All of us have heard the merits of "truth in labeling" legislation. It's the provision whereby we consumers are assured that the message on a label tells exactly what is inside a package — its ingredients plus the weight or volume.

It is a good and reasonable law. A welcome departure from the old cynical slogan "let the buyer beware". The point is that the public buys in good faith and has a right to expect sellers to offer their wares in equally good faith.

We should be able to apply that principle even farther — in claims about any commodity or service, including the claims we often get from officials of Washington. It seems some of the lawmakers are violating their own principle, so much so that a US Senator recently urged legislation requiring truth of labeling in Congressional bills.

He said that too many proposals carry tempting but misleading titles, which make it next to impossible to explain votes against them to people who have not read the fine print.

An example is the proposal identified as the "equal opportunity and full employment act." Sponsors claim it would "guarantee the right to useful and meaningful employment to every adult who is able and willing to work."

So far the bill seems to be just what everybody wants. But the means of attaining the stated objective is not nearly as appealing as the title. A major provision calls for creation of a Job Guarantee Office which would fund public and private employment projects "to the extent required to achieve full employment."

With no spending limits set, the cost of this and other provisions could become outrageously high — and it's hardly necessary to explain that taxpayers would have to foot the bill.

Another very unattractive possibility: the bill could lead to a flood of lawsuits against the government, filed by irate workers who are convinced, rightly or wrongly, that they are victims of discrimination in work assignments or salary decisions. Such legislation can be described as a cure which is worse than the disease.

In a somewhat similar spirit, some of the Washington do-gooders are striving for passage of a bill setting up an agency for consumers. This is claimed as another service to us the people, in addition to the many other services which are already known to be a burden on taxpayers.

Just lately the Brookings Institute confirmed what most of us suspected for a long time: that government regulatory agencies have wasted millions of dollars and enormous amounts of energy and squandered human resources while producing little or no benefit to the people.

These conclusions are based on a carefully researched study compiled by ten distinguished economists, educators and lawyers and packed into 397 pages of fine print. These experts recommend less government interference and more freedom in business negotiations.

According to an estimate made by President Ford, the combined cost of federal meddling comes to about \$2,000 per family per year. And now Congress is confident that it will pass a consumerism bill on top of those many other unwanted regulations. President Ford has indicated he would veto the bill, and hopefully there will not be enough

July 19 Set for Vote to Extend Hospital District

The election for expansion of Muenster Hospital District has been definitely set for July 19. Al Trubenbach, president of the district, said Tuesday that legal technicalities relative to the election have been completed, and official order for the election is number one on the agenda for next Wednesday night's board meeting.

In effect the election presents a choice to Myra, Hood and Rosston communities of joining Muenster Hospital District or becoming a part of the proposed Gainesville Hospital District, which will include all of the county except area within the Muenster District. The Gainesville election is scheduled to follow Muenster's, which will determine boundary lines of the proposed Gainesville district.

Trubenbach said that this election has been requested by residents of the three communities, who consider themselves as patrons of the hospital and the town. If not well-liked by the town, it is not well-liked as district members many of them would feel inclined to end the present relationship.

That would be bad, he added. The Muenster Hospital needs its neighbors more than the neighbors need it.

Rattler Killed on Huggins Farm May Be Area's Largest

A rattlesnake which may be the largest ever found in this area was killed last Thursday on the O. E. Huggins farm in the Marysville Community. It measured 70 inches long, without a head, and 9 inches in circumference.

The reptile was found by Mr. Huggins' grandson, Michael Doughty of Keller, near a pond where he was about to start fishing. Dogs that were with him promptly took on the snake while the boy raced back toward the house screaming that he'd found the biggest rattler he ever saw. Mr. Huggins grabbed his .22 rifle and headed for the commotion caused by his excited dogs dealing with the snake. One well aimed shot with a hollow nose bullet tore off the rattler's head.

In the struggle, however, the snake almost disposed of its principal adversary, a big German shepherd which until then was winner of all skirmishes with snakes. This time the snake got a decisive strike at the side of the dog's head.

The animal, taken to Veterinarian Dr. Tisdale for anti venom treatment, survived a few days of severe swelling and obvious agony, and was reported Monday to be on the way to recovery.

Only 14 big rattles were found on the snake, the absence of small rattles indicating that it had lost them in previous activity.

C of C Plans Festival and Hears of New Milk Plant

A special feature of the meeting was a talk by Vernon Sparkman, manager of AMPI. He said that the modern new plant now under construction will be an asset to the association and its members as well as to Muenster.

The factory will have a special distinctive appearance with three tall milk storage tanks resembling a cluster of silos. Each of the tanks will hold 50,000 gallons of milk, which figures to more than a million pounds.

The plant will have the capacity to process all of that milk into cheese in one day, and also to condense the by-product whey into marketable whey. In case dried milk has a better market than cheese the condenser will be used for making powdered milk. In either case the factory's capacity will be about three times that of the present plant.

Sparkman explained that the function of the local plant is to balance the milk market.

Primary objective of AMPI is to sell fresh milk for direct sale to the public. This milk carries the higher price. Next objective is to make the most profitable use of milk left over after demand for raw milk has been satisfied. The new plant is the last word in profitable processing of the surplus milk.

According to AMPI estimate, the building should be finished by October 15 and installation of equipment should be finished by Christmas.

Another phase of the improvement program is to remodel the present plant to increase condensing capacity. Powdered milk and condensed whey will be made there and cheese in the new building.

TP&L Asks For Rate Hike

Texas Power & Light Company will ask the Muenster City Council to approve an electric rate hike which will increase the Company's revenues from the sale of electric service an average of 11 percent.

Bill Bedrick, TP&L manager, filed an application with the City requesting to appear before the City Council to discuss the increase.

The increase would be effective with customer bills rendered October 1, 1975.

This would be the fourth general TP&L rate increase in the 63-year history of the Company. TP&L has had several voluntary rate reductions over the years.

Even with the increase, the average residential cost per kilowatt-hour will be less than in 1955.

Former Resident Carl Mullins Dies

Raymond Carl Mullins, 66, of Tom Bean, former Muenster resident and former owner of Muenster Livestock Auction, died Tuesday in a Sherman hospital.

Funeral service will be held Friday at 2 p.m. in the Tom Bean Baptist Church and burial will be in the Vittitoe Cemetery.

Carl Mullins was born Feb. 23, 1909, in Grayson County and was married September 13, 1927, to Imogene Welch, who died in February of this year.

Survivors are two sons, Carl R. of Lubbock and Thomas G. of Houston; his father, A. E. Mullins of Lubbock; one brother, J. D. Mullins of Lubbock; and five grandchildren.

Weekend Showers Halt Good Harvest

An exceptionally good wheat harvest, possibly one of the best ever for this area, was dealt a rugged setback during the weekend by the weather.

After a week of harvesting it was apparent that the fields have a bumper crop. But then came Saturday night's rain, followed by more rains Sunday and Monday. According to Steve Moser's gauge it added to 2.02 inches, but farmers on all sides of town say they had more, some as much as four inches.

One result is that much of the grain has been knocked down by the hard showers, some too low to be recovered

Baseball Program Gets Assistance From United Fund

Some of the donations made here during last year's United Fund drive came back recently during organization of the current summer programs in baseball and softball.

Henry Weinzapfel, local UF chairman, explained this week that some \$450 to \$500 is deposited here each year to the account of the Muenster Youth Council, and withdrawals each year are used to help support local youth programs. Principal beneficiaries have been the summer baseball and softball teams and the Boy Scouts and Cub Scouts.

Latest expenditure was in the purchase of balls, bats, bases, batting helmets, leg and chest protectors, catcher's mitt and catcher's mask and scorebooks. Uniforms are provided by the sponsors and catching gloves by the players.

Boy Scouts too have had substantial help. The fund has supplied them with a canoe, several items of camping equipment and the ancient model van in which they carry their equipment.

The fund in recent years has also given for eyeglasses or dental work in a number of cases to destitute people. The beneficiaries were school children on recommendation of a superintendent or principal.

Weinzapfel said it's gratifying to know that the assistance being given were originally provided by donations from this community.

Neal Quits MHS Coaching Job to Do Mission Work

Coach Donald Neal, who last year directed Muenster High athletic teams to the over-all best year in the school's history, will not be with MHS in the coming school year.

In a surprise announcement during the weekend he said that he is leaving the coaching profession and, along with his wife, will work as a Church of Christ missionary in North Carolina. The Neals previously had been missionaries for about five years in North Carolina and Utah.

Mr. Neal came here last year from Fort Worth Christian and enjoyed outstanding seasons in all of the major sports. The record was 7-3 in football, 17-8 in girls basketball, 17-10 in boys basketball, district champion in boys track and regional titles in baseball, volleyball and girls golf. Prospects for the coming year were also gratifying but the Neals feel that the missionary work comes first on the Lord's list of priorities.

The change is likewise a disappointment to Sacred Heart School where Mrs. Neal was popular as an art instructor.

by combines. In addition there's the suspense of sweating out the delay until ground dries sufficiently for combines to operate. At best that will be Friday or Saturday, more likely next Monday or Tuesday. Meanwhile there's a chance that more rain will come and further extend the delay.

Principal reason for the delay is the thick stand of grain which shades the ground and also retards drying out by wind.

The lush growth of well developed plants is showing up in yields that are well above average. A few small areas of extra good grain were estimated at near 60 bushels per acre. Forty bushels is commonplace in spite of gaps that were drowned out and losses from straw that was broken down even before the rain.

The estimate is that the community's harvest is about half finished. And the price remains steady at about \$2.90 per bushel.

Parking Banned On Highway 82 Within the City

Completion of the new paving and striping job on Highway 82 through Muenster rules out the legality of parking on that street. So said Police Chief McDonald Wednesday as a warning to persons who may not be aware of the new regulation.

He explained the present arrangement of double traffic lanes at each side with a center lane between them for making left turns. The five lanes occupy the full width of the street and leave no space for parking.

Boundary lines for the center lane are yellow and the two lanes at each side are separated by a white line. Still to be painted are signs with arrows indicating that the center lane is for left turns only.

McDonald warned that hereafter traffic tickets will be issued for parking anywhere on the highway within the city.

Brides Reminded To Tell SS About Change of Name

June brides should remember to change their name with social security. That reminder comes from Gus Jones, Social Security District Manager in Sherman.

"No matter which month she's married in, a bride should give us her new name so we can keep her social security card and her earnings record accurate and up to date," Jones said. "Then earnings she had both before and after her marriage can be correctly credited to the same record."

Earnings women have in jobs covered by social security will determine the amount of their cash benefit — "and not just when they retire," according to Jones. "During their working years, women also build disability, survivors, and Medicare protection for themselves and their families," he said.

TP&L Expects Blackouts if Gas is Banned for Power

Massive electric blackouts and brownouts were predicted by Texas Power & Light Company president, J. F. Skelton, if natural gas is prohibited as a boiler fuel for generators at Texas power plants.

Skelton filed his comments Tuesday with the Texas Railroad Commission during a hearing in Austin regarding the banning of natural gas for producing electric power.

"We are acutely aware of the energy problems in Texas, both now and in the future, and we share the concern of the Texas Railroad Commission with regard to our dwindling supply of natural gas," Skelton said. "But if the Railroad Commission were to prohibit the use of gas as a boiler fuel in the next five to 10 years — or even longer — Texas Power & Light Company would simply be unable to generate the electricity re-

quired by its customers."

He explained that 85 percent of TP&L's generating capacity is dependent on natural gas. Without this important fuel, he declared, "hospitals, schools, industries and residences would suffer massive brownouts and blackouts."

Skelton further explained that TP&L is phasing out natural gas as a boiler fuel as quickly as possible by constructing lignite- and nuclear-fueled power plants.

"Orderly development of this plan depends on the availability to us of a substantial amount of natural gas for many years," he emphasized.

"Speaking frankly, it would be impossible for us to replace all our natural gas-fueled plants with coal- or nuclear-fueled plants in less than 20 years," he said.

Skelton pointed out to the Commission that the engineering and construction of these plants requires many years, plus the expenditure of several billion dollars.

"The new financing necessary is massive, and it will take many years to raise the billions needed," he said.

Regarding the use of oil, Skelton said "it is sheer folly to talk about substituting fuel oil for all the natural gas now used in electric generating plants. Such a substitution would have caused us to burn over one billion gallons of oil last year. Domestic oil is more scarce than natural gas, and imported oil increases our dependency on foreign nations — at a time when our country needs to become less dependent," he said.

He told the Commission that any major curtailment of natural gas during the next 20 years would severely restrict TP&L's ability to supply adequate electric power to more than 2 million people in the Company's 46,000-square mile service area.

IRS Raises Rate To 9 per cent on Delinquent Taxes

The interest rate for taxpayers who are delinquent in paying Federal tax bills, or have been granted extensions of time to file, will jump to 9 percent per year beginning July 1, 1975, according to the Internal Revenue Service (IRS).

A. W. McCanless, district director of IRS operations in North Texas, said today that the higher interest rate will be charged on all overdue taxes as a result of legislation enacted on January 1, 1975. The present rate is 6 percent per year on most taxes.

The government, which now pays 6 percent per year on overpayments by taxpayers, will also pay 9 percent interest starting July 1. Interest becomes payable if the overpayment is refunded to a taxpayer more than 45 days from the due date of the tax return, or from the date the return is received by the IRS, whichever is later, McCanless said.

In addition to hiking the interest rate to 9 percent, the law provides for increasing or decreasing the rate in the future, to keep it in line with the prime interest rate commercial banks charge their largest customers.

McCanless pointed out that there has been no charge in the percentage charged for the late payment penalty. The penalty remains one-half of one percent of the unpaid tax for each month or part of a month the tax remains unpaid, to a maximum of 25 percent of the unpaid amount. Penalties may be imposed on top of interest charged for late tax payments.

New Constitution Cost Estimated at \$1 Billion a Year

Austin — Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that the proposed new constitution could cost Texas taxpayers a billion dollars a year.

In fact, Bullock said, if some provisions such as water projects were carried out to the fullest the total costs could run more than \$11 billion.

The cost report by Bullock's office was requested by five state senators.

The report showed that proposed revisions would directly cost state government \$100 million a year in actual expenditures and would cost taxpayers another \$53 million a year in new taxes on such intangible property as bank deposits and stocks.

Local taxpayers could get hit for an estimated \$771 million a year under provisions calling for local property tax equalization and increased homestead exemptions for the elderly, according to the report.

"For the past several years everybody and his dog has been hollering for a new constitution. Now it's obvious everybody and his dog would have to pay for it," Bullock said.

Bullock said in a letter to the senators who asked for the study that "this evaluation of costs does not in any way reflect on the merits or demerits of any provision of the proposed document."

"But obviously we are talking about big money at all levels," Bullock said.

He listed some of the larger direct costs to the state as including annual legislative sessions \$2.25 million, additional appeals courts and upgraded salaries \$3.52 million, textbook aid expansion \$20 million, a new higher education fund \$14.7 million, state employee retirement changes \$34 million, a state building fund \$6.33 million, and establishment of statewide tax appraisal standards \$6.3 million.

The request for the cost study was made by Senators Peyton McKnight of Tyler, William T. Moore of Bryan, Walter Mengden of Houston, Ike Harris of Dallas and Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells.

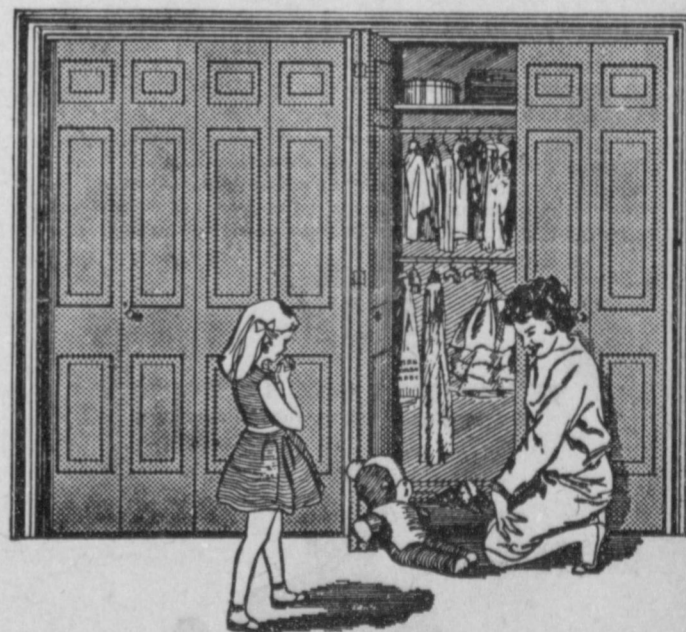

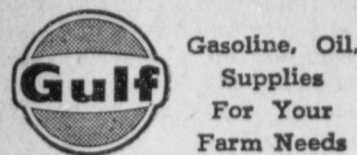

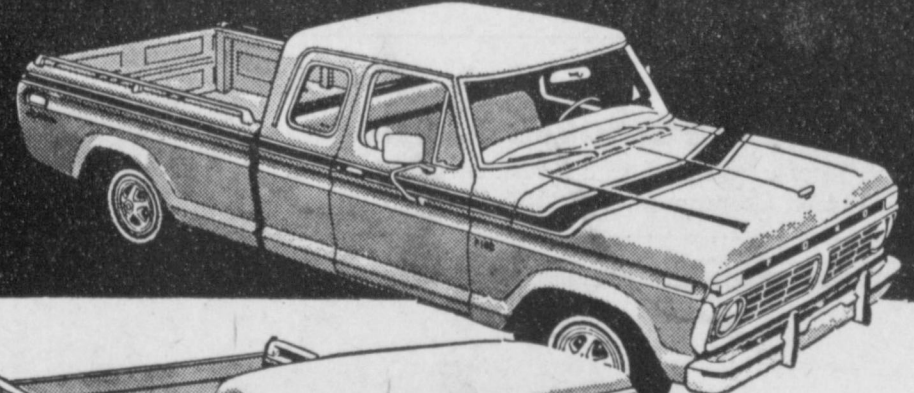
