While we're hearing the sad predictions of increasing energy prices because of the Iranian situation, it is interesting to note that some knowledgeable people consider our own government as much an offender as the OPEC nations. Representative Guy Vander Jagt of Michigan, speaking before the annual meeting of the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association, said that 30% of the power cost to consumers is used in paying for regulations. He says that if this country is to successfully meet the challenge of inflation it must reduce the cost of regulation.

The egg heads of Washington claim to have the public's interest at heart when they insist that Easterners must have the privilege of buying Texas produced natural gas for less than Texans can buy it. Likewise they decree that crude oil produced in older fields must sell at less than \$4 a barrel. Can anyone say why domestic producers should be limited to this puny price while as much as \$20 a barrel is being paid for the imported oil?

A similar problem applies to the use of coal. Busy-body environmentalists are so fussy about the quality of smoke exhausting from factories and power plants that industry backs away from the enormous investment of installing for its use. All this has reduced the demand for coal, resulting in a plunge of the price from \$27 to \$19 a ton. As a result there are reports that both the pits and the old wells will be shut down. Producers can't afford to keep going for what these products are bringing.

All of which adds up to a ridiculous situation. The country is up tight about the energy crisis while we have enormous reserves in coal and oil, but American business is not permitted to do its thing about solving the problem. In a nutshell, it can be said that all of the problems faced by the consuming public is caused by official interference. If government would simply get out of the way, the energy problem could be solved in both supply and price.

A shocker that few of us ever suspected is that the total federal civilian payroll is at least twice as large as the figure of nearly three billion, which is officially given. As explained by Donald Lambro, veteran UPI reporter in the current issue of Policy Review quarterly, the reason is that the federal government in recent years has increasingly paid the salaries of hundreds of thousands of state and local workers as well as the salaries of hundreds of thousands of consultants, many of whom are former regular government employees.

He says that government consulting in the capital has multiplied into a \$2 billion-a-year industry in which government has been able to get around maximum personnel ceilings simply by farming out more of its work, research, evaluation etc. "A good estimate would be that three to four million persons are paid by the federal government through consulting contracts, research grants and payments made for the wages of state and local government employees. Secretary Califano of HEW recently testified to a Senate Appropriations Committee that his department pays the salaries of 980,217 persons who work for think tanks, universities and state and local governments. This is in addition to 144,256 regular HEW employees."

Lambro says that government consulting is even more exasperating because there is near unanimous agreement, both in and out of government, that a great deal of the work is of negligible value. In its Fiscal 1978 report on HEW's appropriations bill, the Senate Appropriations Committee admitted that it was "unaware of any instance where a consultants' recommendation has produced a significant program improvement."

The legislators who have a yen to reduce red tape and expense in government could not find a better subject to justify their efforts than this consulting rip-off.

Lots of people all over the country felt that the constitution and human rights had been betrayed on October 6 last year, when the liberals of Congress passed a joint resolution extending the period for ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment 39 months beyond the seven years that was originally de-

Opinions Aired on Bond Election for Building at CCC

A plea for support of the upcoming bond election to finance new construction of Cooke County College was presented Tuesday by Dr. Alton Laird, president of CCC, at the regular meeting of Muenster's Chamber of Commerce.

He described the proposed building as a multi purpose building including an auditorium, cafeteria, classrooms, office space and a number of other facilities to restore space that has been taken up by expansions of the past. He said the addition would be a valuable asset to the college besides providing adequate and attractive space for a variety of city and community activities.

The proposal is for a \$2.4 million structure to be financed by a \$1.5 million tax bond issue plus a \$900,000 issue to be supported by student use fees.

The tax bond would require a rate of 10 cents per \$100 of valuation, which actually amounts to restoring a 10 cent tax which recently ended with retirement of a debt at the college.

Objection to Dr. Laird's proposal was voiced by Leonard Endres, who stated that a considerable portion of the cost appears to be intended for accommodating the city of Gainesville. He felt that the balance of the county should not be expected to pay for that purpose. In his opinion the proposal would merit more support if it were limited to the needs of the college.

Progress Noted in Germanfest Plans

More progress on plans for Germanfest were revealed Tuesday in a report by General Chairman Alvin Fuhrman at the regular meeting of the Muenster Chamber of Commerce.

Following Monday's meeting with the festival committee, he said that entertainment plans are complete and some details on traffic and parking have been decided. The parking problem has been referred in great part to Dick Ferber who has accepted the job of parking coordinator.

To assure a free flow of traffic all the time, parking will be banned on streets adjoining the park. This applies to Cross, Maple and the new road beside Hwy. 82 which will likely be in use as a detour during Germanfest, while demolition of the overpass is expected to be under way.

Parking assured up to now is on the vacant lots across the creek from the park and the Stoffel lots south of Cross St.

The proposed shuttle buses from up town to the park are not working out, Fuhrman said. The principal problem is in finding drivers with the proper license. A trailer service for the job is under consideration. The committee still has hopes for a system of up-town parking and transportation to the park.

Provisions for security are also being considered. The intention is to ask for deputies from the city police and sheriff's department at the festival as well as members of a mounted sheriff's posse in the parking area.

Final planning for concessions is scheduled Monday night, the 19th at 7:30 in the telephone building. People in charge of the booths are asked to attend and submit a list of major items to be sold so that prices can be reviewed and coordinated. Assignment of both locations will also be made at that time.

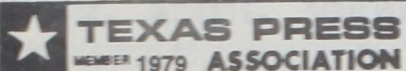

Home Decorating will be the theme of a five-part short course being offered to homemakers in Cooke County. The opening session will be on Thursday morning, March 22 with other sessions held during the following two weeks, on Tuesday and Thursday mornings — March 27 and 29 and April 3 and 5.

The Home Decorating Short Course is being sponsored by the County Extension Service with the Family Living Committee in charge. All sessions will begin at 9:30 a.m. and last until 12 noon.

The classes will include practical design information that will help homemakers make wiser, more satisfying choices in the selection, coordination, and arrangement of home furnishings.

The opening session will include the use of line, form, color, texture, balance, rhythm and emphasis. Other sessions will cover: furniture and selection, wall and window coverings, floor covering, accessory use in the home, and other topics related to home decorating.

The first session will be conducted by Mrs. Pat Seaman, State Housing Specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Other programs will be conducted by Shirley LeJune, home decorator from Sears working in the Denton Sears Store; an Interior Designer from Sanger Harris in Dallas; and Linda and Ted Newman from Bohls Furniture.

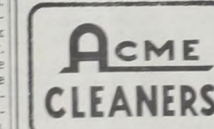
A registration fee of \$2 will be charged to provide for coffee, materials, and other expenses. A packet of bulletins and information will be provided participants.

Deadline Extended For Disaster Loan

Students on SS Warned to Submit Enrollment Report

Social security student beneficiaries were warned today that their monthly checks will stop if they don't complete and return a required school enrollment report.

Gus Jones, Social Security District Manager in Sherman, said reporting forms are being mailed to the more than 850,000 students 18 to 22 whose monthly social security checks currently total \$1.7 billion a year.

"This spring, for the first time, school officials are being asked to verify on the form that the student is enrolled on a full-time basis," Jones said.

"If a student fails to return the form, or the form comes back without the necessary school certification, the student's monthly checks will be stopped."

Students 18 to 22 may qualify for social security payments if a parent is receiving retirement or disability benefits or has died, Jones explained. Those students are required to report on their school enrollment status twice a year.

"We're tightening up on those reporting requirements because some students either are not returning the forms at all or they are stating they are in school when they are not," Jones said. "Payments to students who are not eligible cost taxpayers millions of dollars a year."

Jones said students will have 60 days to complete and return the reporting form.

If a student does not return the form, or fails to have the school verify enrollment as required, social security checks will be suspended and the student's eligibility for previous payments will be investigated.

"If a student received checks for months he or she was not a full-time student, then those benefits must be repaid," Jones said.

Jones encouraged any student who needs help in completing the form or has questions about it to contact any social security office. The Sherman office is located at 810 North Travis. The phone number is 893-4654. Office hours are from 9:00 a.m. to 4:45 p.m., Monday through Friday, except national holidays.

Anheuser-Busch Gives \$100,000 for Wildlife Support

The Anheuser-Busch Foundation has donated \$100,000 to support massive emergency efforts now under way in Colorado and Wyoming to help prevent the further star-

vation of wildlife in those Rocky Mountain states. The announcement was made by August A. Busch III, a trustee of the foundation and chairman and chief executive officer of Anheuser-Busch.

Herds of deer, elk and antelope in the two states have become endangered from conditions resulting from heavy snows and bitter cold, the worst winter weather in 100 years, some say.

"Wildlife officials in both states are working heroically to save the wildlife but the starvation toll has already been great," said Mr. Busch. As a result, he said, the Anheuser-Busch Foundation is contributing \$70,000 to a special wildlife benefit fund administered by the Colorado Division of Wildlife and \$30,000 to a similar fund administered by the Wyoming Fish and Game Department.

The money will be used by the respective state agencies to purchase feed and for such other basic purposes as the rental of helicopters and the purchase of other equipment to transport feed to isolated, inaccessible mountain areas where animals are stranded.

Mr. Busch said the severity of the western wildlife situation was reported last week-end through news media reports. The reports indicated western Colorado is the most severely affected region, followed by southwestern Wyoming, where an estimated 7,000 head of antelope are imperiled.

Sullivant Urges Use of Sales Tax As School Support

Representative Bill Sullivant today presented House Bill 241, which over the next ten (10) years would allocate approximately 6.7 million dollars to the school districts of Cooke County and abolish the use of the ad valorem tax for the maintenance and operations of public schools.

In a hearing before the House Subcommittee on State Finance, Sullivant said, "The bill provides for the gradual replacement over a 10-year period of ad valorem taxation by school districts with existing state sales tax revenues. Beginning in 1980, 1/2 of the 4c state sales tax would be diverted to the school districts. Each subsequent year the sales tax portion increases by 1/8 of a cent until 1984. Thereafter, the bill provides for an additional \$83 million a year until 1990, at which time no further increases would be necessary and the use of the property tax for maintenance and operation activities by public schools would be completely abolished. The bill would also mandate that 90% of all the funds received by school districts under this Act would be rebated to the taxpayers in the form of lowered taxes."

Sullivant said that the support of public education by a tax which, as a practical matter, hits only the home and real estate owners is outdated and unfair. A broad-based tax such as the sales tax would give much better support to our schools and fall more evenly on the entire population of our state.
