Hornets upset Knights, draw tournament bye

On Tues, Feb. 4, the Muenster Hornets defeated the Lindsay Knights in the first round of the district basketball tournament. It was an exciting 44-40 victory.

The Hornets started fast and earned a 19-11 first quarter lead. Lindsay came back strong in the second quarter to get back in the game and trailed Muenster by 3 at the half. The rest of the game was a tight struggle and with just nine seconds left Brian Hess of the Hornets clinched the victory with two free throws.

Stuart Hess led the balanced scoring attack with 13 points followed by Brian Hess with 10, Kevin Anderle with 8 and Ryan Klement 8. Brian Hess led all rebounders for the Hornets with 11, Stuart Hess grabbed 10 and Darren Walterscheid followed with 5.

Wayne Fleitman was top scorer for Lindsay with 9 points.

"The key to victory was shutting down Lindsay's strong inside game," said Hornet coach Bob Gross, "and making their guards shoot the ball from outside."

Another first round game Tuesday eliminated the Era Hornets, after their 55-53 defeat to Forestburg. On Friday night Alvord will host Forestburg at 7:30, while Muenster gets a bye and advances to the finals. Slidell finished the regular season as the outright district champion with a 10-0 record and automatically advances to the playoffs.

The championship game will be next Tuesday with Muenster playing the winner of the Alvord-Forestburg game. The site will be

the home court of the team with the best district record. The winner of the boys tournament will be district runner-up.

In girls first-round action Monday night, Forestburg eliminated Alvord, 46-39 and Lindsay was eliminated by Era 27-16. In the semi-final games Muenster, 9-1 in district, will host Forestburg Thursday night at 7:30 and Era will travel to Slidell. Muenster's only two season losses are to Slidell.

The girls championship game will be Monday night at 7:30 at the best-record team's home court. The game will be held at a neutral site if two teams advance with the same district record. The winner will be district champion and the loser district runner-up, both advancing to the state playoffs.

Trash, time capsule occupy council meeting

"I came to talk trash," said Gary Fisher at Monday's city council meeting. City officials and citizens heard a lengthy report on Muenster's planned participation in the statewide "Keep Texas Beautiful" campaign. Several local organizations have already enlisted to help with Muenster's clean sweep projects. Gary Fisher and Bob LaCoe will head the effort which will not only beautify the city but could win a \$20,000 state landscaping grant.

Later, Jason Gehrig's request to bury a time capsule on city property was approved. This action will fulfill part of his Eagle Scout

requirement. Gehrig will share part of the space in the capsule with the city which has approved burial at a city park site yet to be determined.

In other action, Jerry Wimmer stated that the former First Texas Building on Hwy. 82 would be modified to comply with the fire code. This will include removal of wood shingles and covering with a double brick veneer.

The council agreed to initiate a new ordinance which will provide for full refund to developers for installation of sewer line. The refund will be made on the basis

of 100 feet at a time as the development is built up.

The city will once again attempt to obtain a community development block grant intended to be used to open 9th street from Main to Mesquite. Officials hope that this more worthy project will succeed in obtaining the grant.

Finally, the city agreed to pay the state's share of contribution to the Firemen's Pension Fund until the next city budget is made. Governor White has for the time being cancelled state contributions of this kind. The state's share is slightly over \$1,000.00.

Dear Friends of Muenster,

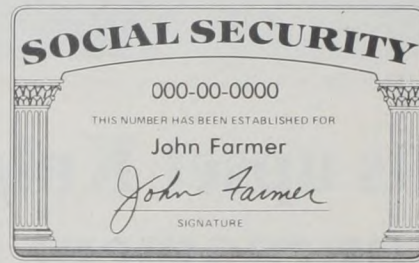
A photocopy of the check that was sent here to the bank of Kigali came in December. Thank you and each of the donors. I am always so amazed at how generous people are.

AUSTIN—All in all, last week wasn't a good one for Gov. Mark White, now an embattled figure fighting for reelection.

For months now, White's campaign has figured to skate past the Democratic primary small fries in May to take on the lone survivor of three tough GOP challengers in November.

But last week, as Texas was slapped with predicted gloom in the oil patch and dried-up federal revenues, White found:

—His reelection announcement staged in his mother's old Houston classroom was upstaged by an angry reaction from his once-staunch supporters, Texas teachers.

—One of his small fry Democratic opponents launched an offensive by depicting him as "Gov. Goldcard" and the "original nerd" of Texas high schools.

Zingers, Ouches

White did manage to throw some zingers which landed, particularly on the record of GOP nemesis Bill Clements.

Clements criticized White's lease-purchase plan for prison

construction, and White responded that Clements one-time veto of \$30 million for prison building made today's construction more necessary and more expensive.

Almost simultaneously, it was reported that Clements, who has really jumped White this year for seeking out-of-state funds, accepted some 120,000 such dollars when he beat John Hill in 1978. Clements had asserted that he had never accepted non-Texas funds.

Goldcard, Nerd

But White almost said such when he defended his lackluster high school record against an attack by opponent Don Crowder.

Crowder had circulated copies of White's senior yearbook page which listed no extracurricular activities for him. No wonder White wanted to punish extracurricular-minded students, Crowder crowed, dubbing White the original nerd of Texas.

For the first time, White got teary-eyed at a press conference, explaining that his father's ill health necessitated him taking two jobs after school.

Crowder took other opportunities to dub White "Gov. Goldcard" for his spending proclivities and tax hikes, and suddenly, White found himself bleeding politically from a political unknown in his own party primary.

Teachers Incensed

After he took television crews to his mother's old Houston classroom to stage his official reelection bid around his concern for excellence in education, the top two teachers associations called it hypocritical.

The head of the Association of Texas Professional Educa-

tors said teachers were incensed by it and White was clearly out of tune with the feelings of the teacher corps.

The Texas Classroom Teachers Association, one of White's pillar groups in '82, added their opposition to White's policies.

The week's fray caused one GOP opponent, Kent Hance, to quip in San Antonio, "Sure, the teachers are behind Mark White . . . but they're chasing him!"

Reforms Today

Part of White's problem is that some 30,000 Texas teachers began preparing last week for the controversial state tests March 10, and another 30,000 start this week.

Also, the Texas Education Agency applied the no-pass, no-play rule by forbidding several Dallas Highland Park football players from attending their annual football banquet because they failed a course.

Additionally, the U.S. Census Bureau reported last week that Texas has the largest public school debt in the nation, \$5.6 billion.

The heavy migration of students to Texas has caused the building of new buildings and incurring new debt.

More Bids

Three heavyweights who got lost in the White-Crowder-teachers melee were Attorney General Jim Mattox, Treasurer Ann Richards and Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower, all Democrats who filed for reelection.

Hightower will be opposed by a GOP farmer Charles Trompler of Malone.

Charles Ben Howell became the first GOP candidate for Texas Supreme Court, announcing against incumbent Sears McGee.

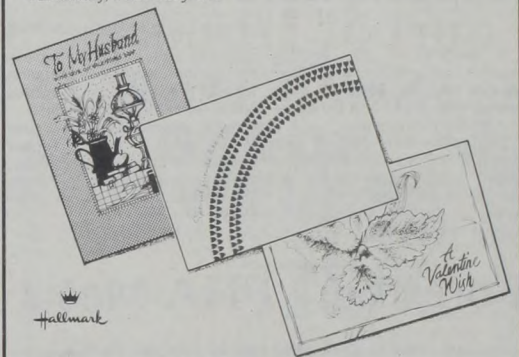
Ben Luke on SFA Dean's list

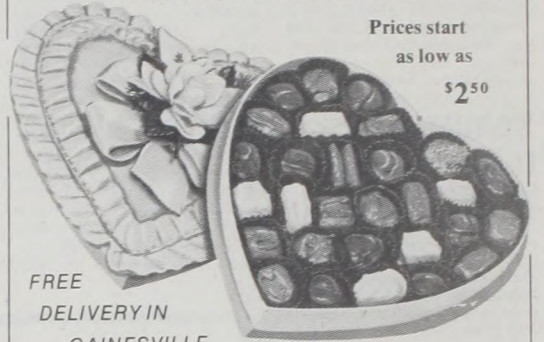

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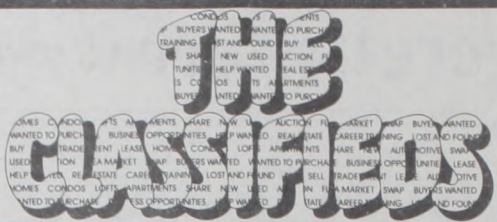

County Agent's Report

TOPDRESSING WHEAT

The dry fall has been just another factor in reducing wheat growth. One factor contributing to little growth and lack of plant vigor has been stubble ground. In many instances where heavy stubble from poor straw decomposition or maize and hay stalks are present, then there can be a tie up of nitrogen. Twenty to 40 pounds of actual nitrogen can be lost to the stubble decomposition. We don't lose this nitrogen completely. It will eventually release back to the soil but maybe too late for benefit to small grains.

Recently we took a soil test of two fields that had been heavily grazed. The following shows the results:

Condition	Pounds of Nitrogen Available
Maize Ground	24
Continuous Wheat	42

If this producer plans to make a 40 bushel wheat crop, he will need to topdress the maize ground with about 40 pounds of actual nitrogen. The other field should have enough nitrogen fertility for the 40 bushel yield. Additional nitrogen will be needed on both fields if a graze out situation exists for this producer.

One last thing, if planning for a wheat crop, then your topdressing needs to be done before jointing begins. So as soon as weather permits will be the ideal time.

NEW SWINE DYSENTERY VACCINE

The first federally-approved vaccine for swine dysentery (bloody scours) Hy-Guard by Haver, is now available to swine producers. This vaccine is a killed product (bacterin) in a special carrier to enhance immunity. Currently Haver has approval for and recommends intramuscular vaccination in healthy pigs twice—at six weeks of age and three weeks later. Pigs should be protected against infection by dysentery during the three weeks between vaccinations. Providing appropriate levels of antibiotics or antibacterials in feed or water can provide this protection while allowing immunity to peak before possible disease exposure.

Studies have shown that Hy-Guard vaccinated pigs did not suffer any fatalities when exposed to dysentery while 70 percent of unvaccinated control pigs exposed to the same experimental dose developed typical swine dysentery and 20 percent died. Overall tests showed 83 percent fewer clinical disease signs such as diarrhea, dysentery, gauntness, general sickness and death for vaccinated pigs. Hy-Guard has been proven safe as well as experimentally effective. Cost to the producer will be about \$2.50 to \$3 for the two doses per pig. Hy-Guard is currently marketed only through veterinarians and distribution of the vaccine will be extremely limited until mid-1986.

SOILS FERTILITY ROUNDTABLE

Dr. Dale Pennington, Soils Chemist and Head of the Soils Testing Lab at Texas A&M, will be in Cooke County on Monday, Feb. 10, 1986 to visit and discuss soil fertility in the county with producers. If you are having problems with certain fields, bring samples of the plants to the meetings. Times and locations follow:

10:00 a.m. - W.B. Hudspeth, Inc. - Era

2:00 p.m. - Cooke County Fairgrounds - Gainesville

If you have soils that need testing for additional nitrogen or for grain sorghum planting, bring them to the meetings and Dale can take them back to A&M for testing. Regular soil tests cost \$6.
