Council welcomes new mayor

Outgoing mayor Richard Grewing handed over his key to City Hall Monday night. After 23 years of service as alderman and mayor, more time in service than any other Muenster citizen, Grewing welcomed Ted Henschel as the new mayor. With no contests in the election, only 53 voters turned out to elect former mayor pro-tem Henschel. They also endorsed Willie Wimmer returning to the council and Al Hess, a new member who will replace Henschel.

Mayor Grewing stated in leaving that he had enjoyed his time on the council and thanked all the citizens for their support. He wished good luck to those remaining on the

council in all areas of city business especially the proposed new lake and city landfill.

"I've spent some 23 years on this council and anytime I can help the city in some area, I certainly will."

Concerning the current battle over the telephone company tower, Grewing said that he held no grudges against anyone. "I wish there would have been no need for the city to get involved in this lawsuit (challenging the zoning ordinance)," he said, "I wish Mr. Fuhrman and Mr. Rohmer could have come to an agreement over the tower and settled it right there. I think that tower is important to the future of the whole Muenster area."

The former mayor stated in an interview Wednesday, "I didn't approve of the way that the permit was handled by the city or the Telephone Company, but, since it's already up and no one stopped its construction, I think it would be a shame to demand it comes down without a trial period. It (the

tower) has obvious benefit to the city and surrounding area. If any hazard were to develop, then it could come down." When asked about the lawsuit he said, "I was out of town and in no way was consulted in the hiring of the attorney or the conduct of the lawsuit. I do not approve now of the way it is being handled. The money being spent now on legal expenses could be much better spent."

Grewing finished by reiterating that he especially wanted to thank all the citizens for their support through the years.

Mayor Henschel, in his first official statement, extended sincere thanks on behalf of the council and all the citizens to Rich for his valuable service and leadership.

City Administrator Joe Fenton next announced that he was happy to report that the required \$2500.00 to start the Mini-Bus service in Muenster was finally in hand. The council approved the necessary order and Mayor Ted Henschel

Accreditation team visits Sacred Heart

The week ending March 28 was a busy time for Sacred Heart School teachers and staff as they opened their doors to an accreditation team, whose purpose is to replace the school's State Accreditation, which expires in 1989, with the Southern Association of College and School Accreditation and the Texas Catholic Conference School Accreditation.

For three days, the visiting teams interviewed teachers, staff, students and parents and observed all phases of the school's programs. The committee also reviewed Sacred Heart's self-study plan and made recommendations of their own which will be incor-

porated with the school's plan into a long range plan of continued school self-improvement.

At the concluding meeting on Friday, March 27, teachers, staff and school board members heard only praise for Sacred Heart School from Mr. Gene Phillips of the Southern Association. He stated, "The Sacred Heart School is a unique system in modern Catholic Education. It appears to be the only tuition-free twelve grade school in the state and one of the few in the nation. That status has been attained by the determination of the pastor to provide a choice of educational

The Sacred Heart Tigerettes claimed the girls' division and the Muenster Hornets captured the runner-up trophy in the 1st Annual Sacred Heart Invitational Relays held at the Muenster track facility on Saturday. Over 400 athletes took part in the event and some outstanding individual performances were turned in.

For the girls' division, the Tigerettes of Sacred Heart scored 134 points to avenge an earlier loss to the Chico Lady Dragons who were runner-up with 97½ points. Lindsay claimed third with 69½ points and the Hornets of Muenster claimed fourth place with 41 points.

In the girls' field events, Sacred

Heart's Kerry Haverkamp tossed the discus 108'4½" to claim first place for the Tigerettes. In the shot put, Halman of Chico took home the gold and Haverkamp and Vickie Schmitt of Sacred Heart took second and third. In the long jump, Easley of Chico was first and Michelle Walter of Sacred Heart captured the fourth spot. Vanessa Zmolik of St. John's won the high jump. In the triple jump, Easley of Chico won her second gold of the day and Walter of Sacred Heart finished 5th followed by Deanna Bierschenk of Muenster in 6th.

The running events opened with Julie Dodd of Prairie Valley displaying why she is the UIL girls' cross country champion as she

completed the 3200m run in a time of 12:08.02. Sharon Henschel and Shonna Reiter of Muenster and Amy Bayer of Sacred Heart had outstanding individual performances for third, fourth and fifth respectively. Saint Jo jumped out of the blocks in the 400m relay and never looked back on their way to the gold medal win. The Tigerette squad of Michelle Walter, Noelle Hesse, LaBecca Hess and Amy Walterscheid were nipped at the wire by Lindsay for second. In the 800m run, Lucy Fuhrmann of Lindsay edged Muenster's Deanna Bierschenk for the gold. Sacred Heart's Danna Hamric captured the bronze with a fine performance. Muenster's Shonna Reiter placed fifth and Sacred Heart's Sally Stoffels picked up a point for the meet champions with a sixth place finish.

Chico's Hallenbeck captured the hurdles and Sacred Heart's Lisa Hamric, running her first hurdle race of the season, finished sixth. Sacred Heart's Molly Koelzer continued her unbeaten string as she raced to another 100m win. Melody Klement of Muenster finished sixth. In the 800m relay, the Tigerettes' team of Walter, Hesse, Hess and Walterscheid claimed the gold and the Hornets' team brought home the bronze.

Sacred Heart's Molly Koelzer continued her unbeaten string in the 400 as she breezed to a first place finish. Angela Endres of the Tigerettes claimed fifth place. In the 200m dash, Harris of Bells outleaded Sacred Heart's Amy Walterscheid for the gold and Muenster's LaNell Sicking took the sixth spot. Prairie Valley's Dodd won her double distance event of the day with a gold mile victory. Sacred Heart's Sharon Henschel and Amy Bayer claimed the fourth

Minibus nears reality for Muenster

Joe Fenton, city administrator and driving force behind the hoped-for mini-bus service for Muenster, announced Wednesday that Muenster State Bank has donated \$500.00 to the program. This donation, along with like amounts from the Chamber of Commerce, Muenster Jaycees, Knights of Columbus and Wholesale Beer Distributors Association, completes Muenster's \$2,500.00 share at no expense to the city of Muenster. Fenton extended sincere thanks to these organizations for their generosity.

The system works like this: All administration, maintenance and dispatching is handled by the city from city hall. The driver helps riders and arranges schedules. The Regional Planning Commission pays 80 percent of the cost of the van. Muenster pays 20 percent (estimated at \$2,500.00). Both entities share in the cost of the program 50-50. In addition, the Commission will credit Muenster for services provided to the program including office rent, telephone, and answering and scheduling, also vehicle storage. A grant from the Commission pays the driver's wage, insurance and \$100 per month for gasoline.

Since they share operations costs 50-50 and receive credit for services provided, the city, in effect, pays its share in kind. Any costs paid or covered by the city over their half share are reimbursed by the Commission to the city in cash. The city could even make a little money and will certainly not lose any.

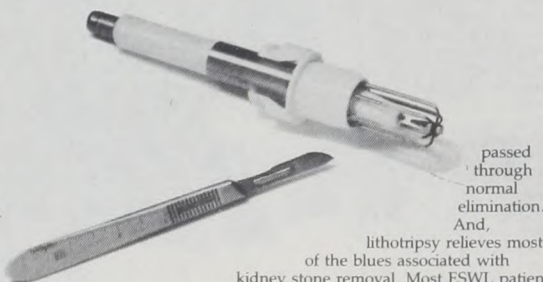

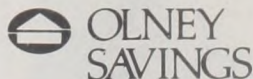

signed it. Please see associated story in this issue.

Tom Herr requested the city's cooperation in the Schilling Estate intent to remove the west curb on North Elm Street and move it back about 10 feet to widen the street to a full 40 feet. The council agreed to move the corners, culvert and fire plug. The estate will pay all other costs. All water taps will be pre-installed so as not to disturb the street when paved.

In further business concerning streets, Urban Endres met with the council about street and curbing levels in the Endres addition. They will further study the possibilities of filling the area which is now below grade or lowering the street level and letting water drain across the street. The latter solution would mean removing about 150

feet of curb and gutter on Endres Street and re-installing at a lower grade. This may be the most cost-effective method of solving the problem. The city has not yet decided whether to share the cost of reconstruction with Endres. He says that the contractor acted on decisions made with incorrect survey figures and that neither he nor the city studied the situation nor supervised the project closely enough. Therefore, they should share the cost of making it right. The city will study costs and bids quickly in order to stay on this spring's paving schedule.

Next, the council heard discussion on the tennis court project being planned for the city park by the Muenster Jaycees. Texas Parks and Wildlife Department is sharing cost on the project up to \$20,000.00. The Jaycees are paying the other half. The Jaycees and the park board proposed moving the proposed location slightly to the south and east to be further from utility lines. This would mean moving the park entry road to go around the court. Council saw no real problem with this, but will have the area staked out and take a better look. The Jaycees are funding all of the costs that TP&W doesn't cover. Construction should start soon after Germanfest.

The latter solution would mean removing about 150 feet of curb and gutter on Endres Street and re-installing at a lower grade. This may be the most cost-effective method of solving the problem. The city has not yet decided whether to share the cost of reconstruction with Endres. He says that the contractor acted on decisions made with incorrect survey figures and that neither he nor the city studied the situation nor supervised the project closely enough. Therefore, they should share the cost of making it right. The city will study costs and bids quickly in order to stay on this spring's paving schedule.

programs to the families of the parish without sacrificing quality of academic education in the obligation for Catholic education.

"The concept of a tuition-free Catholic school is not new, having been practiced in many areas with a high Catholic population, but to install one in 1983 when most had been abandoned is an exceptional step. The continuation of the practice will depend on how persuasive is the often heard statement that 'No one wants Catholic schools except the people.'

With certainty, the Sacred Heart School supports that statement. How much longer this community of Catholics can support a dual education system cannot be predicted but if the attitudes of the students are projected, the school has a long future. That future is in the hands of the members of the school board who have been elected to direct the school. Their influence with the community and success in maintaining a sound financial base for the school operation through the development program will determine the future."

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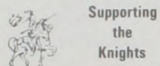

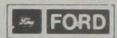

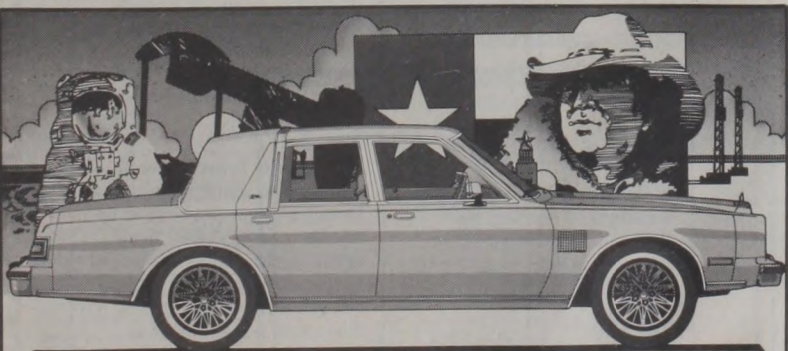

Local dairy farmers shape AMPI policy

Local dairy farmers were among elected officials who attended the Associated Milk Producers, Inc. (AMPI) annual meeting held in Minneapolis, Minn., March 23-26.

During the four days in Minneapolis, the dairy farmers worked with 2,000 colleagues from 20 states located throughout the Midwest, South and Southwest in formulating cooperative policy.

AMPI is the nation's largest dairy farm cooperative, with 23,000 member farms producing 11 percent of the nation's milk supply. Local dairy farmers are members of the organization's Southern Region.

Noble Anderson, manager for the Southern Region, pointed out that total milk production in the Southern Region was up more than 13.7 million gallons or 2 percent over 1985 figures, making 1986 the largest production year in the history of the Southern

Region. Total milk production in the United States was 16.8 billion gallons, of which 4.1 percent was made up of the Southern Region's supply.

In addition, Anderson stated that the average daily volume of milk per member in 1986 was 463 gallons, the highest level ever with an increase of 110.6 percent since 1970. Despite the record year, total milk sales to Grade A handlers decreased by 1 percent.

Southern Region Highlights
Southern Region president Lee Wolf, in his report to the annual meeting participants, praised the Dairy Termination Program or whole herd buyout for reducing overall milk production and cutting government expense in 1986, even though milk production in the Southern Region followed a national trend with a slight increase.

Wolf said the effectiveness of the program is partially reflected

in the U.S. milk production figure for January 1987, which showed a 4 percent decrease from a year ago. When the program began last March, milk production was 6.4 percent higher than in 1985.

"The buyout has demonstrated again that milk producers will respond to positive incentives to reduce production," he said.

"Member numbers have dropped from 4,535 to 4,005, a net decrease of 530 members. This is a direct result of AMPI members' participation in the Dairy Termination Program," he added.

AMPI members suffered a \$5.5 million loss in the Schepps/Foremost bankruptcy in 1986. "The loss was covered from profits generated through the manufacturing plants that would have been distributed back to members," Wolf said. Without

the bad debt write-off, the 1986 operating cost would have been about the same as 1985. AMPI will continue to supply milk to the new owners of the Schepps/Foremost company.

Texas receives Class B for brucellosis

A Class B brucellosis classification for Texas has been approved by the U.S. Department of Agriculture as of April 1, 1987.

"This is a tremendous achievement for the livestock industry. It is the cooperation of cattle producers that makes this possible," John S. Cargile, Chairman of Texas Animal Health Commission, said.

Texas had been classified as a Class C and Class B state since 1980. With the Class B status, the B-C line will be eliminated, and the B designation will mean less restriction on movement interstate of cattle for producers in Texas, Cargile said.

Increased efforts will be needed in the future to reach the eradication goal, and Cargile said TAHC is taking measures now to assist producers in this effort.

Nationwide, there are now six states with the Class B status. There are 19 states with a Class A status and 23 with a Free status, one B-c and one C state.

"Our next step is to meet the Class A status as mandated by USDA," Cargile said. He also noted that other states are putting more and more pressure on Texas producers to increase efforts to control and eradicate brucellosis.

"Actually, we are getting more pressure from states to 'clean up our act' than from the federal government. This shows to me we need to meet the challenge of eradicating this state of brucellosis as expeditiously as possible," Cargile said.

Cheap grain has upped feeder prices

Cheap grain has increased feeder cattle prices, but it also has spurred more poultry output and may have caused a premature turn in the cattle cycle, according to Texas A&M livestock economist, Dr. Ernie Davis.

While most cattlemen are beginning to develop a rosy outlook, Davis sees potential problems ahead for the industry.

Davis said poultry consumption this year will be close to 79 pounds per capita, compared with only 73.8 pounds of beef. By 1990, poultry industry observers predict chicken consumption may reach 90 pounds, while beef hovers in the 65-pound range.

Consumption figures like that, he said, would require a cattle herd near 95 million. That's well under the 103 million reported by USDA on Jan. 1, 1987.

Darkening the economic picture for cattlemen are the Harkin Gephardt farm bill and the end of the dairy termination program.

Harkin, which is "not dead," he said, would trigger increased dairy slaughter and suddenly higher grain prices if passed. He termed the bill, touted by Texas Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower, as "biased toward Midwestern farmers." It would put commercial feeders and others at a disadvantage.

A more immediate threat, he warned, might come toward the end of the dairy diversion program later this year. Dairy men

Only about two-thirds of the cattle have been killed in the program, he said. "So we may see some effect this summer." The third period ends Aug. 31.

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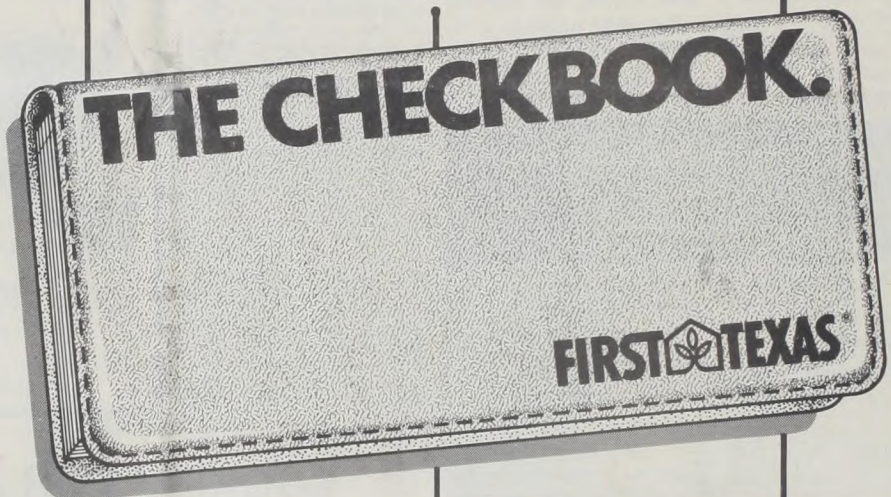
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
