## Residents protest dust

A representative group of citizens who reside on or near Ash street petitioned the city council Monday night to either help get the road paved or close it. Spokesman Ray Wimmer cited problems with health, landscapes and general city appearance and presented the petition with a long list of signatures. The council moved to draft a resolution requesting help from the county with the dust problem since the majority of traffic on Ash is county traffic. A group of residents and city officials was to meet with the commissioners court Monday but that action will be held pending further negotiation.

Old business brought an agreement to repay \$5,854.03 in taxes to Muenster State Bank. This payment was the second

counter-offer by the bank and compared with payments by other taxing entities involved.

Ronnie Felderhoff was appointed to the zoning board and a request for street lighting at the intersection of Eddy St. and Walnut was denied.

Annual rumblings concerning Germanfest resurfaced when the council refused to sign the Chamber of Commerce contract for city park use until the chamber signs the Park Use Permit. This permit requires removal of all facilities and repair of damage within ten days after the function. These requirements were not completely adhered to last year as the tent was not removed until about 2 weeks after Germanfest. Controversies over park damage and the gate funds dedicated to the park remain unsettled.

In other business, David Bright Sr. and Dan Bayer were appointed to the Water Board. The council approved a new ordinance designed to repay developers for the cost of installing water utility lines in a new development over the stated objections and questions of citizens present to discuss the ordinance.

Muenster Jaycees will kick off a special membership drive next Thursday, March 13. The 8 p.m. meeting at the Jaycee building in the city park will host a special reception for prospective members.

David Hicks, Texas State Jaycee President from Austin will be present at the meeting to lend his expertise and greet members, new and old.

Jaycee membership is open to everyone between the ages of 18 and 35. Wayne Klement emphasized the local chapter's need for new members. "We want all the old members to come too and bring someone new to welcome the state president." Refreshments will be served afterward.

## Germanfest countdown

The Germanfest Committee met March 3, 1986, to continue plans for the 1986 Sesquicentennial Germanfest. Plans are progressing for a "History of Muenster" film to be produced by Jane Monday.

supervise the operation.

Discounted Gate Tickets will be sold to merchants for \$1.50 each. The merchants may sell them or give them away, but they may not sell them for more than \$.25 profit.

John Fisher reported the Park Contract was not signed by the City Council. Gary Endres was asked to work on an acceptable solution to any problems.

The next meeting of the Germanfest Committee will be April 7, 1986, 7:30 p.m., at the Telephone Company meeting room.

# State cuts 2-year budget

State Comptroller Bob Bullock cut \$1.3 billion from what he says is available for the state to meet its present two-year budget.

Bullock said he revised the state's revenue outlook because of tumbling oil prices and federal budget cuts.

Reductions in tax revenue from oil, natural gas and sales taxes made up the majority of the cuts.

At the same time, Bullock also warned that the state's 1988-89 budget could be short as much as \$6 billion based on current revenue projections and current spending which has increased an average of 16 percent a biennium.

"The oil price slide is drastic and its effect is just as dramatic on the Texas budget," said Bullock.

Bullock said he first warned state leaders of the potential of a revenue shortfall last March in a letter outlining the state's revenue estimate.

"We said then and I say today that price trends in the world oil market can change dramatically in a matter of days or hours," he said.

The heart of the state's revenue projections was based on average taxable oil prices in Texas of about \$25 a barrel for the 1986 budget year, \$24.15 a barrel for the 1987 budget year and \$21 a barrel for 1988.

Spot prices as low as \$16 barrel in recent days have sent the price of taxable Texas oil—the majority of which is sold under the posted or contract market—to an average near \$22 a barrel.

Bullock's new estimate puts the oil price forecasts at \$21.08 a barrel for 1986 and \$15.18 a barrel for 1987.

Bullock also pegged more than ten items ranging from a court case against the state's new filing fees to budget cutbacks from the

Gramm-Rudman bill as forces that could further effect the state's income in coming months.

"We know the potential effect of all these factors could be in the hundreds of millions and most of them fall on the negative side of the ledger," he said.

Cuts by Bullock in sales tax and franchise tax revenue reinforced the chilling effect that declining oil prices will have on the Texas economy.

He said personal income is expected to grow by only about 4.1 percent this year versus an estimated 6.9 percent in 1985.

Specific revenue cuts included oil production tax, \$377.1 million; natural gas tax, \$338 million; sales tax, \$334 million; franchise tax, \$155.2 million; all other taxes, \$36.2 million; federal funds, \$26.6 million; interest income, \$121.6 million and other revenue, \$102.7 million.

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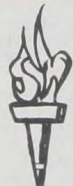
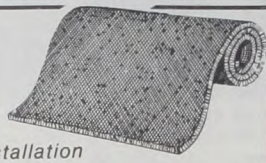

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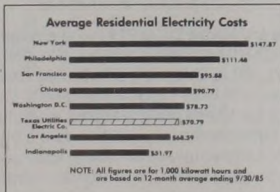

## State Bass record broken

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials are happy that the state record for largemouth bass set five years ago has finally fallen.

Center resident Earl Crawford smashed the old state record by almost one and a half pounds Sunday (Feb. 16) when he caught a 16-pound, 14 1/2 ounce bass on a crawfish-colored crankbit. The former record was a 15-pound, eight-ounce fish caught by John Alexander of Dallas in February 1981 from a private lake near Athens.

Bob Kemp, director of fisheries for the TPWD, said Crawford's fish is indicative that the department's bass program, featuring introduction of Florida-strain fish, is contributing to angling success.

"I think this fish is clear evidence that our genetics work with large-mouth bass is paying dividends," Kemp said. He pointed out that Florida-strain largemouths were stocked at Pinkston in 1976, and while the record fish's genetic makeup will not be determined for several days he feels confident the fish is a Florida or Florida/native intergrade.

Kemp added that the record fish at Pinkston should come as no surprise, since the lake produced a 13-pound, six-ounce bass in 1983 and a 14-pound, one-ouncer in September 1985.

Kemp believes the unseasonably warm weather this winter is an important factor in the appearance of big bass this year. "Since the first of the year three fish have made the top 20 list of biggest bass," he said, "a 13-5 from Murvaul, one the same size from Possum Kingdom, and now this one."

Crawford, who is part owner of a building supply business in Center but lives at the lake, said he fished on four occasions in recent weeks and caught only three bass. However, one weighed 8 1/4 pounds, another was 9 1/4 and the other was the big prize. The record-setting fish was 27 5/8 inches long and 24 inches in girth.

Lake Pinkston is located in Shelby County, between Center and Nacagdoches off State Highway 7.

A brief statement of the nature of this suit is as follows, to-wit:  
TRESPASS TO TRY TITLE OF LAND AS MORE FULLY DESCRIBED, TO-WIT:

The following field notes described a survey of 137,422.4 acres of land in northwestern Cooke County, Texas, said land being a part of the (upper) M. Elliott Survey, A-361 (ptd. 156-38), the lower M. Elliott, Jr. Survey, A-361 (ptd. 156-37), and the J. DeGuire Survey, A-341. This is also the land described in the Warranty Deed conveying undivided interest from Mrs. Susie Mae Wilburn Et Al to Earnest Robinson dated July 30, 1951, and is of record in Volume 365, Pages 32 and 33, Deed Records, Cooke County, Texas, said deed calling for three tracts consisting of 80, 50, and 88 acres, less, save, and except 52.6 acres (Volume 326, Page 583, Cooke County Deed Records) which would leave 165.4 acres, however, the land is bounded on the ground by existing fences and evidence of old fences which encompass only 137,422.4 acres, creating a deficiency of 27,977.6 acres. The bounded tract is further described as:

BEGINNING at the most southern southwest corner of the L. Pickering Survey, A-839, and the northwest corner of the S.P.R.R. Co. Survey, A-986, said corner being in the east line of the (upper) M. Elliott Survey, A-361, and is occupied by a very old fence corner post;

THENCE South 00 degrees 11 minutes 37 seconds West 1279.7 feet generally along an old wire fence, through heavy and dense timber to a 24 inch Oak tree for corner;

THENCE South 85 degrees 11 minutes 21 seconds West 488.1 feet with an old wire fence to a fence corner post;

THENCE South 01 degrees 35 minutes 08 seconds East 780.4 feet with an old wire fence through dense timber to an 18

inch Oak tree on the north bank of Camp Creek for the corner;

THENCE South 82 degrees 16 minutes 09 seconds West 652.3 feet crossing Camp Creek and generally following an old wire fence and evidence of the fence (washed out) along the south bank of Camp Creek to a 16 inch Oak tree for corner;

THENCE South 02 degrees 52 minutes 03 seconds West 185.6 feet generally following an old wire fence along the east bank of an eroded ditch to a fence corner post;

THENCE South 67 degrees 17 minutes 31 seconds West 294.2 feet crossing said ditch and following an old wire fence along and to the north of another ditch to a 10 inch Oak tree and angle point (There is a new fence about 5 feet north of this call, built in order to avoid heavy brush.);

THENCE South 72 degrees 48 minutes 06 seconds West 556.2 feet with the old wire fence to a 20 inch Oak tree for angle point;

THENCE South 83 degrees 44 minutes 07 seconds West 53.4 feet with said fence to a 20 inch Oak tree and angle point;

THENCE North 88 degrees 21 minutes 40 seconds West 262.7 feet with said fence to a 10 inch Oak tree and angle point;

THENCE South 89 degrees 42 minutes 06 seconds West 340.4 feet to an 8 inch Oak tree for corner (There is evidence of an old road here.);

THENCE North 32 degrees 31 minutes 13 seconds West 267.5 feet with an old wire fence along the west side of an old roadway to a 16 inch Oak tree and angle point;

THENCE North 04 degrees 53 minutes 06 seconds East 896.3 feet generally following an old wire fence crossing a deep tributary to Camp Creek to an old wood fence corner post in the south line of an old abandoned roadway;

THENCE North 00 degrees 17 minutes 34 seconds West 1508.8 feet crossing a deep ravine and over the east side of a hill to a 1/2 inch rebar rod driven in the east right of way of an old abandoned road and in line with an old fence and tree line (There is no fence along this call.);

THENCE North 88 degrees 25 minutes 54 seconds East 794.1 feet following evidence of an old wire fence in a tree line to an angle point;

THENCE North 89 degrees 26 minutes 51 seconds East 639.3 feet crossing a tributary of Camp Creek and following evidence of an old fence and tree line to an angle point;

THENCE North 88 degrees 53 minutes 49 seconds East 423.8 feet following evidence of an old fence in a tree line and crossing Camp Creek to a 2 inch iron fence post on the east bank of the creek;

THENCE South 89 degrees 14 minutes 57 seconds East 802.1 feet following an existing wire fence through dense growth to the place of BEGINNING. The aforescribed tract contains 137,422.4 acres of land, approximately one-half of which is bottom land and 1/2 of which is heavy timber. This tract is traversed by Camp

Last week we were evaluating the herbicide plots with the primary goal of controlling ryegrass. Herbicides used for this post-emerge ryegrass control in wheat were Glean and Hoelon. The results were pretty consistent with most recommendations that are made for ryegrass control.

Hoelon continues to be the product of choice if you are trying to control ryegrass post-emerge.

Hoelon was applied on the replicated plots at 1 1/2, 1 1/2, and a 2 pint rate. These herbicides were applied on November 4, 1985, when both the wheat and ryegrass had emerged from the planting. At all three rates Hoelon controlled ryegrass at approximately a 95 to 98 percent range.

The Glean was applied post-emerge at 1/4 and 1/2 ounce rates. The results from Glean were not

as satisfactory as that with Hoelon. The control percent was approximately 50 to 80 percent. A stand count of ryegrass was taken at the check plot with anywhere from 17 to 21 plants per square foot. Glean performs very well for ryegrass when applied pre-emergence. If you are using Glean in ryegrass control, then you should plant and apply the recommended rate the same day or close to the same day. Do not apply Glean to wheat that is young and spiked.

We have these two excellent products for control of ryegrass in

wheat. The thing for producers to be aware of is the rate and application time. For best control, ryegrass plants must be very young. The older and ranker that both weeds and grasses become, the harder they are to control and the higher the rates that must be used.

Next month we will be touring these plots and you are welcome to view them at anytime. Right now it is almost too late to control most grass species in wheat fields. Both the cheat and ryegrass have begun to tiller greatly and this will reduce control measures.
