

Tigers, Tigerettes are district track champs

The Sacred Heart Tigers and Tigerettes raced their way to the TCIL District III-AAA District Championship here Saturday. The Tigers ran away with the boys' division with 188 points as runner-up St. John's compiled 149 points. The Tigerettes had a tough time holding off the St. John girls by a six-point margin 173-166.

After the field events, the Tigers found themselves trailing the St. John Crusaders 51-49. Picking up points in the morning session for the Tigers were Deano Bayer with a 4th in the discus and a 3rd in the shot. David Halley collected two for the Tigers in the discus. Doug Aston scored 20 points for the Tigers as he captured 1st in the high jump and 1st in the pole vault. Scott Taylor soared over the 20 mark with a leap of 20'7 1/4" to place 1st in the long jump and tied for 2nd in the high jump.

The Tigers, trailing by two after the field events, took command in the 3200-meter run and did not look back. Darrell Dangelmayr

placed 1st, followed by Glen Swirczynski in 2nd and Deano Bayer in 5th.

The 400-meter relay team of Ryan Bayer, Deano Bayer, David Halley and Glen Swirczynski raced to a 3rd. In the 800-meter run the coaching strategy of Coaches Schilling and Bartush helped Wayne Becker capture 1st with a PR of 2:07.82. John Nasche picked up four points for his Tiger teammates with a 4th place finish.

In the 110-meter hurdles Doug Aston brought home the gold and Darrell Dangelmayr placed 5th. Doug Aston also scored points in the 100-meter dash as he placed 3rd.

In the 400-meter run the Tigers swept the medals as Scott Taylor raced to a 55.15 clocking for 1st and he was followed by Wayne Becker and Ryan Becker who scored a PR in the event. Taylor repeated his gold performance in the 200-meter with a time of 23.94.

The tandem of Nasche and Dangelmayr finished 1-2 in the 1600-meter run. Swirczynski and Halley generated points for the Tigers with their 5th and 6th finish in the 300-meter hurdles. Rounding out the scoring for the Tigers was the mile-relay team of Taylor, Aston, Bayer and Becker. That crew raced to 1st to highlight a number one day.

In the girls' division, the Tigerettes and the Crusaders of Ennis set the stage early as after the field events the two found themselves separated by a mere two points. Scoring points for the Tigerettes in the field events were Kerry Haverkamp and Vickie Schmitt, finishing 1-2 in the shot put and discus. Sally Stoffels placed 4th in the discus. Michelle Walter leaped 30'4 1/4" for a 2nd place finish in the triple jump and also captured 3rd in the long jump. Co-op reports continued growth

This year's annual meeting of Cooke County Electric Cooperative was held on April 14 at the Muenster Public School auditorium.

The tone of the meeting was set with some outstanding music furnished by the Cooke County College Pop Singers under the direction of Glenn Wilson.

The business session then followed with reports, an outstanding speaker and door prize drawings.

President Robert T. Lewis welcomed everyone and made comments about the importance of the member-consumer attendance at the annual meeting. He also recognized the cooperative's employees for their dedication and commitment to their jobs.

Michael E. Sloan, General Manager, reported on the operations of the Cooperative for the year by stating, "1985 saw continued growth for the Cooperative in kilowatt hour sales, in plant investment and in the number of consumers served. While it was not the best year of the past several years insofar as net margins produced, in today's rapidly changing and seemingly mixed-up business environment one has to continually look on the positive side even though at times it is difficult to do so."

Mr. Sloan went on to say that, "kilowatt hour sales continued to increase but at a level well below 1984. The annual percentage increase was 3.9 percent with farm and residential consumption increasing slightly more than commercial."

He then added, "Revenue in 1985 increased by \$334,346 as a result of the increase in kilowatt hour sales, while revenue per kilowatt hour declined by approximately one-quarter mill due to slightly reduced fuel and purchased power adjustment costs passed on through the fuel and

purchase power adjustment clause."

Mr. Sloan commented, "The cost of purchased power totaling \$13,035,142 was 86 percent of total revenue. Total variable operating and non-variable operating expenses excluding the cost of purchased power were up \$143,000."

In regard to continuity of service, Mr. Sloan stated, "Contributing to our maintenance expense is the fact that over the past five years a contract crew has been reclearing and trimming trees to prevent them from interfering with the operation of the distribution facilities. We feel that this has and will translate into better continuity of service to the consumer."

He then stated, "The increase in operating expenses and a slower growth rate in kilowatt hour sales combined to reduce net operating margins some 28 percent below the 1984 level."

Mr. Sloan concluded his report by adding, "Management Audit of the Cooperative was performed by the audit staff of the Public Utility Commission of Texas. The reason Cooke County Electric Cooperative was selected for the audit, we now understand, was based on operating and financial statistics and ratios which were assembled by the Commission from regular reports which we are

1986 Texas 4-H Congress

Texas 4-H Congress is for older 4-H members who are at least 15 years of age at the time Congress is held.

This year's Congress will take place in Austin from July 13-16, 1986. Headquarters will be at the Marriott at the Capitol.

The theme is "Citizenship: Past, Present, Future." Delegates will be involved in the legislative process: writing bills, debating and voting on bills, meeting in the Senate and House Chambers of the State Capitol.

In addition, delegates will be asked to visit and interview their state representatives and/or senator to learn more about the legislative process before participating in Congress. This will be an excellent opportunity for older 4-H members to visit and tour the state's capitol and to learn how

state laws are made. They will also meet prominent people in state government. A special treat will be a party celebrating the Texas Sesquicentennial.

The previous "one time attendance" rule has been modified. Two different kinds of Texas 4-H Congresses are now conducted:

- a) A 4-H Legislature Congress in Austin on even years.

CCC plans Alamo film

Dr. Procter is a well known historian, and was a good friend of the late Texas Ranger Captain Tom Hickman, and is also an authority on the Texas Rangers.

PUC orders TP&L refund

The Public Utility Commission today issued a final order which allows Texas Power & Light Co. to refund money which was overcollected from customers under the previous fixed charge for fuel.

The order allows TP&L, Texas Electric Service Co. and Dallas Power & Light to refund \$140.3 million, the amount overcollected through Jan. 31.

Harry Bomar, Manager of the TP&L Gainesville District, said the average residential customer will receive a refund of \$34.

Bomar explained that TP&L residential customers will receive a credit on their May bills, based on their kilowatt-hour use multiplied by an agreed-upon "refund factor."

The new charges are expected to save customers about five percent on their bills. Bomar said the savings have been made possible by the declining cost of natural gas.

"The decreased cost of natural gas has allowed us to aggressively seek the less expensive gas fuel," he said.

Gas is burned to make slightly more than half the electricity used by customers.

The refund applies to the more than two million customers of TP&L, DP&L and TESCO. The companies serve about one-third of the population of Texas.

required to make to the Commission.

Cooke County was the most efficient of the 75 electric cooperative distribution systems operating in Texas. This audit was done over a period of several months beginning in August of last year. A report on the audit was issued in the last week of February, 1986, and a public hearing was held on April 2, 1986. Most of the recommendations were not in our opinion of a serious nature or will not substantially impact our operations. It is our intention to give effect to these recommendations as soon as it is practical to do so.

General Manager Sloan presented to Richard Swirczynski, who retired recently, a plaque recognizing his 40 years of outstanding service.

The election followed with Robert Lewis being returned to the board of directors from District 3, Jesse Haralson being returned from District 6, and Ray Powell being returned from District 7, all for a three-year term.

Jimmy Jack Biffle, Director for District 5, introduced the guest speaker, Tom Haywood, Executive Vice President for North Texas Oil and Gas. Mr. Haywood discussed the dilemma that the oil and gas industry is in, due to significant falling gas prices. He made it quite clear that no solution to this disturbing problem is on the horizon. He en-

couraged everyone to be patient and, with a united industry, eventually things will return to normal. He pointed out that approximately one year ago over 4000 rigs were running in the continental United States and at present, less than 1100. He expressed concern for our national security. The speech was well received by the audience.

The meeting was concluded with the drawing for door prizes.

Industrial Board hears report by Joe Fenton on development meeting

The Muenster Industrial Board met April 15, at 5:30 p.m. in the Chamber of Commerce office. Joe Fenton, City Manager, gave a report on the Planning Economic Development for Rural Areas and Small Cities workshop he attended April 2 and 3. The workshop was sponsored by East Texas Chamber of Commerce and Texas Extension Agency.

Mr. Fenton stated the workshop emphasized the need to work with our industrial development allies, the utility companies, transportation and banks. If these allies are unaware of the prospective development, it could be costly to the city in loss of industry.

The second day was given to discussion of the Economics of Industrial Development. The workshop stressed the following as points most often considered: quality of life in the community, a community audit, appearance of the community, medical and dental facilities, emergency medical service, and the overall attitude of the people in the community. These are points we are already working on in many areas.

It is a fact that 80 percent of expansion is generated by existing industry. It was recommended targeting industry that would be complementary to what is already in your community. The central aim would be to attract industry

that would be good for the entire community, not just a small percentage.

It was advised to make haste slowly and set up a master plan to follow and then to stick to the plan. One of the first needs in this respect is to find the right leadership. "Our community has several leaders who are interested in seeing Muenster grow. These leaders need to unite their efforts to get the maximum good for the community," Fenton said.

Suggestions for community action included: improve community attitudes, improve physical appearance, improve infrastructure (water, sewer, water treatment), provide effective programs to support retail merchants, obtain responses from consumers, survey the existing industries for ideas of improvement, offer business management training, promote tourism. Notable as the last item on the list is to look for new industry.

Home loan program to assist veterans

Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro today announced plans for a Texas Veterans Home Improvement Loan Program designed to enable eligible Texas Veterans to make substantial repairs and improvements on existing homes.

"This program is designed to respond to the thousands of requests our office has received from Texas Veterans who need assistance maintaining existing older homes but who have been frozen out of limited conventional home improvement money by high interest rates," said Mauro, who also serves as Chairman of the Texas Veterans Land Board.

Starting in May, Texas Veterans may apply for a maximum \$17,500 fixed-rate, 15-year 11.5 percent loan for improvements to single family residences (\$20,000 for 2-4 family residences). The minimum loan amount is \$5,000. No down payment is required and all loans are 100 percent FHA-insured.

The loans can be applied to single family attached and

detached houses, townhouses, units of a condominium development or planned unit development as well as 2-4 family units constructed at least 5 years prior to the closing date of the loan.

The program will be funded through general obligation bonds approved for the Texas Veterans Housing Assistance Program in November, 1985.

Texas Veterans can apply for the loans through lenders approved by the Texas Veterans Land Board. Participating lenders are required to be FHA approved to originate HUD Title I loans and all loans must be eligible for financing under the HUD Title I Program.

"The built-in protection of using only FHA-approved lenders will help protect the interests of Texas Veterans by ensuring that all work is done to FHA Title I standards," Mauro said.

Eligibility requirements for the Texas Veterans Home Improvement Loan Program are identical to those of the Texas Veterans Housing Assistance Program, that is, a Veteran must also have been a bonafide resident of Texas at the time of entry into the military or have been a bonafide resident of Texas for at least five consecutive years immediately prior to applying for a loan; be honorably discharged, or currently serving in the Armed Forces; and be a bonafide resident of Texas at the time of application.

quire 24 persons. Those wishing to judge seven or eight entries are invited to volunteer by coming to the Chamber of Commerce office and discuss it with Maudine Griffin, secretary. Please apply in person, not by telephone. Judging could be an excellent task for senior citizens.

The cook-off area will be open to visitors Saturday and Sunday. Participants invite visitors to come by and chat when they attend Germanfest 1986.

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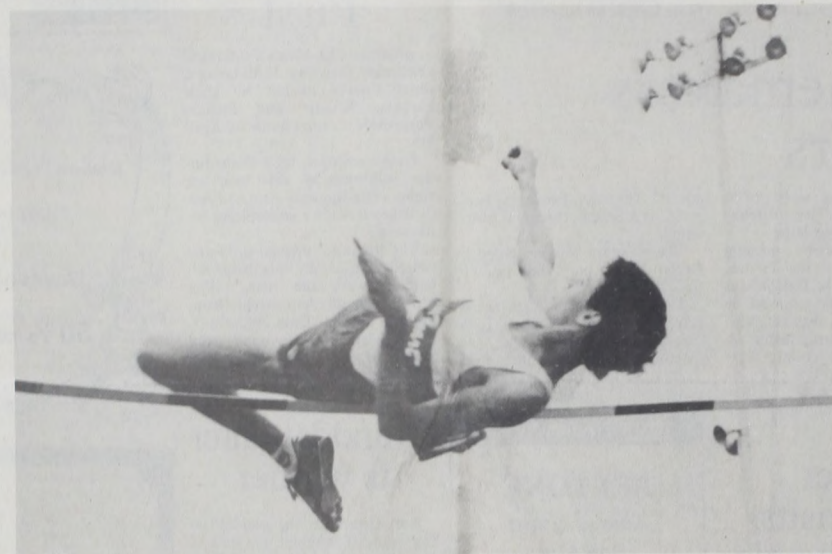
