Council defines, attacks litter Ordinance passed, muscles flexed

The controversial and much discussed litter ordinance was adopted by the City Council Monday night. Only a few minor revisions were made to the originally published version. Fines for littering in Muenster are now not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$1.000.00 This continuous was

not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$1,000.00. This ordinance was debated for four months and passed unanimously with the revisions in place.

In another trash-related matter, the council decided to add delinquent trash sack bills on to water/sewer bills to aid in collection. It seems that some residents use many more sacks than their anticipated allotment. The 35-centuse many more sacks that their air-ticipated allotment. The 35-cent-per-sack cost is high enough in some cases to merit cutting off water service if the sack charge is not paid. The average household is expected to use approximately one

bundle of sacks in three months.

Many residents of the Endres addition in southeast Muenster at-

addition in southeast Muenster attended the council meeting seeking help for their street problems. Harvey Lamkin spoke for the group. "I understand that the city has flexed their muscle to cause holdouts to do their share in curbing and guttering. You've already lost several intersections and other sections of gravel. We want to know if you can help." Certain land owners in the area have not fulfilled their promises to curb their property. Other residents fear that too much delay may scuttle

Councilmen agree and will notify the un-curbed that they must notify the city of their intentions within 10 days or the city may proceed in its own fashion.

R.N. Fette best remembered by service to God and Country

R.N. Fette, founder and editor of The Muenster Enterprise, died Tuesday morning at his home in Muenster, while working on his column for this week's paper.

Fette was born Dec. 28, 1907 to Henry and Laura Fette of Muenster. He married Elfreda Luke on Aug. 1, 1949.

He is survived by his wife; three sons, David, of Muenster, Dan, of College Station, and Bernie, of Bryan; four grandchildren; a sister, Vina Voth of Muenster; and a brother, Jerry Fette of Waco. He was preceded in death by his parents and five brothers, Joe, Edgar,

Richard, Emmett and Herbie.
Fette earned a degree in English from St. Edward's University in Austin, and taught school in Muenster before establishing The Enterprise. The first issue was published on Thanksgiving Day, 1936. He edited the weekly newspaper continually from that time until his death, except for a term in military service.
Fette was drafted into the Army at the age of 36 during World War II. He entered Officers Candidate School and eventually rose to the rank of Captain. He served at Ft. Leonard Wood, Missouri; Ft. Sill,

nia. He was a member of Sacred Heart Church and the Knights of

Columbus.

Fette was also active in the Muenster Chamber of Commerce and was a former trustee of the Muenster Public Schools. He was honored as "Citizen of the Year" by the Chamber of Commerce in 1968, and received a similar honor from the Muenster Jaycees in 1978.

from the Muenster Jaycees in 1978. He had also received special awards from the Muenster Public Schools and from the Muenster Boys Club, who termed him "Amator Veritatis" or "lover of truth." Fette's opinion column, "Confetti," was a staple feature in The Enterprise. His conservative political philosophy served as a foundation for The Enterprise's policy of reporting events in the Muenster area, as well as the content of his weekly column. The same column was used by the longtime editor to thank his numerous friends for their thoughts and prayers during several hospital stays in recent years.

Those friends remember him as a person who exercised compassion, fairness and dedication in all aspects of life - as a father, husband, businessman and respected member of his church and community.

Gramm effort to repeal windfall profits tax successful in Senate

During debate on the issue, Gramm urged other senators to "remove an absurdity from the larger of the control of th WASHINGTION - The U.S. Senate has approved an amendment co-sponsored by U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm of Texas to repeal the windfall profits tax on oil.

"The Senate has taken an important of the senate has taken an important of the senate has taken as t

"The Senate has taken an impor-tant step toward responding to the depression in the energy industry," Gramm said following the victory. "This is a burdensome tax which has hurt every consumer and every energy producer in Texas," Gramm added.

The senator had proposed epealing the Windfall Profits Tax in legislation introduced earlier this year. The tax originally was passed during the Carter Administration, despite opposition by many Texans.

If approved by the House, elimination of the tax will spell the end to legal requirements which

Repeal of the windfall profits tax, he said, "can have a dramatic impact on the energy industry today and, quite frankly, that industry needs some good news, some positive action."

The senator called the tax "a stifling, deadweight burden on the very incentives that are critical to the future of the nation."

Time to register for fall semester

registration is still a month away, Cooke County College officials say now is the perfect time to prepare for 1986 fall semester enrollment.

for 1986 fall semester enrollment.
"Persons planning to enroll this fall can come in right now and pick up their 'trial schedule' forms," said Dr. Eddie Hadlock, CCC registrar. "Official class schedules for fall have already been printed and can be picked up here in the Registrar's Office too."

Dr. Hadlock explained that the

Dr. Hadlock explained that the trial schedule forms also serve as a "time permit" for fall registration, telling the students on which day and at what hour they are to report

enrolling for the first time can complete all pre-registration complete all pre-registration requirements in one short trip to campus. On registration day, the enrollment process itself should take registration, with a \$5 fee assessed, will run Sept. 2-8.

Classes for the fall 1986 semester will begin on Tuesday, Sept. 2.

Picking up the trial schedule-time permit form is the first of two steps which must be taken by all students wishing to enroll this fall, including returning students and others who may be coming to CCC from another college.

Previously enrolled students who haven't attended CCC since fall of 1985 must - like all persons who will be enrolling at CCC for the first time - fall out a new application for admission form.

Also required of first-time students is a copy of their high school transcript if they graduated within the past five years, transfer students must supply a transcript from the last college attended.

to get in school at CCC, and we hope nobody would stay away because of a fear of, or aversion to, a lot of complicated paperwork and red tape. We've worked hard eliminate as much of the hassle as possible."







Heat causes record usage in Texas

Sweltering heat has brought record usage of electricity by customers of the Texas Utilities system. And with that, higher usage will come somewhat higher than normal bills for electric services.

Harry Bomar, District Manager for Texas Power & Light in Gainesville, said customer demand set successive new records on July 28 and 29, and then topped out at 16,537,000 kilowatts on July 30. This compared with the previous all-time high of 15,898,000 kilowatts set Aug. 19, 1985.

"It's been a great challenge for the system to meet these demands," said Bomar, "but all our generating facilities have been up and running and we've been able to maintain a comfortable operating reserve."

Much of the increased demand.

Much of the increased demand Much of the increased demand for electricity was brought on by the heat, Bomar said, but he pointed out that the TU system has added nearly 90,000 new customers in the past 12 months making a significant contribution to the higher usage. Bomar said electric bills will most certainly be higher.



County Agent's Report

The question often comes up as to what is the optimum seeding rate for wheat and other small grain. There are several factors we must first consider. Those factors that would favor lower seeding rates include: early

Planting dates have a definite influence on seeding rate. The earlier the grains are planted in the fall, the lower the seeding rate. With the onset of fall and winter, we have the possibility of losing some stand populations through freezing or heaving of soils. Due to colder weather, we can also experience less tillering with late planted small grains. Early planting will also call for reduced rates of phosphorus fertilization. The warmer weather will give plants better early growth and so the need for less phosphorus.

To graze or not will also influence your seeding rate. With the increase of grazing you lose some plant population from trampling and pulling up of plants. In a grazing situation it would be helpful to increase seeding rates.

And the increase in insect pressures and seedling diseases will also in-

This past year, we ran two trials on seeding at 50, 75 and 100 pound rates. The following chart shows the results.

CALCIUM-FORTIFIED FOODS CAN'T REPLACE DAIRY PRODUCTS - The food industry is now marketing a number of calcium-fortified foods to nutrition-conscious women who believe they, may be at risk for developing osteoporosis. Osteoporosis is a disease of brittle and porous bones that affects millions of middle-aged to elderly women, making them more prone to fractures. Calcium-fortified foods currently on the market include some brands of diet carbonated soft drinks and non-carbonated soft drink mixes, bread and flour... 'Eating calcium-fortified products in a balanced diet that still includes dairy products may be helpful,' says nutritionist Dr. Alice Hunt, 'especially since the Recommended Daily Allowance of 800 milligrams of calcium per day is thought by many medical experts to be too low.' However, she cautions that when dairy products are replaced with calcium-fortified foods, other important nutrients from dairy products such as protein, vitamin D, riboflavin, B-6 and B-12 are lost. It's especially important that teenagers

especially important that teenagers and children eat dairy products both for the calcium and the other nutrients they provide, tresses the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service specialist.






