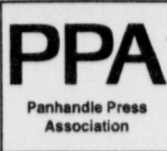

A QUICK READ OF THE NEWS

City Council meeting

A discussion with city sanitation contractor Duncan Disposal about a proposed rate increase is one of several items on the agenda when the Muleshoe City Council meets at 8:30 a.m. on Tuesday.

Other items on the agenda include discussions about the ongoing city manager search, possible renovations at the Muleshoe Public Library and a Wastewater survey conducted by Parkhill, Smith & Cooper, and awarding bids on city police vehicles.

Wheelabrator responds

A Southwestern Public Service Co. subcontractor has documented most of the \$4 million in questioned costs passed on to SPS customers, according to a letter filed this week with the Public Utilities Commission.

Analysis of new information provided by Wheelabrator Coal Service Co. indicates the disputed charges may be narrowed to less than \$400,000.

In August, PUC began investigating the way SPS manages its fuel contractors to determine whether the utility's customers have been billed improper costs.

A former employee sent a letter to the utility commission in December alleging that Wheelabrator has been grossly mismanaged.

Wheelabrator handles coal at SPS' Tolk Plant generator station located just outside Muleshoe.

Based on the \$400,000 in charges still in dispute, SPS spokesman Bill Crenshaw said the amount that would be credited to the average residential customer would be less than 15 cents.

Never too old for school

The mix-up happened because a list of local residents had only the last two digits of his birth date, Roland Dougoud, town hall secretary said.

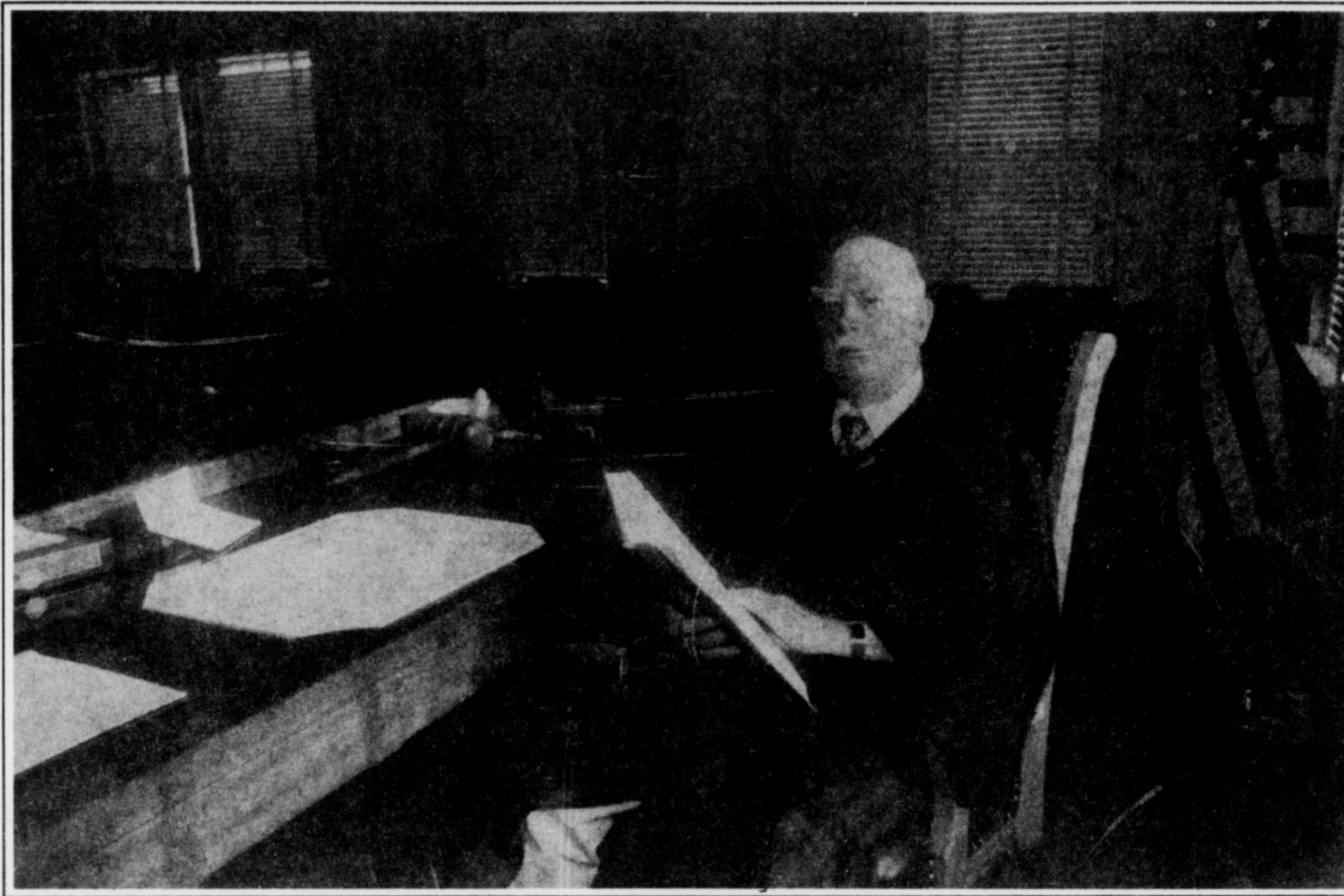
So the man, along with 65 5-year-olds in the town, received a letter ordering him to start school. As a result, "we have changed the computer program in question," Dougoud said.

Judge Young retiring after 4 decades of service

Struggling to get through law school, Jack D. Young made a pact with God. If the Almighty helped him get through the difficult time, Young promised he would serve the people.

It was a promise he kept.

The longtime 287th Judicial District Court Judge will retire in December after 42 years as a public servant in Bailey County. He also served as county and district attorney.

A banquet is being held in Young's honor at 6 p.m. on Saturday, Nov. 21 at the Bailey County Coliseum.

Sponsored by the 287th Judicial Bar Association, the event is open to the public and is free of charge.

Former law partner Gordon "Corky" Green of Muleshoe described Young as a loyal friend and a staunch defender of justice.

He said Young possesses a true love for the law and an innate sense of fairness.

"Judge Young always took time to listen to a case," said Green, who will take over as district judge.

"Regardless of what he might have thought, he always let you tell your side of the case. Not all judges do that."

Young considers himself lucky because he always knew he was going to be a lawyer, although he can't exactly pinpoint why.

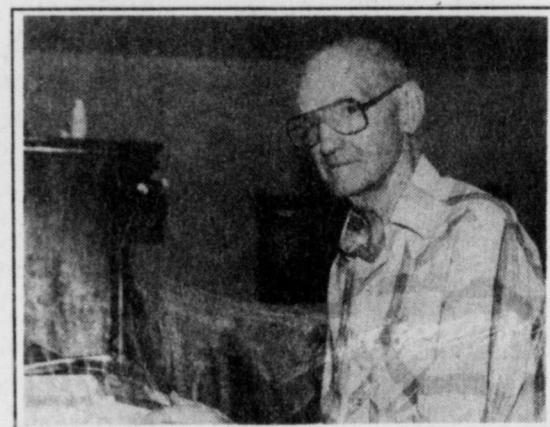

J.C. Shanks collects poems for his booklets

Shanks preserving his family history

J.C. Shanks had a lot of time to think about the "good old days" while in the hospital for hip surgery in April.

He thought about his great granddaughters and how they often asked their Pa Pa for stories about the family's history. So he decided to record his family's history in a book he affectionately called "Pa Pa's Memories." It ended up being written for the entire family.

"I started writing and my family started reading what I wrote and they liked it and wanted me to write more," said Shanks, a longtime Bailey County resident.

Prior to recording his family history, the charismatic Shanks limited his "writing" to making booklets of poems he collected.

His most recent collection of poems is called "Friends."

Shanks was born on April 24, 1917 in Brown County. He has been living in Muleshoe since he was 11 years old, growing up

Five Area continues upgrading Internet services

Five Area Systems Inc. Wednesday unveiled its new in-house e-mail server.

The new server is a faster, more reliable system and part of Five Area's plans to constantly upgrade its Internet services according to company officials.

The company sent a notification letter to e-mail customers earlier in the week about a simple software change needed to continue with the service.

Previously, Five Area used an e-mail server in Lubbock.

Danny Dunagan, the company's computer and Internet technician, said that people had problems with the service, waiting anywhere from 15 minutes to three hours to get their service running again, because the old system was not monitored well.

"We monitor our own system now and can fix any problems within minutes," Dunagan said.

Dunagan explains that the Internet server accepts a dialing call

once a person logs on to the "net." It then authorizes its user.

Dunagan said that the future will probably bring bigger and better equipment, but right now, "we have state of the art technology and when newer equipment comes out, we plan to update it."

Five Area is currently serving over 700 customers.

"Right now, 96 customers can access the line," said Dunagan. "One out of every seven people that we serve can get online without a busy signal."

Sandy Vandevender, assistant general manager, said "we actually have a better average than the national average which is one out of every ten people that can access the Internet at once."

"Most people know about the Internet," Vandevender said, "but they just don't know how it works." He said that servers are the traffic cops of the Internet. They tell everything where to go and what to do.

Five Area has been a local Internet provider for the past two years.

Ag service needs stats for 1998-99

AUSTIN — From the early promise of El Nino's winter rains and the record 1998 wheat yield, to a spring and summer drought affecting crops and livestock, back to flooding and large livestock losses this fall, Texas agriculture has seen it all.

How does it all add up for 1998, and how do prospects look for 1999?

The Texas Agricultural Statistics Service (TASS), a part of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS), is preparing to answer those questions with end-of-year crop estimates for 1998 and beginning of season forecasts for 1999.

To obtain the data that are essential to the estimating process, TASS will begin contacting farmers and ranchers on Nov. 23 on their fall crop and livestock surveys.

There is always speculation about each new crop season, and agricultural producers are the main source of the facts. These surveys are extremely important in assessing crop and livestock losses in 1998 as well as providing the first clear indications of the potential production of winter wheat in 1999.

NASS and TASS estimates are widely used. Producers rely on the data to reach valid production, marketing, and investment decisions. Industry analysts, extension agents, and farm organizations use the information in a variety of ways that benefit farmers and ranchers.

Those who decide farm programs and request or issue disaster declarations also rely on these unbiased forecasts and estimates.

"There was never a question I was going to be a lawyer," said the still spry 69-year-old. "And I was fortunate enough to be able to do it. It's been a rewarding career."

He said it would be the greatest job in the world if he didn't have to deal with family court cases, "They just tear my heart out."

But a judge is a slave to the law.

"Most days, I rule differently than what's in my heart," Young said. "But I've got to follow the law."

He remembers going to the Bailey County Courthouse in the 1930s as a youngster when his dad was serving on a murder jury. He remembers watching parts of the trial and wanting to be "one of those men standing there during all the hollerin'."

The son of Tye and Mary Young, Jack Young was born and raised in Bailey County. His family owned and operated a chicken hatchery and

also farmed in the Progress community.

"We were poor, but everybody was poor back then," Young said.

He remembers going to town on Saturdays and growing up like most kids — a little on the mischievous side.

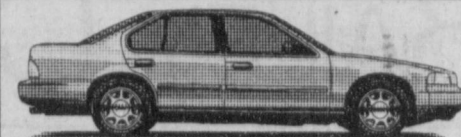
Baseball and boxing were King in the 1930s and 40s and Young fancied himself a boxer at one point. It was a short-lived career. "I fought this fellow and he whipped me pretty good. I figured I had had enough."

Young served 18 months in the Navy during the Korean War and was stationed in Maine, where he found out the people were "as friendly as they are anywhere if you let them be."

His retirement plans include mixing in family time, recreation and occasional work as a substitute judge.

"I'm going to play golf and do a little fishing," Young said. "But not too much of either one."

He said "40 years ago he could have retired and enjoyed it, but right now he's scared to death."

"I gathered these poems for her (his wife Odessa) and put them in a box and she said she'd read them when she got old."

She never got to read them.

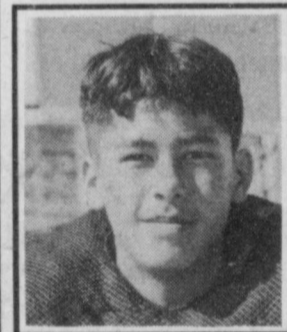
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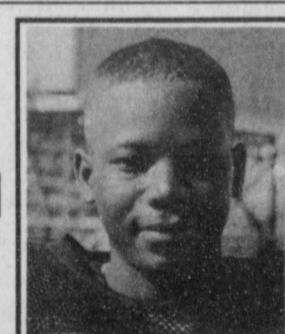
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SCAC names citizens of the month
