The Germanfest Metric Century Bicycle Rally is Saturday at 11 a.m. with an expected 2500 entries. Everyone is asked to be especially careful on the streets where the activities are taking place. This applies also to the Fun Run at 2 p.m.

Sunday and the Volksmarch Saturday from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m.

At the city park, entertainment will abound with Helga and the Woodchoppers, Brave Combo, Carl Jones Big Band, Sonny & Norma on the music menu. Other groups include Blue Star Line Dancers, Texas Country Kloggers, Vocalaires, Barbershop, NTSU German Dance Club, Imitation Stats, Johnny Brown - Magician and Jerry Oz.

Along with the entertainment, guests can "stuff" themselves with the excellent German food served by the "good cooks" of Muenster.

A tug-o-war will be Sunday at 12 noon and a Brisket and Sausage

Cook-Off will be judged at 3 p.m. Sunday.

A special tent, this year, will house craft booths, selling Country Crafts, wooden articles - key chains to furniture; a boot maker demonstrating his skill; wreaths, stained glass, photography and personalized items.

The main tent will have the usual food booths and booths selling souvenirs and gifts.

A secretary in Congressman's Stenholm's office told **The Muenster Enterprise** that Drue

Bynum was notified at school Monday. The spokesman also said that there will be five from the 17th Congressional District attending West Point, one to the Air Force Academy, and two to the Merchant Marine. The two students from Muenster High School are included. Andy Burnette, son of Mrs. Margie Burnette, received his appointment to the Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs, Colorado on March 13.

Cooke County Co-op holds annual meeting

The 49th annual meeting of Cooke County Electric Cooperative Association was held April 13 at the Muenster Public School auditorium. There was a large enthusiastic crowd in attendance.

The program began with outstanding entertainment under the direction of Sue Viktor. The Mountain Springs group included a youth group presenting a skit, two bands, and some musical renditions by individuals in the community.

The business session was called to order by President Robert T. Lewis, who welcomed everyone and made reference to the importance of the Electric Cooperative in the communities that make up the service area.

Michael E. Sloan, general manager, presented his Report on

Operations for the Year 1986 which included a statement reflecting on kilowatt hour sales which declined by some fourteen million kilowatt hours largely as a result of the steep decline in crude oil prices in the early part of the year which prompted oil producers in our service area to stop production from many of the marginal producing wells and to reduce production from others.

Contributing also to this reduction in kilowatt hour sales was a mild winter and the overall depressed condition of the economy in our service area.

He stated Gross Operating Revenue declined by \$1,459,147 while Operating Expenses, with the exception of cost of purchased power, continued to increase in total but at a lesser rate than past years.

Operations and Maintenance expense increased as a reduction in new construction for plant additions and extensions enabled our line crews to devote more time to needed maintenance of the existing system.

It was noted that Net Operating Margins were \$101,000 below last year due to the reduced sales, and an overall increase in operating expenses. Operating Margins and Non-Operating Margins, plus capital recovered through depreciation, enabled the Cooperative to pay all operating costs, refund one-half of 1965 accrued Capital Credits, make net plant additions and extensions totaling \$582,494. He stated that 241 additional meters were added to the system in 1986. He also noted that the continuity of ser-

Bentsen will be in Houston, Amarillo, Austin, San Antonio, Lubbock, Odessa, Midland, Wichita Falls and Denton between Monday, April 13, and Friday, April 17, 1987.

He will be speaking to civic groups, holding a Town Hall meeting and participating in political activities during the week.

Seminar set at CCC on workman's comp. laws

"When it comes to Texas Workers' Compensation laws, what an employer doesn't know can really hurt him," says the man who will present a special seminar on the subject at Cooke County College in late April.

David L. Gorum of Austin will lead the program designed especially for owners, managers and personnel managers of area businesses and industries.

The seminar is being sponsored by CCC's Small Business Development Center, and Director Linda Mast points out that SBDC follows U.S. Small Business Administration guidelines defining a "small" business as any with 500 or fewer employees.

The seminar, set for Tuesday, April 28, is scheduled for 6-10 p.m. in the CCC Little Theater on campus. The cost of participation is \$45 per person.

"In the shaky economic times facing small businesses in Texas today," says Gorum, "knowing how to save money and time can be the key to productivity, profitability, even survival. Nowhere is this more true these days than in

all areas of employee relations involving Workmans' Compensation.

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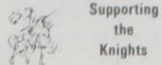

Muenster Hornets dominate '87 district track meet

After the dust had settled Saturday afternoon at Muenster Stadium from two days of running, jumping and throwing, the Muenster Hornets had won 3 of the 4 District 17A track titles and qualified 20 student athletes for the Regional Meet at Kilgore May 1-2. The Muenster coaching staff of Dewey Sims, Bob Gross and Ted Heers was all smiles. Their thinclads captured the boys' high school division, both junior high divisions and finished second in the girls' high school division despite qualifying 8 of the 11 team members for regional. Twelve members of the boys' team qualified.

The boys' championship was never in doubt. They were led by Stuart Hess early Saturday morning as he remained undefeated in the shot and discus for the season, throwing 53'1" and 141'5" respectively. He currently has the top shot distance statewide in Class A. Sophomore J. Shane Wimmer picked up a gold medal by jumping 20'8" to take first in the long jump. Another sophomore, Travis Klement, joined Hess as a regional qualifier by throwing 47'5 1/2" to place second in the shot put.

Muenster opened the running finals with a gold medal sprint relay performance. James Hennigan, Joe Pagel, Andy Burnette, and Mark Hennigan clocked a

45.50 to win. Burnette picked up two more gold medals in the 110 and 300 meter hurdles. He remained undefeated in both events with times of 15.23 and 41.42. Wimmer won his second gold medal of the meet by clocking a 2:09.03 in the 800 meters. He beat teammate Kevin Anderle in a photo finish. Anderle clocked 2:09.08 to take second. Scot Vogel won second in the 100 meters with an 11.51 time and two distance runners, Dan Klement and Chris Klement, took second places in the 1600 meters and 3200 meters to qualify for the regional meet. John Bednarcik rounded the number of qualifiers to an even dozen by running a 53.78 to win second in the 400 meters.

Muenster scored 216 points to easily outdistance Era and Lindsay. They finished with 131 and 127 1/2 points each.

The Muenster girls squeezed 132 points out of their 11-member team, but couldn't overcome the Lindsay total of 167 points. Melody Klement, LaNell Sicking, Dana Wimmer, and Deanna Bierschenk clocked a 1:57.32 to win the gold medal for the 800 meter relay. Klement also won the gold for a 29.23 clocking in the 200 meters. Staci Walterscheid picked up the other first place for the Lady Hornets with a throw of 30'3 3/4" in the shot. The mile relay team of Lisa Robison, Shonna Reiter, Deanna Bierschenk, and

LaNell Sicking clocked a season best 4:28.92 to place second and qualify for regional. Freshmen Robison and Denise Anderle both qualified individually as Robison ran a 67.47 to take second in the 400 meters and Anderle a personal best 18.91 in the 100 meter hurdles to take second. Bierschenk continued her duel with Lucy Fuhrmann of Lindsay in the 800 meter finishing a close second this time with a 2:30.92 clocking.

The junior high girls' division provided the most drama as the Muenster girls battled back to win the district title 163 to 158 over the Lindsay Knightettes. Lindsay led 53-41 after the field events and still maintained a 135-131 advantage going into the final two events. Tina Klement and Jane Klement then put Muenster ahead to stay in the 1600 meter run. Tina won first with a time of 6:03.82 and Jane third with a 6:31.09 clocking. Elizabeth Poulsen, Marcia Vogel, Melissa Bayer and Kim Anderle finished off the victory with a second place finish in the mile relay.

Vogel, Anderle, Bayer and Sheila Huddleston clocked a 2:01.32 to take the gold medal in the 800 meter relay. Huddleston also captured first in the 200 meters and anchored the 400 meter relay team of Mindy Graham, Anderle and Vogel to second place. Other first place

finishers were Amy Dankesreiter in the 800 meter run with a 2:42.31, Tina Klement in the 3200 meters with a 12:58.22, and Kim Anderle in the high jump with 4'8". Second place finishers were recorded by Bayer in the 400 meters 69.11 and Shandy Watson in the discus.

In the boys' junior high division, Era and Lindsay were in the hunt until the hurdles. Muenster broke open a close contest by taking first, second and third in both hurdle events for 48 of their point total. Ryan Sicking won the 110 meter hurdles, followed by Troy Pagel and Tony Perryman. In the 300 intermediates, they changed the order to Pagel, Perryman, Sicking, but the result was still 24 points for the Hornets. Brad McDaniel won two first places, winning both the shot and discus. Chris Kubis won second in the discus. Doug Hennigan took first in the 400 meters with a time of 62.40. Spencer McAden won second in the 800 meters with a 2:23.01 clocking and Jason Biffle won a second place in the 1600 meters with a 5:53.22.

Muenster scored 172 points to Lindsay's 132 points. Era took third place with 112 points.
