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President Reagan's nomination of Sandra O'Connor to succeed Justice Stewart on the Supreme Court has touched off a wave of protest from Moral Majority and Pro-Life people to the nominee's record on abortion and ERA. The reference is to her support of the issues several years ago as a member of the Arizona legislature. Otherwise her credentials are generally regarded as highly acceptable.

Of course, the first thing to remember is that there would be a howl no matter who was named. In fact, if the choice had been for anti-abortion or anti-ERA there would have been at least as much static from the liberals. So this could be a matter of displeasing the side that is less likely to cause a lot of trouble.

First of all, the President's choice is calculated to please those who have been clamoring for a woman on the court. In addition, her ability and judgment are highly recommended by the Arizona Bar Association, and her political philosophy is endorsed by conservative leaders including both senators, Goldwater and DeConcini. On the basis of conservative principle she is a great improvement over Stewart who was a supporter of the "exclusion" rule, preventing criminals from being prosecuted through illegally obtained evidence. Chief Justice Burger has criticized him for "punishing the public for mistakes and misdeeds of law enforcement officers." In addition Stewart has been consistently liberal on matters of civil rights and abortion. There is no question that the change from Stewart to O'Connor will be a big step toward restoring the basics of traditional Americanism.

And even on the two controversial issues, abortion and ERA, the objection might be rated as questionable. The pro-abortion vote referred to was years ago, but a recent statement says she is personally opposed to abortion. Politicians as well as other people sometimes change their minds. With so many other conservative credentials, it's more likely that she is conservative on those two subjects. It's also possible that this situation is somewhat like Reagan's choice of a running mate in the 1976 campaign. Many objected to the choice of a liberal but the record later showed that he had joined the conservatives. Sandra O'Connor could be just what the Moral Majority wants.

From the side of practical politics, it's also possible that the President has gone a long way toward bringing conservative qualities to the court and is willing to accept a few less positive qualities in the bargain. Even though the nominee doesn't measure up 100 percent to the desired traits she can be a definite asset.

Still another consideration: the appointment of Mrs. O'Connor can improve the president's position in his next nomination. At that time the liberals, who are getting their way in the present nomination, can't complain if his choice changes to conservative.

Regardless of political angles, it looks like a good bet to go along with Reagan in his court selection. He has shown that he is a man of principle and judgment. He is dedicated to restoring the economic, social and moral values by which America attained its greatness, and his record shows that he's trying conscientiously to pick the best people for the job. We can assume the conservatives and the moral continued on page 2...

Chamber proposes downtown 'Mid-Park'

A pint sized park on Main Street is a new improvement suggested by the Muenster Chamber of Commerce at its Tuesday Meeting. The proposed location is the vacant lot across from Hess Furniture and proposed additions are a lawn, sidewalk, benches, flowers, trees and shrubs.

It will be known as the CC "Mid-Park".

Chamber President Dick Ferber reminded members that September is the Chamber's usual time to start Germanfest planning. He said that the festival co-chairmen still have not been named, so the time is ripe for some ambitious hard worker to volunteer for the job, otherwise recommend someone else.

Special attraction added to Harvest Hoedown plans

Something special to add to the attraction of sales all over town was under consideration by the Muenster Chamber of Commerce Tuesday.

Members liked the idea of a display with entertainment appeal rather than sales appeal, such as an arts and crafts exhibit - quilts, antiques, etc. Those things along with any other items that imaginative minds can bring together would be welcome added dimensions to the suggested town-wide sale.

It was proposed to have the attraction under a tent

on the vacant lot south of Hess Furniture, with exhibit space free and limited to residents of the community. However exhibitors are to provide their own display shelves, racks, tables, etc. The main purpose is to show methods and articles and also to sell, but to charge no commissions. Music and refreshments are also considered.

Chamber members voted to endorse the proposal and to provide a tent if the idea is adopted. Larry Kinard is one co-chairman assigned to the project. The other is to be named soon.

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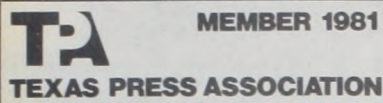
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Sen. Glasgow reports on county assistance

One of the problems confronting the legislature during the past regular session was the need to give local governments assistance, particularly financial, as they were facing a tremendous increase in the cost of government through inflation.


Two bills were passed that gave county governments financial assistance.

The first was S.B. 150 that allowed the counties to keep a greater share of the license tag receipts that they collected. Under this bill, the counties would be entitled to keep the first \$50,000 collected and an amount equal to \$350 for each mile of county

roads up to five hundred miles (this could be as much as \$175,000 more). The counties then would be able to keep one-half of the amount collected thereafter up to an additional amount of \$125,000.

Present law only allowed counties to keep a maximum of \$175,000 whereas the new law would allow a maximum amount of \$350,000 to be kept.

A second bill, S.B. 151, restored the lateral road fund to the counties for their use in maintenance and construction of county roads. The bill provided for a total of 7.3 million dollars to go each year to the rural counties under the Act.

majority will not be betrayed by his choice.

The rash of murders that have been in the news lately, especially those involving rape, point up the fact that it's time to do something about our system of justice. Instead of softness to criminals there has to be real concern for society with penalties severe enough to discourage crime. Regardless of the sob sisters who object to punishment too harsh for the crime, our law should convince the criminal that our first purpose is to prevent crime, and whoever commits it faces a tough and inflexible penalty.

As regards court procedure, guilty criminals must not be excused because of irregularity in obtaining and presenting evidence. If a criminal's guilt is definitely established it should be definitely stated in the verdict, no matter who goofed in the trial procedure.

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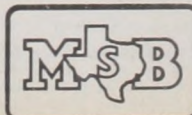

Warm weather calls for salads

As temperatures start their upward climb and appetites turn lazy, let salads act as a tonic for warm weather meals.

Seasonal foods will certainly simplify salad preparations. There are dairy products which reach a production peak during the summer months. Of course, this is also a good time for buying or picking fruits, berries and vegetables, so salads can sport a lot of versatility.

Let the shape of foods suggest a style for your salad. Fruit Tower Salad, for example, is stacked with honeydew, cantaloupe and pineapple rings fit on top of each other to suggest a tower. Soft and creamy cottage cheese is layered between the slices of fruit.

Spinach leaves, sliced hard-cooked eggs, oranges, onion and bacon have been selected for the flavors they contribute to a Spinach Salad. Three delectable dairy foods star in the dressing: cottage cheese, dairy sour cream and snappy blue cheese.

Either of these salads makes a lovely light lunch or supper say Dairy Council, Inc. dietitians when combined with rolls and butter and a glass of chilled milk.

Fruits Tower Salad

- 4 servings
- 1 1/2 c. cottage cheese
- 1/2 c. chopped salted cashews
- 1 Tabl. honey
- 1 teas. grated lime peel
- 4 slices honeydew melon 1/2" thick, chilled
- 4 slices pineapple, chilled
- leaf lettuce
- lime slices, if desired

Place cottage cheese in small mixing bowl. Beat on high speed of mixer until almost smooth, about 5 minutes. Beat in nuts, honey and lime peel. Cover and chill 1 to 2 hours to allow flavors to blend. To serve, remove rind from melon slices. Place a piece of lettuce on a chilled salad plate. Place honeydew melon on lettuce; spoon on about 1/4 cup cottage cheese mixture. Place cantaloupe over cottage cheese. Spoon on another 1/4 cup cottage cheese mixture. Top with pineapple slice and a small scoop of cottage cheese mixture in center. Garnish with a lime slice. Serve immediately.

Spinach Salad/Blue Cheese Dressing

- 6 servings
- Blue Cheese Dressing
- 1 c. cottage cheese
- 1 c. dairy sour cream
- 1/2 c. crumbled blue cheese
- 1 teas. Dijon-style mustard
- 1 teas. seasoned salt
- Spinach Salad
- 1 lb. fresh spinach, chilled
- 4 hard-cooked eggs sliced
- 2 oranges, peeled, cut into sections
- 1 medium-sized red onion, thinly sliced
- 4 slices bacon, cooked and crumbled

For dressing, place cottage cheese in small mixing bowl. Beat on high speed of mixer until almost smooth, about 5 minutes. Beat in remaining dressing ingredients until well combined. Cover and chill 1 to 2 hours to allow flavors to blend. Meanwhile, for salad, combine all ingredients. Chill, covered, until ready to serve. Toss gently and serve on chilled plates with blue cheese dressing.

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Plains Coreopsis (Coreopsis tinctoria)

Cooke County Blooms!

Plains coreopsis is a slender, erect, branched annual up to two feet tall. It grows in patches along roadsides and pastures. It may grow so thick that a field may appear solid yellow in color. Other common names are Garden coreopsis, Golden wave, Tickseed, and Coreopsis.

The leaves are opposite, pinnately divided into linear lobes with the upper leaves less divided.

The plant has numerous composite flowers about 1 inch across. The disk flowers are brown. There may be 7 to 8 yellow rays with red-brown spot at the base of the ray, 3 lobed on the end. The flowers may vary from pure golden yellow to yellow. Plains coreopsis blooms in the spring and early summer.

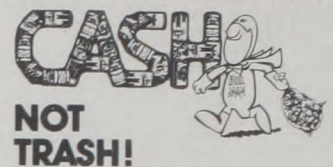

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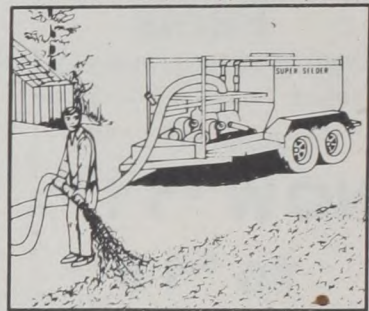

Health Dept. to conduct free clinic

The Texas Department of Health Region 5 Office in Arlington announces an immunization clinic to be held in Muenster at Sacred Heart Community Center on Wednesday, July 22, 1981 from 10 to 12 a.m.

The clinic will provide immunization against Diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis (DTP), Polio, Rubella (red measles) and Rubella (German measles), for infants 2 months through 18 years. (Exception: females over age 12 will not receive rubella vaccine without a physician's consultation and prescription).

Immunizations are incomplete if a child has not received three (3) doses of DTP and Polio vaccine with at least one dose administered past the fourth birthday. All children under 18 years must have an informed consent form read and signed by the parent or legal guardian. If possible, the parent should accompany the child to the clinic. Immunization records should accompany the child to the clinic and be examined by the Public Health Nurse who will answer any questions.

A hypertension clinic will be conducted by the Health Department Wednesday the 22nd, 1 to 3 p.m. in the Community Center. Tests are taken by public health nurses at no charge.

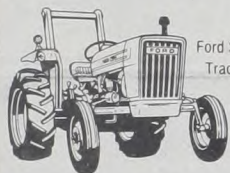

Refreshments were served to 13 members by Mrs. Johnny Lewter and Mrs. Lanita Lewter.

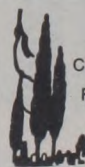

Just warm, not hot

According to TV lingo, the temperature continues to be warm. It isn't hot until it reaches 99. Fortunately, Muenster has had only one hot day to date...it was 99 on July 11...a pleasant contrast with last year when temperature topped 100 on 42 consecutive days.

Drought likewise is less of a problem. Water consumption reached a peak of 595,000 gallons on July 14, a comfortable contrast with last year's peak of 720,000 gallons on July 1. This year's second high was 541,000 gallons, contrasting with 695,000 last year.

According to Water Superintendent Wayne Tate, the city could be in trouble without help of the shallow wells which are being widely used for outside watering. With a potential of some 432,000 gallons daily, they probably produce over 200,000 gallons a day, enough to cause trouble if the water were taken from the city lines. Without the 30 odd wells the city could still be in trouble if one of its deep wells failed.

The new well, just finished, will help relieve the strain when a transmission line is complete.
