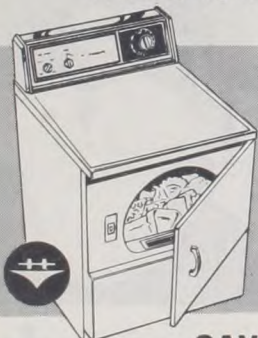
I am positive I would have been in the "steady stream of visitors," because Texas will remain my adopted State.

THE INCOME TAX
Income tax figures for 1978, the latest available, disclose that over \$188 billion was paid by 68,660,000 Americans who had taxable incomes. That figures out to an average of over \$2,700 per taxpayer.

In 1913, before the Income Tax Amendment was passed, the average federal tax paid by an American was \$7. Think of that!

The huge increase of the individual tax burden has been made possible by the graduated income tax. This, of course, is not the total tax burden, or even the total federal tax burden, because this huge figure does not include Social Security taxes, both direct and hidden (those passed on by the employer in the form of higher prices) and thousands of other taxes, most of which are hidden.

In his book, Tax Target: Washington, author Gary Allen notes there are 151 taxes on a loaf of bread, 100 taxes on an egg, 116 on a man's suit, 150 on a woman's hat, 87 on a quart of milk, and 600 on a house.

The dangers of an income tax have been well known by political economists for many years. England instituted such a tax long before we did in America. In pointing out the pitfalls of an income tax, the Victorian economist Ramsay McCulloch said:

"The moment you abandon the cardinal principle of exacting from all individuals the same proportion of their income or their property, you are at sea without rudder or compass and there is no amount of injustice or folly you may not commit."

He continued, "The reasons that made the step be taken in the first instance, backed as they are sure to be by agitation and clamor, will impel you forward. Why not take 50 per cent from the man of two thousand pounds a year, and confiscate all the higher class of incomes before you tax the lower?"

Graduation is not an evil to be paltered with. The savages described by Montesquieu, who get at the fruit cut down the tree, are about as good financiers as the advocates of this sort of taxes."

The threat to individual liberty posed by the income tax was made clear by Bradford Smith in his article, "Liberty

and Taxes," which appeared in 1947. He wrote:

"There is no justification in morals or in the principles of individual liberty for progressive taxation. It is the simple looting through law of the more numerous but less productive by the more numerous but less productive. Its appeal is demagogic, and its result is communism, which in turn is but a transitory stage in the evolution away from liberty into dictatorship. The endorsement of communism, and sincere endorsement of progressive taxation, motivated often by generosity, is unwittingly one of the worst forces undermining individual

liberty in America."

The institution of the progressive income tax is one of America's greatest errors. The loss of freedom, as government has gained more and more power, has occurred because of the funds made available by this stifling tax.

Karl Marx knew what he was doing when he included the progressive income tax among his priority objectives outlined in the Communist Manifesto to destroy the institution of private property.

If America is ever to reverse the current drift toward totalitarianism, it will have to repeal the Income Tax Amendment.

CAPITOL UPDATE

One of the most urgent tasks awaiting Congress after the Labor Day recess will be passage of a new farm bill, which will set forth federal agriculture policy for the next four years.

The aim of a federal farm policy is to induce elements of predictability into an inherently unpredictable business. Agriculture products are subject to some of the most unpredictable free market conditions prevailing. Prices can fluctuate widely, depending on supply, demand and other forces in the economy.

Yet, the farmer must rely on many other segments of the economy which are regulated -- labor, energy and a host of industries which manufacture needed equipment and supplies. That means his costs do not fluctuate with the price he receives for his product.

In order to make it possible for the farm to stay in business -- and thus continue to supply adequate amounts of food for our people and the export markets -- the federal government must provide basic economic stability through its policies.

From the Great Depression until the 1960s, farm policy involved direct federal involvement in farmers' planting and marketing decisions. During the 1960s, the program evolved into a more equitable system of price supports, which allow the marketplace to allocate supplies. In essence, price supports now normally are used to provide a minimum price floor, and to allow market forces to determine commodity prices.

Under this system, the farmer has assurance of a minimum price, which gives him a basis for making intelligent market decisions.

This year, farm programs -- as all federal non-defense programs -- will be reduced somewhat and become the subject of greater scrutiny.

The Senate Agriculture Committee has gone to great lengths to produce, a bill which maintains a reasonable farm program and still does not result in unacceptably high federal outlays. This is essential, because if we are unable to control federal spending, the economic chaos which will result will hurt agriculture just as it will every other segment of the economy.

Both the Administration and the Congress are keenly aware of the importance of agriculture, which continues to be the nation's largest industry. In fact, economic activity generated by agriculture accounts for 20 percent of our gross national product, employs one fifth of our labor force, and represents about one-fifth of all U.S. exports to foreign nations.

In Texas, every dollar in farm sales generates more than \$3 to the general economy of the state. Texas leads the nation in production of cattle, cotton and sorghum, and is the second-leading state in agriculture cash receipts.

Therefore, I can assure you I will work for prompt passage of the farm bill. Failure to pass this legislation by September 30 could cause chaos in agriculture as well as the overall economy, because on that date, the current bill expires and without a new one we will revert to the 1949 act. Both the administrative headaches and the cost of going back to the old system make it unthinkable to allow that to happen. While stop-gap action likely would continue the status quo, Congress must not delay definitive action on this vital issue.

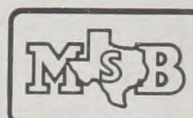

1981-1982 school term begins at CC Development Center

Cooke County Development Center in Gainesville, announces its fall schedule for 1981-82 school term. Classes began August 31 and will follow Gainesville Independent School District schedule in regard to holidays and teacher work days.

Cooke County Development Center is operated jointly by Cooke County Special Education Services and Mental Health - Mental Retardation Services of Texoma. Various classes are held which educate and train children who have one or more handicaps, such as learning disability, physical handicap, speech and language delay, mental retardation, or emotional disturbance.

Related services include occupational therapy, physical therapy, speech therapy, physical education, and counseling from mental health professionals, if needed.

An infant stimulation class is offered for infants and young children under the age of three years, who have developmental delay in one or more areas, such as speech and language, motor skills, learning ability, or self-help skills. Early intervention has proven to be very successful in remediating or improving young children's abilities before they reach school age. Mrs. Pat Eldredge and Mrs. Kathy Patterson will be in charge of this class.

Various other classes for children from age 3 through

21 will be offered with teachers and aides previously announced by Cooke County Special Education Services.

Referrals for any of the classes at Cooke County Development Center can be made by parents, teachers, physicians, or other professionals. Every referral goes through a screening and testing process to determine if the child is eligible for services. A decision for enrollment is made by a committee composed of the parent, teacher, and professionals involved in the testing process.

Cooke County Development Center also operates a sheltered workshop and vocational training program all year. This program involves work training, personal and social adjustment classes, basic education

classes, vocational preparation classes, vocational evaluation, and drivers' education classes. To inquire regarding any of the above services, contact Janis Cravens, director of Cooke County Development Center at 668-7142, or 701 Muller Street in Gainesville.

Estimated tax installment due

The third installment of estimated Federal tax payments on 1981 individual income is due by September 15, 1981, the Internal Revenue Service says.

This installment should be paid using declaration voucher No. 3 found in the Form 1040 ES-package, "Declaration of Estimated Tax for Individuals."

Taxpayers whose anticipated income changed during 1981 may have to file an amended declaration. Space is provided in the estimated tax package to compute an amended estimate.

For more detailed information, the IRS publication 505, "Tax Withholding and Estimated Tax," is available free by calling the IRS forms/tax information number in the local telephone directory.

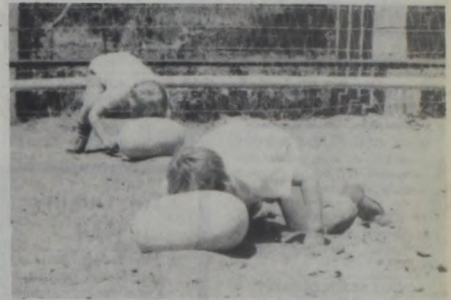

## Cooke County Blooms!

### American Basketflower (Centaurea americana)

The American basketflower is an erect annual up to 4 feet tall. The leaves are sessile, alternate, with the upper leaves lanceolate up to 2½ inches long. The lower leaves are larger and broader.

The plant has composite rayless flowers at the end of the branches. These are disk flowers, thistle like with pink or purplish linear lobes.

The fruit is achenes topped with numerous bristles.

The American basketflower is a common weed in old fields, waste places, roadsides, closely grazed pastures in most of the state except the High Plains. It is also known as Star-thistle and Powderpuff thistle.

This is an attractive wildflower. It is widely advertised in nursery catalogues. The flowers are very fragrant and make excellent cut flowers for bouquets except that they close at night.

Plants growing in the red sand regions bear flowers of a darker lavender color than those growing in the black lands. American basketflowers bloom from May to August.



## All brands and marks on Texas livestock must be re-recorded

Texas livestock producers must re-record all brands and marks on their livestock with the county clerk's office in the counties where they raise livestock, beginning Aug. 30, 1981, says Don C. King, secretary-general manager of Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association.

The law provides for a six-month re-registration period. After Feb. 28, 1982, any unrecorded brand becomes available for use on a "first-come" basis.

The Texas brand law, passed in 1971, was the subject of a recent ruling by Texas Attorney General Mark White that says owners of marks and brands must re-register them during the same six-month period every 10 years, without regard to when they originally recorded them. A small fee is charged for each re-recording by the county clerk.

The law also notes that it is illegal to brand livestock without first properly recording the brand with the county clerk in the county in which the livestock are held, King said.

The primary objective of the brand law is to provide the county clerks with an accurate, updated report of marks and brands every 10 years.

Producers operating in several counties must re-record their marks and brands in each county because the county clerk has the responsibility for recording this information in his or her county only.

In the event it cannot be determined from existing records who first recorded the mark and brand in a county, then the person who has been using such means of livestock identification the longest shall have the right to have them recorded in his or her name. There is no limit to the number of marks and/or brands a person can record in a county as long as the requirements of the law are met.

Minors may have marks and brands separate from that of the father, mother or guardian, but they must also be re-recorded.

When the marks and brands are re-recorded or recorded for the first time, the location on the animal where the brand is applied must be shown. If the brand is applied to more than one location of the animal, it

must be recorded as a separate record of that brand.

The county clerk of each county will publish a notice announcing the re-recording of livestock brands order in some newspaper of general circulation in the county for a period of 30 days.

The county clerk also must make sure that no more than one brand of a kind be recorded on the same location of the animal. This eliminates the chance of two or more people in the county duplicating the same brand and location. Further, the county clerk must make certain that the brand location on the animal be designated. Failure to do so is punishable by a fine of not less than \$10 or more than \$50.

King encouraged all livestock producers to use marks and brands and to re-register these marks and brands promptly.

"A properly applied, legally recorded brand is proof of ownership. It increases the chances of recovering stray, missing or stolen livestock and serves as a great deterrent to thefts as well," King said. "A good brand eliminates many markets and outlets where a thief may dispose of an animal."

The marks and brand information collected through the Texas county clerks and through brand inspection at livestock auction markets and terminals in the state on a weekly basis has proven invaluable in the recovery of stolen and

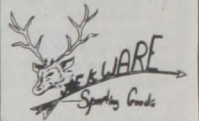

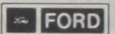

The PSAT/NMSQT gives students a chance to find out what the College Board's Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) is like, and helps them in planning for college; further, students who opt to participate in the College Board Student Search Service have an opportunity to hear from colleges that they might not otherwise learn about. The PSAT/NMSQT is also the qualifying test for students who wish to participate in the nationwide scholarship competitions administered by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation.
