

Coffee Rationing Begins Nov. 28th; **Use Sugar Book**

Arrangements Made For '42

Monday. ing to information released this week by Rudy Hellman, the market will begin on November 5 or 9th, depending on the weather, and packing will begin as soon as a sufficient number of birds is on hand.

The program will again be conducted by Wilson and Company of Oklahoma City, with Roy Callahan in charge. As regards prices, Mr. Hellman stated he had received no hint so far as to the market's opening figure.

This year's volume is expected to be about fifty percent of last year's when five carloads were shipped at Thanksgiving and 61/2 at Christmas. Principal reason is lack of help, Hellman disclosed. Less territory will be covered this year, and birds in nearby areas are less plentiful than last season, he added

Administration of the marketing and packing project will be similar to that of past years. Wilson and Company leases equipment from the FMA and assumes complete charge. Experience has shown that this packer's nation-wide distribution assures a longer and steadier market than a local organization could offer.

To 1 Pound Each 5 Weeks Rationing of coffee will begin at midnight November 28-one pound

> Consumers will not have to register to obtain coffee. They They will use their sugar rationing book. To get the first coffee ration, the consumer will be required to sur-

render the last stamp, No. 28, in the sugar book. Subsequent rations of coffee will be on coupons taken in sequence toward the center of the book, specifically 28 down to 19

All sales of coffee at retail will be stopped at midnight, November 21, to allow merchants a week in which to stock their shelves for the beginning of rationing.

OPA officials estimated that approximately 93,000,000 persons will be eligible for coffee rations. Ages shown on the ration book issued in May will determine whether the holder is entitled to coffee. No book on which the age of the

holder is stated at 14 years or younger will be valid for the coffee ration. Persons who did not obtain a sugar ration book may get one from the local ration board
