessler and Arthur Felderhoff. Council members assured them that the city will go along with their program by deputizing the patrolmen and also providing transportation. Dennis Hess was named to make contacts of possible participants and bring the information before the council.

The council also made appointments to the library board and the water board, approved installation of two more street lights, reviewed its insurance program, sold property to AMPI, ordered an election, passed a resolution applying for federal relief in relation to losses resulting from storm and flood, and passed an ordinance banning parking on Highway 82 within the city.

On the library board B. J. Swirczynski was named to succeed Dennis Hess, who resigned, and A. J. Endres and John Pagel succeed Leonard Reiter and Albert Lippe, whose terms expired.

On the water board Henry Weinzapfel, Gene Hoedebeck and Al Walter were re-appointed to another term. Appointments on both boards are subject to acceptance of the appointees.

Of the two mercury vapor street lights, one is a new installation at Hillcrest and Eddy, the other replaces an old incandescent light at Pine and Cross.

Concerning insurance, Earl Fisher outlined the city's coverage of both fire and liability policies.

The property deal with AMPI concerns the water well and reservoir which originally supplied the city and an area of land near the new milk plant site.

The application for federal relief derives from recent designation of the county as a disaster relief area. The city's application will list damages from storms and floods that are subject to help under the federal provision.

The non-parking ordinance is in line with the city's intention to make Highway 82 within the city a four lane road with center lane for left turns. The parking ban was necessary to provide sufficient width. Marking of lanes will be done by the highway department.

An order for the annual city election, to be held on Saturday, April 5, was also passed by the council. Present members whose terms will expire at that time are Mayor David Bright, Herbert Miller of Place 3 and Sue Endres of Place 5.

## Week's Rainfall Measures 2.99 in.

After almost a full week of rainfall, the community again has plenty of moisture. Starting with an even inch on Steve Moster's gauge on the last day of January, the successive readings of the next five days have added 1.99, making a total of 2.99 inches for the past six days.

Before that the January measure had been only .86. So, official readings are 1.86 inch for January and 3.85 inches for the year to date.

## New Brochure Tells Story of Muenster

A handsome brochure which presents Muenster as the dairy and oil center of North Texas — "where German hospitality is a way of life" — has just been received by the Muenster Chamber of Commerce. Featured on its front are a dairy cow and oil rig and the name Muenster in bold Old English, or German, style of lettering.

The eight page folder, which opens to a sheet of 8 1/2 by 13 1/2 inches, has five pages of pictures, showing eighteen scenes of the area, along with two pages of descriptive matter headed by the message, "Muenster extends a warm welcome and an invitation to visit."

Scenes pictured are the hospital, the medical center, the schools, Sacred Heart Church, community center, library, city park, AMPI Plant, Bavarian

Wood Carving, the Bank, A-OK Motel, Hamrie's and Charm Shop, Dress Factory, Hillcrest Manor and cattle, horses and a lake.

The brief story of Muenster describes it as 1600 plus, mostly descendants of Germans who located here in 1890, and its location in relation to I-35 and Highway 82, and Gainesville, Wichita Falls and D-FW Metroplex.

Subjects given general treatment in the account are medical facilities, churches, schools, community center, library, recreational facilities, entertainment and media, industrial and commercial life, local industries and agriculture.

The brochure was sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce, with Henry Weinzapfel as project chairman, and Lone Star Gas Co. cooperating.

## Muenster Stunned by Car Theft, Burglaries

For the second, third and fourth time in less than ten days, Muenster became the target of crime during the past weekend.

The second blow fell last Friday morning when a car owned by Mrs. Willie Walterscheid was stolen from the parking lot behind The Charm Shop.

Next one was a burglary at Muenster Public School in which the criminals got shop equipment valued at more than \$1000 from the vocational department.

And finally there was a burglary at the Fina warehouse resulting in the loss of large quantities of anti-freeze and oil.

First incident of the crime wave came the preceding Sunday night, Jan. 26, when Koessler's Jewelry was burglarized of an estimated \$5,000 worth of watches, rings, necklaces and other items except diamonds, which, fortunately were locked in a safe.

Investigations of all the thefts are currently under way, and officers have prime suspects in two of them.

Concerning theft of Mrs. Walterscheid's car, a 1972 Chevrolet, the only information is that it was parked when she came to work and was missed about 10:30 a.m. It was seen headed west shortly after that and two suspects, whose names are known, were believed to be on the way to West Texas or New Mexico.

Entrance to the Public School was gained by cutting a semi circle in a window glass and breaking it to release a latch inside, and the stolen items were loaded through a garage type door into the vehicle outside. According to Superintendent Bruns the things taken were two welders with hoses, gauges and torches, a hydraulic jack and snap-on socket set. Bruns said the thieves also broke into the band room but apparently found nothing they wanted. The crime was discovered Sunday morning after a student saw the shop door open.

The Fina warehouse break-in occurred during the night Sunday. Dan Luke, owner, said that all was normal when he stopped in Sunday, but not when he came to work Monday morning. He found doors open to three buildings, the padlocks having been cut with a bolt cutter, and his stock of anti-freeze and oil mostly cleaned out. Estimated value of the loss was about \$800. The only clue there is tracks left in the mud by mud grip tires.

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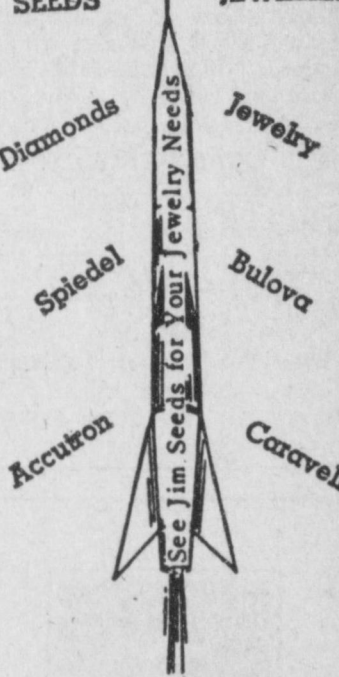

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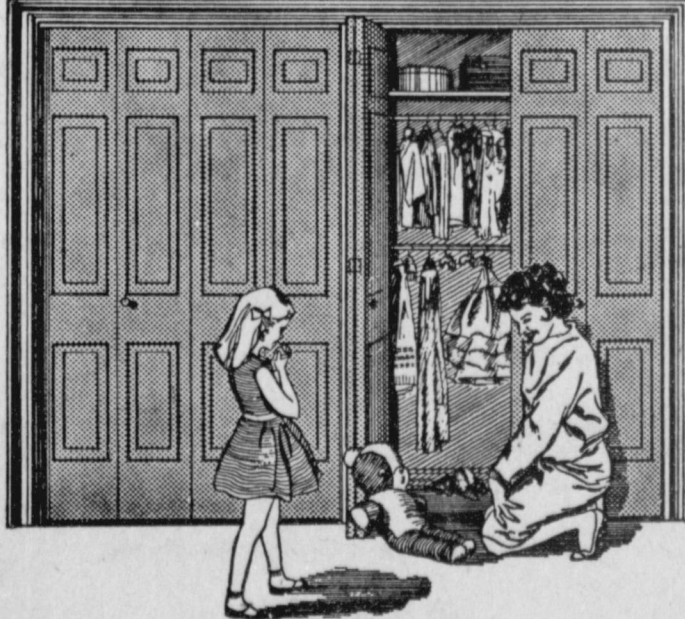

**Tips on Pruning**

by Neil Tibbets

Proper pruning can turn a tree or shrub into a beautiful plant specimen while improper pruning can result in headaches, heartaches and "butchered" plants.

Nearly any tree or shrub must from time to time be pruned so it will maintain a desired size or shape or to remove dead or diseased branches. Some reasons for pruning are:

1. Dead or injured limbs — these should be cut off as soon as possible with a sharp saw.
2. Shaping — many shrubs, trees and roses should be shaped to conform to the original idea you had when you planted them. To encourage spreading, remove the plant's leader; for upright growth, prune side branches; for more open space in the center, remove branches back to the trunk's interior; and for compact growth clip the ends of all branches.
3. Increased — bloom pruning encourages more abundant blooms.
4. Light and air — some plants need thinning to allow light and air to reach the interior.
5. Large flowers — removing small buds that come out beside larger ones strengthens the remaining larger buds, thus causing larger blooms.
6. New growth — new stem growth results from pruning outward growth back toward the main stem. Top pruning

will increase foliage and branches toward the sides. Pruning roots will stop plant growth somewhat but will develop more fruit and blossoms.

If you're planning on adding trees or shrubs to your home landscape this winter, make sure you plant them correctly.

"The first step in planting bare-root or balled-and-burlapped plants is to dig a hole large enough for the plant." "For a bare-root plant, the hole should be large enough to allow the root system to spread out. The plant should be planted as deep as its original soil line. This is usually about two to three inches above the uppermost roots." For a balled-and-burlapped plant, the hole should be about one-and-a-half times the diameter of the ball, says Tibbets. Plant it so that the top of the soil ball is at the surface of the soil.

The next step, says the county agent, is to fill the hole with a good soil mixture such as peat moss and topsoil. Then water the plant thoroughly.

A soil ridge around the edge of the hole will help hold rainwater in dry areas as well as facilitate watering with a garden hose.

"Use fertilizer only after the plant has started growing."

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### "What's the status of TP&L's nuclear power plant?"

**A.** Construction of the Comanche Peak Steam Electric Station was begun recently at a site about five miles north of Glen Rose in Somervell County.

**Q.** "How much land area will be involved?"  
**A.** Approximately 8,500 acres. This will include a 3,200-acre lake adjoining the plant which will provide cooling water for the plant.

**Q.** "When will TP&L customers start getting electric power from the plant?"  
**A.** The first of two 1,150,000-kilowatt units is scheduled to go into operation in 1980 and the second in 1982.

**Q.** "Will some other companies be getting power from the plant?"  
**A.** Yes. The plant will be jointly owned and utilized by Texas Power & Light, Dallas Power & Light and Texas Electric Service.

**Q.** "Why is a nuclear plant necessary?"  
**A.** Rising costs and a shortage of future supplies of natural gas and oil compel use of more economical and readily available fuels for generating plants. Within the next five years, TP&L will reduce its dependency on gas and oil with plants designed and constructed to burn lignite-coal. While it is anticipated that lignite will continue to be an important fuel well beyond the year 2000, the long-range solution to fuel problems appears to lie in nuclear generating plants.

**Q.** "How safe will the plant be?"  
**A.** The planning, construction and operation of the Comanche Peak plant is subject to close examination and rigid regulation by the Atomic Energy Commission and other federal and state agencies. Devices and procedures in the plant will guard against every conceivable possibility which might endanger plant employees or the general public. Today, there are more than 50 nuclear generating units in the United States and there has never been a nuclear-related injury to a commercial nuclear power plant worker or member of the public.

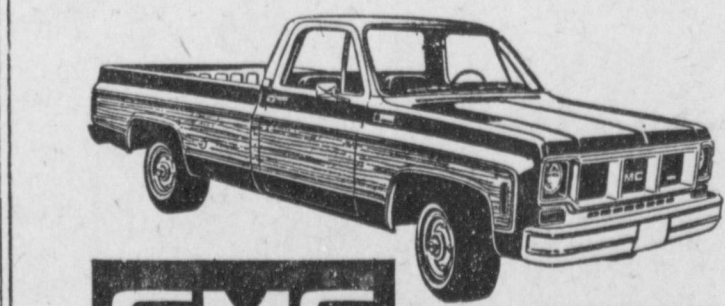
