Good news has arrived relative to the Jr. Elite dress factory. Plant Manager Bernice Sicking said Wed-nesday that it will open Monday on a conditional basis, that is, as long as it is able to schedule work a month in advance. She explained that the fac-tory has been operating on a month to month basis, whereby the contract might be terminated only a short time after a new order of work arrives. That could result in confusion and ad-ded expenses of sending materials back and not completing the order. ed expenses of sending aterials back and not mpleting the order. Now, she added, the con-

tract calls for a 30 day notice tract calls for a 30 day holice to close the plant. It means that at least 30 days of working time is assured for any order, and the factory will have ample time to finish it in case a shutdown is orderad.

finish it in case a shutdown is ordered. Materials for the next or-der are expected during the weekend and calls for workers will start Monday. More workers will be notified day by day as the order advances through its several stages. Meanwhile, regarding a permanent_contract, it's a

Chamber of Commerce president Dick Ferber told members at their regular meeting Tuesday that a good sign is the scheduled get-together of principals next week Thursday to seek a solution of their problem.

He explained that a trio of chamber members, Ferber, Larry Kinard and David Fet-te, have been in touch with Jerell Inc. and the trust department of First City Bank, both of Dallas, of-fering the chamber's services in whatever way it can be helpful and assuring both sides that the factory is regarded as a vital com-

munity asset by local business as well as the employees.

At this time, he said, the plant is closed because it has no materials to work with, however a month to month contract is in effect since the regular contract expired.

The factory building is owned by the J.M. Wein-zapfel family and its management assigned to the Dallas bank's trust depar-tment. The problem resulted when Jerell objected to a rent increase, and negotiations to resolve it have been delayed on both sides.

C.W. "Bill" McMillan saying that the infestation had been eradicated, and thanking everyone for their cooperation. The trouble is, not everyone cooperated. And because of that, we have learned, the cost of eradicating the voracious agricultural pest increased in less than two years from original estimate of less than \$1 million to more than \$173 million - about \$118,000 per head for each of the 757 lit-le bugs that were zapped tle bugs that were zapped during the eradication

the ougs that we're Lapped during the eradication program. When the first tiny bugs were discovered in Califor-nia's Santa Clara Valley in December 1980, pest-control experts recommended spraying the area with a chemical known as "malathion." The chemical had been safely used in California and elsewhere for some 25 years, in both agricultural and nonagricultural bug control programs. In New Orleans and the Tidewater, Virginia, area malathion was used for mosquito control. It was as safe and effective a chemical as is known.

sate and effective a chemical as is known. But Governor Jerry Brown balked. The gover-nor apparently felt he knew better than all of the doctors and essentistic including of nor apparently felt he knew better than all of the doctors and scientists, including of-ficials of the California Department of Health Ser-vices, who found the chemical safe. So instead of authorizing the needed aerial spraying, Governor Brown called on Golden Stater's to hand-strip their fruit trees and even called out the National Guard to help. At the peak of the con-frontation, the state em-ployed 4,000 workers to bat-the flies and quarantined 623 square miles of land. As Dr. Jack Early, one of the country's leading authorities on agricultural pest control, said, the eradication program became a "circus, and all the while the problem was spreading." The rest is history, repor-ted in cover stories in America's news magazines and watched by tens of millions of amused Americans on TV's nightly

millions of amused Americans on TV's nightly

Americans on TV's nightly news. "Unfortunately," notes Dr. Early, president of the National Agricultural Chemicals Association, "the delays took a price. Instead of the \$748,000 U.S.D.A. had estimated in December 1980 to control the very limited infestation in Santa Clara County, the program Clara County, the program cost more than 200-times that, and covered much of the state, from Los Angeles County in the South to the outskirts of Sacramento in Continued on page 2


