Since the Vietnam tragedy there have been frequent appeals to forget about the disappointment and carry on with the business of every day problems. These people ask us not to be resentful or point the accusing finger for the failure. "No recriminations," they say. Let's not hold any one responsible for our national humiliation or for giving any kind of help to the other side during the conflict.

Normally this should appeal to the American public. It's the generous the charitable, thing to do. But it also happens to be a means of covering up some of the misdeeds or disloyalties which depressed the country and certainly also helped the enemies. It's easy to understand that certain elements of our society want as little said as possible. They don't want the public to be told what and who are the reasons behind our defeat.

But many responsible people are taking a different view. They think we ought to investigate mistakes in order to learn how to avoid them the next time. One of those people is Mr. John Fisher, president of the American Security Council of Washington, D.C., a non-profit research organization supported by more than 150,000 citizens concerned with national defense and security.

He says that Vietnam is the first war US has lost in its 200 years of history. If we want it to be the last we must analyze the reasons for defeat promptly and carefully. This is vitally important because we are now facing other tests in other places, such as South Korea, Portugal, Latin America and the Mid-East. If we repeat the same mistakes in those places the psychological momentum of Communist victories may lead up to just two choices for us: surrender or World War III.

In spite of those who prefer to hush this subject, thinking Americans, we believe, will agree with the American Security Council. The nation urgently needs to avoid repetitions of many boners, and to do that it has to learn first what the causes were.

Besides there's the matter of a debt to the 54,000 men who died in conflict and many more thousands of wounded, the missing in action, and the other millions who endured agonizing tours of service. As far as this column is concerned, it's OK to forget about the recriminations, but not to just drop the subject. There should be an airing of causes so that veterans and their families will know the score, but more especially to help us avoid another tragedy.

While thinking about America's survival problem, we'll do well to consider also the opinion of Charles Malik of Lebanon, formerly president of the UN General Assembly, his country's foreign minister and ambassador to the US for over a decade.

Interviewed recently by an American correspondent in Beirut, he said that the world's most crucial subject today is its morals. "There is a moral crash throughout the world — it is the greatest problem facing the United States, and Western Europe, and the whole world. You cannot in your country, we cannot here, allow this trend to continue without certain moral and spiritual and human catastrophe."

"When I read present day literature and works on philosophy and theology and morals I find myself before a complete breakdown of any sense of moral order or respect for standards of excellence or of ultimate values. I sometimes reach a conclusion that western civilization is in the throes of collapse, of self destruction, of doubting its own fundamental values, of seeking things that are completely beneath what it has received from its deepest thinkers, writers, saints, politicians, statesmen and artists for the past 2000 years. This is very disturbing and, I find very few voices in high places speaking boldly, with conviction and without compromise on this matter."

Malik suggested three approaches to stemming the moral decline. First halt the decay of family life; second spur the churches to rise to the heights of leadership and challenge and conviction and

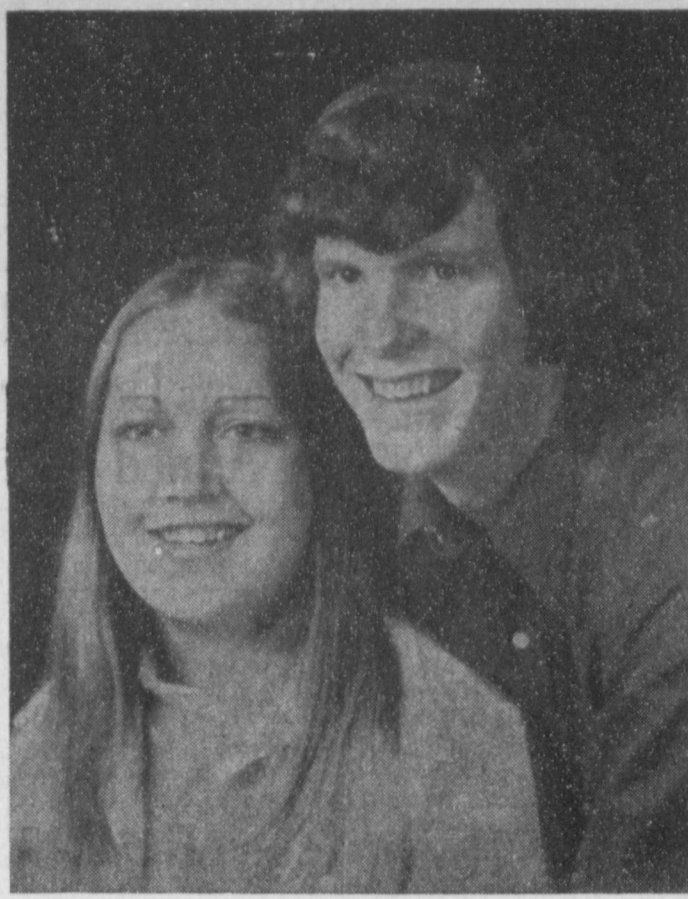
Paula Yosten Wins Spelldown

HS Grads Told of Math Requirement
