

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

Army To Call Fathers After October First

Pre-Pearl Harbor Dads To Don Khaki To Fill **Draft Board Quotas**

Local draft boards were authorized by selective service Monday to call up pre-Pearl Harbor fathers after October 1, but only to the extent "absolutely required" to meet their monthly quotas.

One estimate was that only 300,000 fathers living with and supporting children born before September 15 and not engaged in non-deferrable work would actually be inducted this year.

Since there are 6,569,000 non-ferming fathers this would indi-

farming fathers, this would indicate that only about one of 22 will be called in 1943.

The 744,000 fathers regularly working in agriculture will continue practically draft-proof for occupational reasons.

Reclassifications may begin at once, but local boards were forbidden to order fathers to report for induction before October 1st if they are maintaining a bona fida home relationship with children born before September 15, and are not workers in activities classed as non-deferable.

Boards were also instructed to call single and childless married men first if they have no occupa-tion or hardship grounds for de-ferrment and to make reclassifica-tion out of the father's 3-A group only as needed to meet demands upon a local board for men for

military service.

The calling of fathers will be according to their draft order numbers regardless of the number or the age of their children, unless they are granted deferrment as "essential" in agriculture or industry or unless their induction would mean "extreme hardship and privation" to their families. The policy of not drafting men

To put off the actual calling 1 as possible War Man Power Commissioner McNutt said local boards were told again "to comb the ranks of the 2,976,000 men who previously have been examined and deferred in 4-F as unfit for military service and to sift out registrants who may now be quali-

fied for duty".

McNutt disclosed that the August and September quotas call for induction of 275,000 men each month, with the army getting 175, 000, and the navy, marines and coast guard 100,000 each month.

The July quota was 325,000.

During the last quarter of this year, when fathers will be eligible ranks of youths newly turned 18 and another 175,000 from the nonfathers still in civilian life.

Fathers will make up the majority of the nearly 200,000 to be inducted monthly in the first half of next year according to tentative selective estimates, although the actual size of 1944 calls will depend largely on the extent of combat casualties.

Opening a checking account

In opening a checking account at any bank, whether it be an individual, a corporation or a partnership, the procedure involved is substantially the same. Suppose for example, that you yourself want to open a checking account "Returning to the fight, I at a bank. The first thing to consider in opening your first account is that you must ascertain from the bank what is the minimum amount they will accept on deposit for a checking account.

Many banks have various amounts they will accept as a minimum account, such as ten, twenlars. Your next step should be to make inquiry about the service charge in effect at the bank where you are opening your account, so that you will be enabled to regulate your withdrawls to get the maximum service at minimum

You will then fill out a signature card, which contains an agreement setting forth the conditions on which the bank will accept deposits and will pay checks drawn against your account. By signing the card you give the bank Ginger Rogers—Cary Grant In Card Specimen of the signature of the signatur an exact specimen of the signacard, such as former banking relations, your age, occupation, etc.

Your card is indexed and filed which is a guide when any question arises over the signature appearing on your checks. You will then be given a deposit blank upon which you will enter your deposit items, if coin or currency or if other checks you will itimize them on your deposit. You are then provided with a book of bank checks, which are provided with stubs for you to keep a record of all checks given.

It is a wise practice to use only the checks from your own book, it enables you to check your account against your bank statement at all time.

The method in which your withdrawls travel is interesting to follow. It varies from a simple operation completed within one bank to a highly complicated procedure involving many banks. We are all familiar with a transaction whereby one gives a check to a local store. The merchant merely adds your check to a list of other checks and deposits them in the bank. He is given credit on the bank's books and your check is posted by the bookkeeper to your account, which transaction does not change in the least the total of the Bank's deposits

Suppose, however you mailed a check to a distant firm for some merchandise. Your check is, like the first case, placed in the distant firm's bank for collection.
