Shoes Are Rationed; Delay In Mail Delivery **To Armed Forces Caused By Various Factors**

> During recent months complaints from the public of delayed or lost mail addressed to members of the armed forces indicates that there is wide misunderstanding of how this mail is handled and the difficulties encountered in its delivery, the Postoffice Department has advised.

Point Rationing Registration To Start On Feb. 22


Cooke county registration for War Ration Book No. 2 will begin February 22, W. H. McDaniel, the board chief, announced Saturday. The registration will continue until completed, he said, but point rationing is scheduled to begin on March 1.

Schoolhouses throughout the county will handle this registration. Because Texas teachers conducted previous registrations so efficiently, this sign-up should be the least difficult of all, Texas OPA director Mark McGee said in Fort Worth. One adult person should register for all members of his family

The most intensive drive for Red Cross membership in Cooke county will get under way on March 1. As pointed out at a meeting of the county chapter last week, this year's goal is \$10,000, the largest ever set for Cooke county. The nation's quota is 125 million. -Pfc. Adolph Knabe is stationed

L. Leazer, chairman of the Cooke County Red Cross chapter. Mrs. G. H. Hellman will again be chairman of the Muenster community.

In attempting to reach the new high quota the county committee intends to conduct the most thorough membership campaign in the history of Red Cross in this county. It intends to reach every family within the county's boundaries.

The national goal for the 1943 Red Cross War Fund drive is 125 million dollars of which 80 million will be spent for world-wide programs of service and 45 million will be required for the operation of chapters. Cooke county's portion of the 80 million will be \$5, 300, while the budget for the local chapter is \$16,300, totaling \$21, 600. The county has set as its Cpl.
