### **Ambulance** to be based in Muenster

Cooke County Commissioners voted 3-2 Monday to locate one unit of the county's ambulance service in Muenster, ending a yearlong effort to improve emergency service in the western part of the county. Backers of the project say the local branch could be operating as early as the first week of January.

"I think this will make our service a great deal more effective," said Don Rice of the emergency care team in

the emergency care team in Gainesville.

Plans for the location call for basing one of the county's two full-time ambulances at the Boyles Estate house at the corner of Oak and Third streets and a 24-hour staff to man the operation. Plans have also been made to rennovate the house for members of the emergency staff and to construct a garage next to the house for the ambulance.

Ronnie Felderhoff, who acted as liaison between the Muenster City Council and the county commissioners, said the Muenster Jaycees and the Chamber of Commerce have each donated \$1,000 for the required renovation and the Jaycees plan to donate time to help with the project. He said any other volunteer help on the

project would be greatly appreciated.

At the commissioners' last meeting, Felderhoff presented the court with a statement of support accompanied by more than 500 signatures from residents of western Cooke County requesting that an ambulance be based here. He said the commissioner's favorable decision is due in large part to that large amount of citizen support.

Rice said locating a bran-

Rice said locating a branch of the ambulance service in Muenster would greatly reduce response time in the event of an emergency. The time it now takes for an ambulance coming from Gainesville to respond to an emergency in Muenster is about 14.5 minutes. With that response time, a heart attack victim "wouldn't have much of a chance," Rice said.

Basing one ambulance in Muenster will leave only one 24-hour unit in Gainesville, but Rice doesn't believe that situation will pose any problems. The ambulance service in Gainesville receives only five to six calls per day, only half of which are emergencies, and two emergency calls almost never occur at the same time, Rice said.

# **Building permits total \$476,750**

With a single exception, building activity in Muenster during 1982 reflects the nation-wide slump in construction. The exception is the new combination of a science department and five junior high classrooms at the public school quoted at \$240,000. With it the total amounts to \$476,750, and without it the figure drops to \$236,750, the lowest since 1974.

The building summary, as reported by Steve Moster, shows \$117,000 listed under residential construction, \$313,000 under commercial construction and \$46,750 as additions to both residential and commercial. and commercial.

Residential consists of four projects: new homes for Martin Bayer and BJ Construction, a moved-in home by Ben Martinez and a mobile home by Greg Wilde.
Along with the school building the commercial jobs were \$15,000 for Muen-

### **Extensive improvements made** by Sacred Heart parish

Father Denis Soerries apply to the cemetery, the church, the elementary school, the sisters' home and the Community Center.

The big project was in the cemetery where dead and unsightly shrubbery was removed and the surface was leveled with truckloads of good soil; also grass was planted along the walkways and a new sidewalk was installed beside parish property from SH High School to the cemetery entrance. The principal item was a complete new watering system consisting of a well and an underground sprinkling system. The program also includes straightening leaning tombstones as soon as ground is in the proper working condition.

Last Sunday's Sacred Heart bulletin summarizes an extensive improvement program completed by the parish in recent months. The several projects as listed by Rether Popils Scorriges apply to the process of removing defective mortar. dblast all limestone and the next was a process of removing defective mortar between bricks (tuckpointing) and replacing with good mortar. Finally all was sprayed with a waterproofing chemical. Cost of the work has been listed as \$14,386 for the church, \$4,250 for the school and \$2,125 for the sisters' home.

The Community Center project consisted of accoustical improvements at a cost of \$8,100, paid by two parish couples. The method consisted of covering the walls with sound absorbing materials. Exterior work there consisted of repairing roof leaks and painting the east wall, a combined cost of about \$1,000.

Father Denis ends his report with a reminder that deductible donations will be welcome in the parish improvement funds for these projects.

Secondly, the highly regarded Council of Economic Advisors estimates that some 340,000 jobs will be lost from the economy because people will have less money to spend in the private sector. The gas tax is expected to create only

in that year alone.

Much has been made of a change in the bill to guarantee states they will receive 85 percent of the money they pay into the system. However, in view of the losses we incurred in past years with only a slightly lower return ratio, I am less than overwhelmed by this concession on the part of the bill's backers.

For example, some estimates indicate that only 60 cents out of every dollar will go toward much-needed repair of highways and bridges, with the rest spent on new construction.

The mass transit provisions were improved when the bill was amended to include my proposal to allow these funds to be used for new systems in growth areas — including Dallas and Houston — as well as for repair of ex-

isting systems.

Thus, the gas tax does not accomplish the major goals put forth by its proponents. Instead, it is yet another tax on the already over-burdened taxpayer. It will fall most heavily on the poor, who spend a larger proportion of their income on gasoline than those in higher income groups. And it will hit rural areas particularly severely. Farmers, already enmeshed in economic difficulties of crisis proportion, will be hit yet again with an uncontrollable cost which they will not be able to recover in the current depressed farm market.

Furthermore, Texas will lose money on the tax. Since the creation of the federal Highway Trust Fund in 1956, Texas has paid \$2 billion more in taxes than it has realized in highway projects. In 1981, we received only 83 percent of the money that we paid into the trust fund. That was the lowest ratio in the country. As a result, we lost \$90 million in that year alone.

#### Pay hike involved tricky legislating

Pay hike involved tricky legislating
In a tricky bit of legislative maneuvering, Congress approved a 15 percent pay increase Tuesday (December 14, 1982). Congressman Charles W. Stinholm opposed any increase, but due to placement of amendments was forced to cast one vote that made it appear that he supported the 15 percent increase.

The procedure involved a three-step process:
1. If Congress had not acted, a 27.2 percent increase was due to go into effect automatically.
2. The first amendment would trim the 27.2 percent increase to 15 percent.
3. The second amendment would continue the curent cap on Congressional salaries, meaning NO pay raise at all would be allowed.

Stenholm voted for the first amendment, even though he opposed any increase. A vote against this amendment would have a proved of the 27 percent increase. He then voted for the second amendment to eliminate any increase. Had he opposed the first amendment, (to cut the increase from 25 to 15 percent) the higher increase would have gone into effect.

"As far as I am concerned, the key vote on this issue have gone into effect.

"As far as I am concerned, the key vote on this issue as passage of the rule that allowed this 'Catch-22' situation to develop on the House floor,' Stenholm said.
"I strongly opposed that rule. Those Members of Congress that supported a pay increase for themselves should have had the courage to be up-front and present the issue before the House and the American people clearly, with no legislative subterfuge.

"I have voted against any increase in Congressional pay since I have been in office and I really fail to undersatind the logic of those in Congress who conditions the people we serve are up against," Stenholm said.
Only one more vote was needed on the final amendment to stop the pay increase, with the amendment to continue the salary freeze failing by a 208-208 tie vote.



#### SEEKING NEW VISTAS

While the Weathermen agitated college campuses, blacks rioted in the streets, and our GI's died in Vietnam, the poets said give peace a chance. Large parts of white middle-class America tripped-out, freaked-out and dropped-out in an effort to find meaning in their lives. The high-energy idealism of the '60s resulted for many in a disdain for bourgeois values and a heightened concern about the plight of the poor.

VISTA (Volunteers in Service to America) was born of this era and originally attracted many young people who genuinely wanted to help those less fortunate than themselves. The program started out on the right track . . a good idea with noble aims.

Unfortunately, the VISTA program fell far short of fulfilling its obligation to the poor — and became, instead, a training ground for community activists wishing to change "the system" from within.

This picture, long a suspicion of conservatives, emerges clearly from information about the Carter-era VISTA program that is just now beginning to come to light thanks to the investigative spadework of William Poole, one of the country's most proficient analysts of the American Left. Under Carter administration appointees Sam Brown and Margery Tabankin — both New Left activists — the "volunteer" agency launched a national grants program. The program, however, Poole says, was used to large degree to funnel money from the federal government to organizations that, to be kind about it, think the American system stinks.

The VISTA Guidance Reports, issued in 1979 under Brown, suggested, for example, that VISTA volunteers should directly help their constituents, the poor, only "if the provision of that service is part of an overall organizing strategy." In other words, community organizing — a New Left euphemism for what most of us would call "troublemaking"— was to take precedent over helping the poor.

Take the case of Makanda, Illinois

Makanda is a small community in southern Illinois with a population of 407. The average family income is \$12,000. There are about 40 Makanda residents who are believed

to be below the poverty line.

VISTA's two major projects in Makanda were to VISTA's two major projects in Makanda were to establish a community newsletter and a day-care facility. The MCDC goals and objectives submitted to VISTA state: "Goal: To organize and distribute a local newsletter informing citizens about political and economic and social information needed to successfully effect a more equitable distribution of power in Makanda. Objective: Inform members of the community of the misuse of power practiced by local politicians and controversial issues affecting low-income residents." The actual VISTA Volunteer Plan for action states very specifically that the newsletter was to be used as an organizing tool for the Volunteer Plan for action states very specifically that the newsletter was to be used as an organizing tool for the community. The fact that this town of 407 already had a local newspaper and is a community where most information travels by word of mouth did not seem to be a consideration. The town of Makanda was turned upside down as residents tried to get rid of VISTA volunteers who came to save them from themselves.

Connie Horner, VISTA director under President Reagan, has moved aggressively to end these abuses and return the agency to its original purpose. There already

reagan, has moved aggressively to end these abuses and return the agency to its original purpose. There already is strong support for doing away with the agency entirely. If Horner is able to save the agency it will be despite the earlier activities of Brown and Tabankin. If VISTA dies, it will most certainly be because of them. (Feulner is president of The Heritage Foundation, a Washington-based public policy research institute.)

A Problem for the Aged

Senility. Is it the inevitable curse that accompanies

growing older?

Medical researchers believe that memory lapses, mental confusion, disorientation as to time, place and people, loss of interest in appearance and visual or hearing impairments can be symptoms of problems other than

sentility.

Take, for example, the story of a 70-year-old man who suddenly became confused and disoriented. A doctor, called by friends, declared that the man was "senile" and belonged in a nursing home. Fortunately, the man was still able to refuse, although he did agree to enter a general hospital. Within a week he was out and in fine condition again after a virus infection was diagnosed, properly treated and cured.



The Texas Medical Association estimates that approxcommon cause is improper drug use. People tend to become more sensitive to drugs with age. Also, an elder-ly person is more likely to take different drugs at the same time for many separate complaints. Frequently, these drugs, when combined, react in unexpected ways.

Real or pseudo-senility can mask such problems as alcoholism or alcohol withdrawal. Nutritional deficiencies also are common among the elderly. Many older people cannot provide balanced, nutritional meals for

themselves. Some may require nutritional supplements, especially if they are on steady medication. Other physical problems that can mimic or aggravate symptoms of senility are acute infections and metabolic disorders. Depression, which is common in many elderly persons, can also be mistaken for senility. People often spend their later years alone in isolation and boredom. Even in nursing homes, emotional disturbances often go undetected.

Pseudo-senility is possible at any age. Fortunately, a minor treatment can often solve the problem.

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poinsettias. In the double-flowered poinsettia you will find the bracts to be more numerous and remain attractive much longer.

We here in this area are more familiar with the single stem plant in a six inch pot with a single head of bracts, which are in full bloom at Christmas time. Some plants

are grown with more than one branch, but the flower head (bracts) is usually smaller than a single stem specimen. After flowering the plant should be cut back and kept dry in a temperature of 50 to 55 degrees for several weeks. In May they should be pruned to within six to eight inches of the soil and started into growth again by watering and keeping in a sunny, warm location.

After new growth has started, a minimum temperature of 65 to 70 degrees should be maintained. If you want additional poinsettia plants, cuttings can be taken from this new growth and rooted at that time. The soil should consist of fibrous loam, three parts, and one part of equal proportions of dried cow manure, leaf mold and sand. These plants need to be ventilated more freely and the atmosphere should be kept drier than at any other time during the growth season.

other time during the grown season.

Weekly fertilizing with a dilute liquid fertilizer with a reading of 20/20/20 is required for maximum growth and beauty. You must remember that the red (Pink or white) bracts are not the flower. The tiny yellow center cluster is the flower of the poinsettia.

Poinsettias resent drafts and are easily damaged by spraying of insecticide. They need short days and long nights to bloom. Light at night prevents flowering and the formation of the bracts.

The federal regulators are counting on market forces to encourage new products and keep prices at competitive levels. Under the FCC's competitive policies, customers can choose to obtain their telephones from suppliers other than the telephone company. However, anyone purchasing a phone becomes responsible for maintenance of the equipment.

Fuhrman said that as part of requirements of The federal regulators are

Fuhrman said that as part of requirements of deregulation, the telephone company will soon be providing more detailed information in bills to customers. A single monthly fee that included "end-to-end" local service for everything from the use of the phone to repairs at no extra charge used to be listed on bills.

Now this charge will be itemized and includes fees for access to the network and rental of the telephone, to name a couple, he said.

and rental of the telephone, to name a couple, he said. The charge for instrument rental applies only if the customer chooses to continue this option from the telephone company.

"As a result of competition, prices for each service and type of equipment are being set to reflect their actual cost," Fuhrman said.

"Under the old form of regulation, the industry could keep regulated rates for long-distance service and business phone service and business phone service at a level which helped keep the cost of local residential service affordable to all," he added.

"In competitive atmosphere, the price of local resulting the mosphere is the rent of local residential service affordable to all," he added.

"In competitive atmosphere, the price of local service will rise while the price of long-distance service may decline. Thus, at least large volume toll users may benefit. ### Telephone excise tax to increase

The federal excise tax on The federal excise tax on telephone service will increase to 3% from the current 1% on Jan. 1, 1983, Muenster Telephone Corporation of Texas announced today.

The increase is the result of legislation passed by Congress in August. Most telephone services, including local and long-distance calls, are subject to the tax.

The federal legislation which levies this tax increase states that it will be collected for 3 years -- 1983, 1984,

Although repealed briefly after the war, the tax was reinstated during the Depression. Rates have ranged as high as 25% on long-distance and 15% on long-distance and 15% on long-distance. local service.

The tax stood at 10% for almost 20 years, but recently it had been declining 1% annually.

USITA points out that although the nation's telephone companies collect these taxes, all of the revenue is forwarded to the federal government

and 1985. The tax then is scheduled to be eliminated entirely in 1986.

entirely in 1986.

An excise tax on telephone service was first imposed by Congress during World War I as a "temporary" measure, the U.S. Independent Telephone Association (USITA) reports. The trade group represents the interests of the nation's more than 1,400 non-Bell System telephone companies, which serve 36 million telephones - one out of five throughout the country.



# 1982 revisited

### Crops, prices both disappointing in this year's harvest

1982 was the year of disaster, one of the worst ever, for Muenster farmers. A poor grain crop deteriorated sadly during a rainy harvest, and prices were low. Meanwhile it was a relief to be spared the heat. Temperatures did not reach 100 until late July. It was also the year of closing the Soil Conservation office in a consolidation of offices by USDA. Also Jr. Elite dress factory was shut down briefly because of a lease problem, but is back on full schedule now.

Germanfest continued its growth with the biggest and best of its history. Estimated attendance of 50,000 came from 34 states and 15 foreign countries. German Fun Run also set new records.

In politics Muenster voters went strong for the Republican ticket while Democrates swept the state. On the city and college district elections the winners were the Pagels, Hamric, Howeth and bingo.

It was also a year of extensive improvements at the public school. Major item was a new building combining a science department and five junior high classrooms, followed by many changes of room assignment and lots of renovating. Combined enrollment of the two schools is

661, a drop of 9 since last year.

Sacred Heart continued to make athletic records. Tigerettes emerged as No. 3 from state basketball playoffs and had three members named on all-state teams. Also boys and girls take district track titles, and Tigers are district TCIL football champs.

County-wide, it was a big football year. Sacred Heart, Lindsay, Gainesville and Valley View went to the play-offs. Tigers lost to St. Pius of Houston in TCIL state semifinal. Lindsay advanced twice and lost regional to Italy. Hornets advanced from 14th in district to No. 3 in a building year.

Some of the personal standouts in the news: Biship Danglmayr observes 40 years as a bishop and 60 as a priest; Jaycees name Wanda Flusche outstanding citizen; KCs name Waylan Poole as good neighbor; Elizabeth Neu dies at 111. Ronnie Hess runs in Boston Marathon.

Also 34 percent of Muenster bank stock becomes available and outlook is bright for locating a unit of county ambulance service in Muenster.



#### Palm Springs: where sun meets snow

It's a place where specta-cular snow-capped moun-tain peaks jut into an icy-blue sky, and Swiss-made cable cars scale craggy cliffs to an unspoiled wild-erness atop an 8,500-foot

summit.

All of the visual effects of Courmayeur, Davos, Innsbruck or St. Moritz to daz-zle the winter sports enthusiast's eyes are only 20 minutes from balmy 75-degree breezes, swaying palm trees, lush golf courses and thousands of sparkling swimming pools in Palm Springs.

Now with a ski center

Now, with a ski center high in the sky on Mt. San Jacinto, this desert resort offers the "best of both worlds" and an interesting change of pace where cross-country skiing, snowshoeing, sledding and the creation of snow sculptures are the favorite pastimes.

Instead of driving
through a blinding snowstorm on slippery roads,
necessitating tire chains
and their accompanying
frozen fingers and headaches, snow-seekers are
transported aboard one
of the most exciting and
popular attractions in the
world. The \$8 million Palm
Springs Aerial Tramway
(leaving a balmy 70 degrees
at the desert station), hugs
the sheerest mountain face
in North America — Chino
Canyon — arriving to a
clear, crisp 30 degrees at
the "top of the world."

are only minutes from the

Known by many as the "eighth wonder of the world," the steel-cabled link from palm trees to snow-laden peaks was conceived by a young electrical engineer named Francis Crocker. After 25 years of delay in the planning stages and two years of construction, mainly by helicopter, "Crocker's folly" as it was known, became a reality in 1963.

Since then, more than

Each zone has its own variety of wildlife and vegetation and could be likened to driving from Sonora, Mexico to the Arctic.

Winter activity in the San Jacinto Wilderness Park is heralded by an annual contest to guess the date of the first measurable snowfall at the mountain station.

An increasing number of cross-country skiers, along with the six-to-10 feet of snow that normally blankets the 14,000-acre park, led to the opening of a ski facility in 1979. The Nordic Ski Center is in its third season, offering Southern California's finest cross-country skiing.

Depending on snow conditions, skiing begins around Thanksgiving and continues until Easter. Many of the 4,000 tramriders on any given weekend last season were cross-country skiers who enjoyed the four circular ski trails laid out just a short walk from the tramway's mountain station.

Three of the four trails are approximately one mile in length and are geared for the more advanced skier and covers a distance of two miles (the

lengths are computed for a full circular run). The trails are fully maintained by snowmobile patrols to ensure the safety of skiers.

Over the years, snow packs have averaged around eight feet and ski conditions are generally good from November 15 to April 15.

Popularity of cross-country skiing in the San Jacinto Wilderness Park can be credited to accessibility, uncrowded conditions and low cost, as well as the availability of the summer-like haven in the valley below. It is a two-hour drive from Los Angeles and only three hour from San Diego over low, snowless, dry interstate highway.

Complete cross-country ski packages with skis, poles and boots are available at a reasonable price without the cost of daily lift tickets. The sport has a low accident rate, thus it appeals to the more mature skiers as well as youngsters.

Cross-country ski instruction is given with lessons ranging from beginner to parallel. The center also rents snowshoes, snow boots and sleds for snow play.


#### Independent business loses millions through employee theft

COLLEGE STATION —
Physicians, dentists, veterinarians and other professionals in business for themselves annually lose millions of dollars to sceretaries or receptionists handling office finances, says a Texas A&M University accounting professor.
"Last year an estimated \$500 million was lost by dentists, physicians and veterinarians through employee theft," says Dr. Carlton Stolle of Texas A&M's College of Business Administration. "An estimated 15 percent will be victimized at some time during their careers."

at some time during their careers.

Stolle said to avert the situation professionals should check potential employees' backgrounds before hiring them. In addition, he said hiring more than one person to take care of office finances might act to keep individuals from temptation.

He said prenumbered receipts and making sure all receipts are accounted for will help divert employees away from theft. He also suggests reconciliations be made each day for cash deposits.
