Sgt. Gruber was born December 9, 1915, in Albany, Ga., and moved to Lindsay with his parents in 1921. He attended school there and enlisted in the Army on October 27, 1937, receiving his infantry training at Fort Sam Houston. In 1940 he re-enlisted to serve in Hawaii two years. He was on the Island when Pearl Harbor was attacked, and remained there until December of last year when he was transferred to the Solomon Islands, being stationed on Guadalcanal



TAX IS EXPLAINED BY COUNTY AGENT

Here are some points on the payas-you go Federal Income tax plan which may help farm folks understand how it operates. The law went into effect on July 1.

First, says A.S. Brient, County Agent, it is not a tax revenue bill It is merely a collecting device changing the time and method of paying your income taxes. The tax revenue bill passed last year and the Victory tax, which began January 1, still are in effect.

Brient reminds farmers eligible to pay income tax of one requirement of the law which affects

them especially. They must file an estimated income tax return on or before December fifteenth, 1943 -And, by the way, a farmer under the law is one who obtains at

least eighty per cent of his gross income from farming. On this return a farmer's permissible deductions as well as his taxable income, both for income and Victory tax, will be calculated. Forms for this return are now available. All taxes paid so far this year will be credited to payment of the 1943

Froclamation To THE PEOPLE OF THE UNITED STATES

Proclamation

RECOGNIZING THE FACT that in carrying the war into enemy territory, we shall need greater amounts of money than any nation has ever asked from its citizens in all history, I, FRANKLIN D. ROOSEVELT, President of the United States of America, do officially proclaim that on Thursday, the ninth of September, 1943, the Third War Loan shall be launched.

As Commander-in-Chief, I hereby invoke every citizen to give all possible aid and support to this Third War Loan drive, not only so that our financial goal may be reached, but to encourage and inspire those of our husbands and fathers and sons who are under fire on a dozen fronts all over the world. It is my earnest hope that every American will realize that in buying War Bonds in this Third War Loan he has an opportunity to express voluntarily and under the guidance of his conscience, the extent to which he will "back the attack."

The American people supported well the first and second War Loan drives and in fact did even more than was asked of them. 



A number of insects such as leaf hoppers, squash borer and the like pass through what is called the nymph stage, which is a worm for all practical purposes, at least as far as efforts to combat it are concerned. Corn borers are worms that drill into the stalks and ears of corn but not to be confused with the corn ear worm that eats the ker-nels although both are highly de-(Above) (To Right) ROSE SLUG structive.

structive. Fortunately the worm problem can be handled with poison sprays especially if spraying is started in time to catch the young worms as they hatch out. Most worms can be killed with lead arsenate and the young plants should be kept well protected by a covering laid on with regular spraying. Keep the plants covered. If it is a rainy season more spraying will be neces-sary than in a dry year. The im-portant thing is to kill each worm before it has time to grow to any size. This cuts off loss of growing plants by getting rid of pests early before the worm has grown large enough to cause extensive damage. 
