Good news to the short-sighted is the payment of \$100 to \$200 in tax rebates to the average taxpayer for the purpose of priming our economy. There can be no doubt that some \$23 billion going mostly into retail channels will stimulate more production and more jobs and possibly help overcome the recession that has so many people worried.

But what of the longer range consequence? How about the stupendous federal budget deficit which will add that much more to the national debt and steal even more value away from our money? If we have been concerned about inflation we need to understand that we have the makings of a super worry here.

The new budget deficit, which the president estimated at \$52 billion a few weeks ago, now begins to look more like \$70 billion, and some estimates are running to \$100 billion and more.

Treasury Secretary Simon testified before Congress that \$70 billion is more money than "was raised by all borrowers, public and private, last year or any other year in the past." Imagine, Congress proposes to go into debt that much more when we're already so far in the red that we have very serious fears about a crack-up of the economy.

As seen by Congressman Mahon, chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, the administration is guessing far too low when it estimates that the treasury will have to borrow \$87 billion in the next 18 months. He adds "off budget" borrowing by federal agencies such as Export-Import Bank, Postal Service and others, plus likely continuation of spending increases on new and old programs, then comes up with the estimate that we will borrow \$150 to \$170 billion in the next 18 months.

Commenting on that estimate, Rep. Michel of Illinois says that unless Congress does something about it, the country is headed for a first class fiscal disaster. With it we can expect wilder inflation than any we've seen so far, higher interest rates, a loss of the urge to save and more recession. The economy may even deteriorate so far that government will feel compelled to take it over. And that is a horrible thought. Imagine coming under control of the very bunglers who fouled us up in the first place!

Common sense tells us that the principal cause of our economic trouble is excessive government spending. Year after year of deficits has been followed by the issue of more and more billions of dollars, diluting the value of money already in circulation. To a lesser extent but also a big influence was Labor's demand for wage increases not justified by production increases.

Well, since those things caused our trouble, common sense tells us that our solution ought to begin with the very same causes. Spending needs to be drastically cut. Not only in throwing out hundreds of new ideas that accomplish little more than giving easy money to political favorites, and putting the brakes on too generous social programs, but even undoing some of the wild things that have already been done.

Here we refer especially to the long list of fringe benefits whereby the cost of keeping each congressman is well over a million dollars a year. It seems that the legislators, if really concerned about the threatened fiscal disaster, should be willing to vote some of those benefits back to us the people.

And, of course, they should be less generous in give away to foreigners, many of whom return our kindness with hostility. Also they need to reduce rather than expand the welfare program. Beneficiaries don't need to be spoiled. They can and should make a few sacrifices while accepting the taxpayer's help. In their own self interest they ought to realize that the system now helping them is near a crash, and their help is needed to save it.

While making a conscientious effort to trim away the non essential spending, our Washington leaders could and should take the lead in restoring some sound thinking to society in general. Greed, another cause of inflation and general economic distress, has been mostly the public's fault. Wages and prices have been

Christopher Fette Muenster Native Dies in Georgia

Christopher Fette, 62, a Muenster native, died last Thursday in his home at Statesboro, Georgia, after an illness of several years.

Burial with military honors was held at noon Saturday under direction of the Barnes Funeral Home and a Funeral Mass was celebrated Sunday morning in the parish church of the deceased in Statesboro.

Chris Fette was born in Muenster on October 12, 1912, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Herman Fette. While an infant he lost his father in a dynamite accident and his mother was married later to Henry Trachta. Dick and Dave Trachta, who attended the burial, are his half brothers.

After attending school in Muenster Chris joined the Army and transferred later to the Air Force. He and his wife, Alma, were married in Lawton, Okla., in September, 1940. After World War II he continued in the service until 19 years ago and has lived at Statesboro since then.

Survivors are his wife; two sons, Tom of Atlanta and Joe of Chicago, and his half brothers Dick and Dave Trachta.

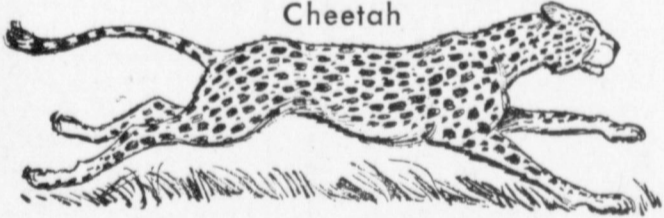

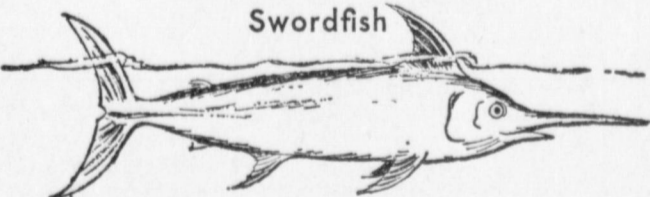

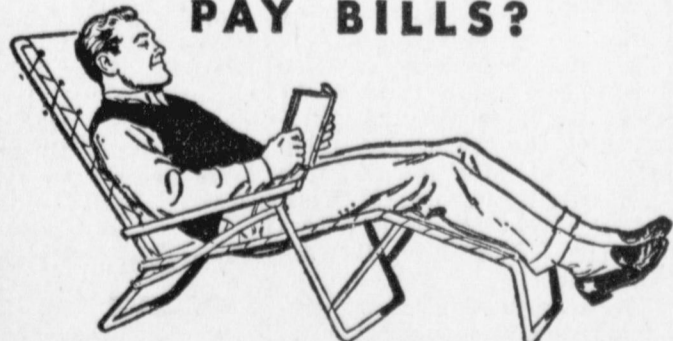

TP&L customers want to know:

"How do rising fuel prices affect my electric bill?"

Texas Power & Light generating plants require enormous quantities of natural gas, lignite coal and, when deliveries of gas are curtailed, fuel oil, to produce electricity.

TP&L's 1974 fuel costs were more than double the costs in 1972, and will be more than \$160,000,000 in 1975, 70% greater than in 1974.

Unlike most businesses, we cannot raise the basic price of electricity as the costs of producing it go up. Our rates are established and altered only by resolution or ordinance of City Councils. For this reason, TP&L, and virtually every electric company in the nation, has a fuel adjustment provision in its rates.

When TP&L's cost of boiler fuel exceeds 20 cents per million BTU's (the equivalent of 1,000 cubic feet of natural gas), the adjustment provision permits us to pass on to our customers the additional cost. We make no profit on the fuel.

Beginning this month, a notation on your electric bill will show what the per-kilowatt-hour fuel charge is for the month. Multiply this amount by the total number of kilowatt-hours on your bill and you have the fuel adjustment charge. Every customer pays the same fuel adjustment rate for each kilowatt-hour used.

"What is TP&L doing to offset rising fuel prices?"

To offset the rising prices of natural gas and fuel oil, TP&L is constructing large generating units which will use relatively low cost lignite coal. Two such units have been in operation since 1972. Eleven additional units are scheduled to be placed in service in the period from 1975 to 1982.

We want our customers to know why the fuel adjustment charge is necessary and how it affects the price of electric service.
