**Representative Omar Burleson's latest newsletter points up the fact that this country faces serious problems relating to solid wastes which should be studied together because of the possibility that corrective measures for any one of them would be helpful also in other ways.**

Burleson says that the volume of solid waste discarded per person has doubled in the past four or five decades, and along with this we are well aware that the population has about doubled in that time. That makes our trash heap about four times as big. Estimated weight of it is 225 million tons a year and the cost of disposal is about \$5 billion a year. He quotes the National League of Cities as reporting that about half of our towns and cities will run out of disposal capacity in two to five years.

Along side this fact we are told by the US Geological Survey that the increasing volume of solid wastes is a serious drain on our national resources, that by 1985 US will be dependent on foreign imports for more than half of its supply of nine basic materials. Some studies warn that we are approaching a mineral crisis which could rival the energy crisis unless steps are taken to encourage the recovery and re-use of old materials.

At this time, the EPA estimates, our country recycles only 19 per cent of its waste paper, 18 per cent of its aluminum, 5 per cent of its glass and 4 per cent of textiles. Furthermore these figures are expected to decline in the absence of new developments toward recycling and the need of economic incentives to do so.

We continue with the same old wasteful ways even though it's been shown that a change would pay handsomely in energy savings. The President's Advisory Commission on Environmental Quality estimates that the aluminum industry could save 90 per cent of the energy presently required by recycling its worn out products. Likewise the paper industry could save 66 per cent on its power bill, and the steel industry 50 per cent. The reason those savings are not being applied is that federal tax policy and freight rates favor the use of virgin materials in manufacture.

Because of those facts Burleson proposes legislation to provide incentives for more and better recycling facilities as well as policies to encourage recycling.

When we think of the several problems separately we're aware that none of them makes sense. We keep piling on the junk which is gradually taking up our disposal space when a large percentage of that junk ought to be saved to reduce the decline of important resources like aluminum, paper and iron — and when at the same time it would save precious energy in making many products.

Reasons behind this absurd situation are understandable. Our economy is geared to the old method of doing things and would encounter serious difficulties if the methods were drastically changed. For instance, extensive use of recycled materials would hurt the raw material providers like iron and aluminum miners or wood pulp harvesters. (Continued on page 10)

## Construction on a major addition to the Muenster Telephone Corp. building is due to begin near the end of July and to be completed in 180 working days, according to an announcement this week by the owners, Alvin Fuhrman and W. J. Miller.

B. J. Contractors, Inc., of Gainesville, was awarded the contract for the lowest figure submitted by seven bidders. The addition, to be annexed at the north, will measure 50 x47 feet, and its principal area will be a 34x23 addition to the main equipment room to be used for more local dial equipment along with new toll line facilities which are scheduled to go into service in June 1977.

The new transistorized toll line equipment will serve an estimated 96 lines needed by 1977 for the local system, which includes Muenster, Myra, Forestburg and Rosston.

The change-over will be accompanied by removal of the aerial wire facilities owned by Southwestern Bell now serving the Muenster system and following the old railroad route from Muenster to Gainesville. They will be replaced by a buried cable along Highway 82. Muenster Telephone Corp. will own the cable to the Roadside Park, about half way, and Southwestern Bell will own the remaining distance.

By expanding its toll facilities the Muenster system will qualify for a larger share of the toll charges made here.

Also included in the addition is storage space, a mini-kitchen, rest rooms and a 24-

## End in Sight for City's Persistent Sewer Problem

Better days for the city's sewer department were anticipated Monday night by the Muenster city council and representatives of Associated Milk Producers, Inc., in their discussion at the council's regular meeting.

Included with AMPI's current building project is provision for a sewage pre-treatment plant whereby the milk plant's industrial waste can be conditioned before it enters the city's treatment plant. Also considered by AMPI is a complete treatment plant, the discharge from which would meet requirements of the Texas Water Quality Board.

Whatever the course adopted, it will be good news, ending a long era of overloading the Muenster sewer's capacity with hard-to-treat industrial waste, the load from which is estimated as equivalent to the domestic load from 5000 to 6000 persons.

Monday's discussion resulted from the latest unfavorable report by the Water Quality Board, reminding the city again that sewer discharge into Elm Creek does not measure up to requirements.

## Community Harvest Starts with a Rush

Suddenly the community finds itself going full speed in its annual harvest rush. Combines got started in many fields Monday after waiting through the latter part of last week for ground to dry sufficiently for the heavy machines to operate on it.

The grain had been ready before, hence it was in fine harvesting condition Monday when the combines could get to it. And as they begin, farmers are hoping and praying that the good start will continue for ten days to two weeks. That, according to local grain dealers, would be enough to finish the harvest.

Compared with last year the season is arriving about two weeks late. On June 1, 1974, very little of the grain remained in the field. This

## U. Endres Attends National Meet of Planning Groups

Four representatives of the Texoma Regional Planning Commission, including Urban Endres, were in Boston three days of last week attending the annual national conference of regional planning commissions to study additional ways in which they can serve the people of their areas.

Purpose of the commission is to assist cities and towns both technically and financially in a wide range of improvements. Those may relate to trade, health, law enforcement, recreation, transportation, employment, communication, senior citizen programs and various other interests. From that standpoint the national conference conducted seminars to air problems and study solutions.

Attending with Endres were Jerry Chapman, executive director of the Texoma Regional Planning Commission, Les Tribble, judge of Grayson County and Bob Williams, mayor of Bonham. Endres qualifies for the governing board through his elected position on the board of Cooke County College. The Texoma Commission board has 23 members, all elected in the counties Cooke, Grayson and Fannin.

The commission was established in 1966 by Governor Connally following creation of the nation wide organization by an act of Congress. The local commission was one of 24 set up in the state.

Recent help to Muenster from that source were grants for a pavilion and rest rooms in the park and for the local senior citizens program.

time it seems to be delayed by continued cool and rainy weather which had farmers worried a week ago. Then came Monday's ideal weather, a most welcome change and hopefully the beginning of an uninterrupted season.

The flow of wheat to the two local grain elevators started Monday afternoon. Al Trubenbach was first at Tony's Seed and Feed and Erwin Fuhrmann of Lindsay was Number 1 at Muenster Mill. In both cases the grain had a good test and slightly less moisture than the early loads of other years.

As regards yield, the prospects at this time are better than a year ago, assuming first of all that weather will permit all of it to be harvested. The general opinion is that more acres have been planted to wheat, and also that yield per acre will be somewhat better.

County Agent Neil Tibbets quotes official figures to the effect that '74 wheat acreage was about 36000 acres, and estimates, in the absence of required records this year, that acreage now is 40,000 to 45,000. Also yield last year averaged about 25 bushels per acre and is expected to reach 30 or 35 this year.

On the other hand some low areas have been damaged by excessive moisture during the rainy season. Whether that will reduce the total significantly remains to be seen.

A less pleasing factor in the harvest is the market. Locally it was \$2.90 per bushel Monday whereas it was \$3.15 a year ago. That price applied to a bigger yield could possibly bring in more money than last year's crop. But the question is whether the increase will offset the increased cost. Prices of seed, fuel, fertilizer and repair parts were all higher this year.

## Era Judged Third In State Contest On Improvements

In final judging of the state wide Community Improvement Program last Thursday Era was awarded third place out of a field of four contenders, all winners of regional awards.

This is the third consecutive year that the community has advanced to state finals in the competition. It was first place winner in 1973.

As reported to County Agent Neil Tibbets, the state champ is Latexo of Houston County and runner up is Little River Academy of Bell County. Number 4 is Dike in Hopkins county.

The year's success has been worth \$650 to the community; an amount that is re-invested in more improvement to give a head start in next year's competition. Awards were \$100 for winning district, \$300 for regional and \$250 for third in state.

Word from Era is that residents are only slightly disappointed in missing the top rating. They are proud of being consistently good enough to be chosen three times for the state final, including one first place.

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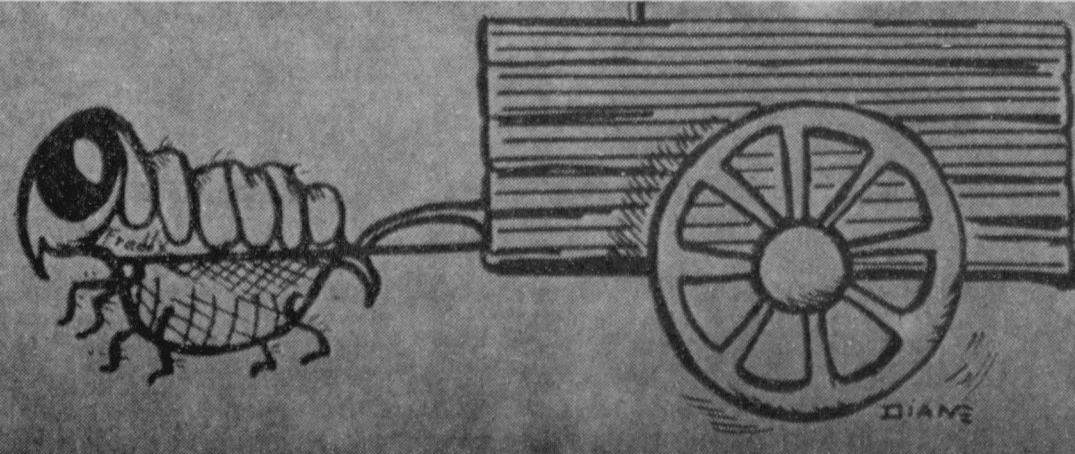

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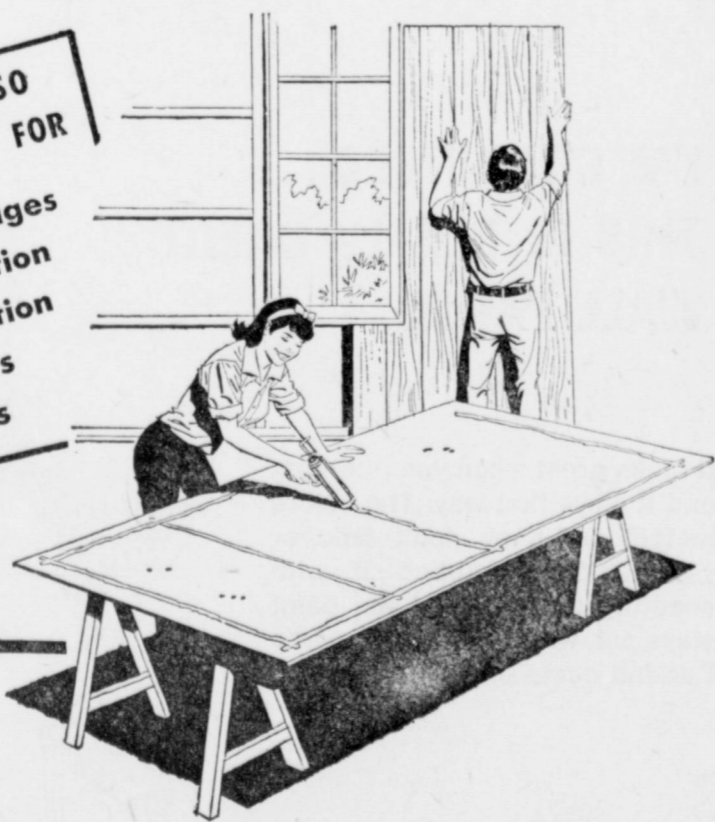

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## John Chilcut of Springtown Dies

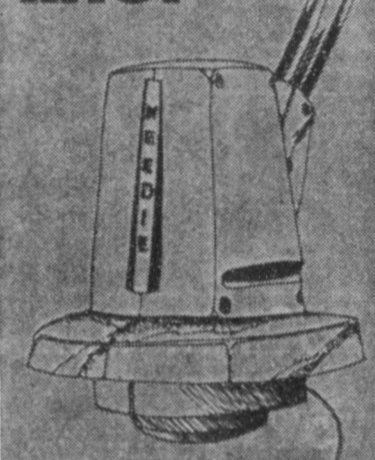
