is practically the net budget amount. The figure was revised during Monday's meeting to include items not previously listed. They included a new police car, an addition to the fire station to provide space for equipment, material and vehicle, and also a roof repair job on the library. As regards revenue for budget needs, the city expec-ts about \$102,000 from ad valorem tax. This is estimated on a total valuation of \$29,143,314 and a rate of 35 cents per \$100 of assessed value. The problem is over a proposed increase in rent charged by First City Bank and Trust of Dallas to the Jr. Elite Dress Factory. The property is owned and managed by First City Bank and Trust in the interest of the J.M. and Julia Weinzapfel family. The rental contract, which

Julia Weinzapfel family. The rental contract, which has expired after 5 years at a rate of \$500.00 per month, is due to be re-negotiated. The proposed new figure of \$2,950.00 per month was

arrived at by reviewing comparable properties and conditions at other Texas manufacturing locations. Both sides quickly agreed that the figure was far out of line with rates in this area; and a study of local proper-ties and rates led to the asking price of \$1,650.00 per month. Jr Elite responded with an offer of \$800.00 per month for 3 years and an in-crease to \$1000.00 per mon-th for 2 more years. City adopts \$371,000 budget

the Cooke County Tax Appraisal District. The tax need last year had been estimated at \$85000 but the amount included bills which were there by similar the actual collection totaled near \$77000. As a result the citty fund is low and some of the words are sult the citty make up for the shortage. Comparing tax revenue customers. The new procedure calls for TP&L to obtain PUC approval of the estimated cost of fuel-related services provided by the affiliated company. This approval will be obtained before the costs are billed to customers. Also they will be scheduled quar-terly where as previous ad-justments were made mon-thly. Comparing tax revenue estimates now and a year ago indicates an increase of about 20 percent. The total was \$85000 then, and it is \$17000 higher now.

The council also approved the re-zoning of a site on Block 85 from residential to commercial. The action

S17000 higher now. City revenue sources to supplement the ad valorem tax will include sales tax, franchise tax, garbage collection fees and federal revenue sharing. In other action the council approved a new procedure for Texas Power and Light Co. to obtain regulatory ap-proval of certain fuel related charges. Agreement on the procedure had been reached earlier by TP&L, the cities represented by the Texas Block 85 from residential to commercial. IRS EXEMPT FROM EQUAL ACCESS TO JUSTICE LAW

There was a time when a small-business person or a pri-vate citizen had little hope of challenging a government finding against him. If cited for violation of a federal regu-

finding against him. If cited for violation of a federal regu-lation or law, he or she would probably pay the fine rather than speed money for a lawyer to fight the charges. Many small-business people with whom I have talked say that while they knew they were not guilty of violating a law, they just couldn't afford the time and money to fight government agents – inspectors from OSHA, the Environmental Protection Agency or even IRS. After many years of hard lobbying by the National Federation of Independent Business, working with legis-lators of both political parties, the Equal Access to Justice Act was signed by President Jimmy Carter in the fall of 1980 and became law in October 1981. "Equal access to justice" means that if you are cited

"Equal access to justice" means that if you are cited for a violation by a federal agency, you can take the agency to court. If you win, the government pays reasonable lawyers' fees and court costs. It also means that the burden of proof is on the government — not the taxpayer — to establish that there is a legitimate reason for the citation. The law was a main victory for small builties. establish that there is a regultimate reason for the citation. The law was a major victory for small business. But now that victory is tarnished as a result of the all-night stam-pede to pass the so-called tax reform act (really one of the largest tax *increases* in history). House-Senate conferees exempted the Internal Revenue Service from the provisions of the Equal Access law. The burden of proof in tax cases is back on the taxpayer. The law had linguide amplicability to IRS even before this

is back on the taxpayer. The law had limited applicability to IRS even before this latest fiasco. Tax court proceedings were considered admin-istrative procedures and exempt from equal access provisions. The accused taxpayer had to challenge the IRS in U.S. District Court – and win – to recover legal fees. But is was a start

District Court – and win – to recover legal rees. But is was a start. Now all of that has been undone. In 1977, the Commission on Federal Paperwork reported that the Internal Revenue Service accounted for 70 percent of the paperwork burden on small business. The impatient demands of the IRS; the arrogant, "star chamber" accusatory process; and the devastating effect a decision can have on a business have sent cold chills up the spine of many a tough small-business person. Now, without any bearings by con-gressional committees and without any opportunity for discussion in the House of Representatives or the Senate, the IRS is immune from the provisions of the Equal Access to Justice Act. That means that the incentive to move with caution and be certain the taxpayer is indeed in violation of the law has been removed. The IRS will once again be free to operate outside the glare of publicity surrounding ex-pensive challenges from taxpayers. There is much to correct in the tax bill passed by Congress in August, but until IRS is forced to comply with Equal Access, there will be no recourse for small-business owners and individual taxpayers.

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GLOOMY GOOD NEWS

Judging by what you read in the newspapers and see on the network news, "Reaganomics" is a failure. Not only is it responsible for near-record high unemployment and the continuing economic slump, the story goes, but it has heaped misery on the less fortunate through savage cuts in social services designed primarily to widen the gulf separating tich and poor

cuts in social services designed primarily to when the gain separating rich and poor. As fallacious as the above statements are, their constant repetition has begun to affect even many of the President's long-time supporters. Though the President's program went into effect less than a year ago — and the first really meaningful personal tax cuts came our way just two months ago. — Reagnonics has become the whinping bot (or all). ago — Reaganomics has become the whipping boy for all of our economic ills. But buried beneath this litany of gloom and doom is

an untold story of progress in the war against inflation, high interest rates, and a still generous and expanding federal budget.

high interest rates, and a still generous and expanding federal budget. When the Reagan administration took office, Americans were groaning under a 12.4-percent inflation rate. Interest rates were running above 20 percent, and government spending was growing by 17 percent per year. Bracket creep, moreover, stole an ever-increasing percentage of personal income in federal tax revenues. So as your wages were pushed up by inflation, the government took a bigger cut — and your buying power went down. What has happened after a year and a half of "Reaganomics"? Inflation has been more than halved, and in March of this year — for the first time in seventeen years — prices not only didn' increase, but they actually went down! Interest rates have fallen dramatically, though not enough yet to reinvigorate the housing market. Still, the prime interest rate is down to below 14 percent, a sharp drop from the 20-percent high that Ronald Reagan inherited. And the growth of government spending has at least been slowed.

The so-called dog-food budget that President Reagan the so-called dog-tood oudget that resident recagan submitted to Congress earlier this year was, of course, a liberal fiction. This "austere" budget provided for 95-million meals a day for needy Americans, medical care for 47-million people, subsidized housing for 10-million Americans, and 7-million loans and grants for deserving induced block medical care.

Americans, and "Hinnon loans and grains for deserving and needy college students. But the outrage with which this budget was met in Congress led people to believe that the President intended to starve the poor and rob the elderly.

Between congressional demagogues and a heady barrage of distortions aired nightly on the network news, is there any wonder that the President has had a difficult

is there any wonder that the President has had a difficult time restoring public confidence in the economy? The President has been doing a herculean job working with his congressional supporters. Perhaps he's done too well. Victory, we all know, is the tonic that makes life worth living to the politician. Sooner or later all politicians find out that victory exacts a high price: compromise. Thus, we have the specter of Ronald Reagan, the great tax-cutter, pushing a tax increase of historic proportions and Ronald Reagan, the great world leader, cozying up to the Red Chinese, at the expense of our long-time allies on Taiwan. At a time when the economy is showing signs of real At a time when the economy is showing signs of real improvement, it is hard not to feel a sense of gloom at the sudden turn of events.

Ine studen turn of events. Compromise, of course, is fine. But compromise that is damaging and wrong means we're back to business-as-usual in the Nation's Capital. (Feulner is president of The Heritage Foundation, a Washington-based public policy research institute.)
