This donation, along with like amounts from the Chamber of Commerce, Muenster Jaycees, Knights of Columbus and Wholesale Beer Distributors Association, completes Muenster's \$2,500.00 share at no expense to the city of Muenster. Fenton extended sincere thanks to these organizations for their generosity.

The system works like this: All

The system works like this: All administration, maintenance and dispatching is handled by the city from city hall. The driver helps riders and arranges schedules. The Regional Planning Commission pays 80 percent of the cost of the van. Muenster pays 20 percent (estimated at \$2,500.00), Both entities share in the cost of the program 50-50. In addition, the Commission will credit Muenster for services provided to the program including office rent, telephone, and answering and scheduling, also vehicle storage. A grant from the Commission pays the driver's wage, insurance and \$100 per month for gasoline.

Since they share operations costs 50-50 and receive credit for services provided, the city, in effect, pays its share in kind. Any costs paid or covered by the city over their half share are reimbursed by the Commission to the city in cash. The city could even make a little money and will certainly not lose any.

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

### Texas receives Class B for brucellosis

A Class B brucellosis classification for Texas has been approved by the U.S. Department of Agriculture as of April 1, 1987.

"This is a tremendous achievement for the livestock industry. It is the cooperation of cattle producers that makes this possible," John S. Cargile, Chairman of Texas Animal Health Commission coid.

Texas Animal Health Commission, said.

Texas had been classified as a Class C and Class B state since 1980. With the Class B status, the B-C line will be eliminated, and the B designation will mean less restriction on movement interstate of cattle for producers in Texas, Carollesaid. Cargile said.

Increased efforts will be needed in the future to reach the eradica-tion goal, and Cargile said TAHC

tion goal, and Cargile said TAHC is taking measures now to assist producers in this effort.

Nationwide, there are now six states with the Class B status. There are 19 states with a Class A status and 23 with a Free status, one B-c and one C state.

"Our next step is to meet the Class A status as mandated by USDA," Cargile said. He also noted that other states are putting more and more pressure on Texas producers to increase efforts to control and eradicate brucellosis.

"Actually, we are getting more

"Actually, we are getting more pressure from states to 'clean up our act' than from the federal government. This shows to me we need to meet the challenge of rid ding this state of brucellosis as expeditiously as possible," Cargil

The recent cool weather has slowed the development of wheat diseases in the county. However, with the onset of warmer temperatures, we should see an increase in the leaf rust infestations on some varieties. Leaf rust shows up as a flecking and then in approximately 5 to 7 days the flecking will break out into a rust colored pustule.

We have been getting some inquiries into the fungicides to use for wheat leaf rust control. If you have a severe case of rust, then the best fungicide to use would the 4-ounce rate of Bayleton. Bayleton is a Mobay Chemical Company product. You would need to use a spreader or penetrator with this fungicide in 5 gallons of water per acre. This reatment should last anywhere. Bayleton plus 2 pounds of Dithane (M-45) will prevent rust infestations from developing up a plant. This treatment will last approximately 14 days. Bayleton is costing approximately 33 per ounce and the Dithane will cost about \$1.80 per pound. Both treatments are fairly expensive so producers must evaluate fields in order to see that they have at least a 40 bushel potential yield per acre on their wheat crop. Take into consideration when estimating bushel yield: the fertility program you used, the variety of wheat, the rate, and other factors that would account for yield per acre.
