Jaycees reach 25th year...

Richard Grewing named Outstanding Citizen

Richard Grewing was named the 1987 Outstanding Citizen of Muenster and honored by the Jaycees during the banquet and program that marked the 25th anniversary of the service organization on Saturday evening, May 16, in the Sacred Heart Community Center.

The event included installation of new officers, presentation of annual awards for 1987 and recognition of men who had served the Jaycees during the past 25 years as presidents, key men and outstanding projects chairmen, charter members and outstanding citizens of Muenster.

The banquet was catered by the Schneiders. Mark Klement, a past president, was master of ceremonies for the program that followed dinner. Joe Galloway, a charter member and the first president of the local chapter, gave the invocation. Henry Weinzapfel, a charter member and past president, led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Ted Henscheid, Mayor of Muenster, a charter member and a past president, gave a brief welcoming address and read a history of the Jaycees' first year that began in 1962, listing goals and giving a resume of Jaycees' accomplishments in 1962-63 that was written by R.N. Fette for *The Muenster Enterprise*. The article praised the Jaycees for their work accomplished by 34 charter members that grew to a member-

ship of 53 by the end of the first year. It cited a full year's list of projects and specific results with benefit to the community.

Jerry Hess, a charter member, introduced Key Men of the past 25 years, and Jim Endres, 1986 Jaycee president, made the presentation of the Key Man Award for 1987 to David Flusche, Jr. Jim Endres also presented two awards to Kim Walterscheid: the Outstanding Chairman award and the

President's Partner award.

Jerry Hess introduced past presidents and Jaycee International Senators. Wayne Klement, Jaycee Senator and a past president, introduced past Outstanding Citizens of Muenster and asked the assembled crowd to meditate as each name was announced, recalling their contributions to the community.

Williamson appointed to conference committee

House Speaker Gib Lewis has appointed State Representative Richard R. Williamson, (D) Weatherford, to the prestigious House-Senate Conference Committee on the General Appropriations Act for the 1988-89 budget cycle.

An appointment to the Conference Committee is considered to be the most powerful and influential assignment awarded a House member during regular legislative session. Williamson is a member of the House Appropriations Committee and Chairman of the Budget and Oversight Committee on Transportation.

In only his second term, Williamson has already earned a

reputation for broad expertise in the area of state budget matters and spending patterns.

"Obviously, my selection to the Conference Committee is a privilege and honor. I think that Speaker Lewis has a basic belief that my ability to understand the state budget cycle will benefit not only the citizens of Cooke County, but also the taxpayers of the entire state."

Williamson responded, "During the next three weeks I will be a part of the 10-man team that will write the entire state budget for the next two years. I look forward to the opportunity to represent the interests of my district while structuring a solution to the state's fiscal problems."

Family Land Heritage program is now open

Pointing to the importance of recognizing and remembering the pioneer farm and ranch families in Texas, County Judge Jim A. Robertson has invited longtime farming families to participate in the Texas Department of Agriculture's 1987 Family Land Heritage Program.

"Registration for the program, which recognizes families who have had land in agricultural production for 100 years or more, is now open and will extend through July 15, 1987," County Judge Jim Robertson said.

"To date, 21 properties in Cooke County have qualified for the Family Land Heritage Program, and this year I hope we will be able to identify many more," he said. Since the program was established in 1974 to honor pioneering families, 2,090 such families have been recognized.

The basic requirements of the program include continuous agricultural production on the farm or ranch for 100 years, land ownership within the family, complete operation or supervision of the farm/ranch production by family members who are Texas residents, and a size of at least 10 acres with a minimum income of

\$50 from farm or ranch products. If the farm or ranch is smaller than 10 acres, sales must total \$250 per year.

"These families are living, productive symbols of our family farm unit. We celebrate their past achievements, and acknowledge the importance that such family farms hold for us in the future," he said.

This year's certified registrants will be honored at a state ceremony to be held in Austin, November 1987. Honorees will receive a certificate with an official sign/marker to be placed on the recipient's gate or home designating their property as a "Century Farm" or "Century Ranch." Additionally, a Family Land Heritage Registry will later be published and distributed to all honorees.

tion to Richard Grewing, recipient of the Jaycee Outstanding Citizen, calling attention to a performance "above and beyond the call of duty." He said, "Grewing is a native of Muenster ... owner and operator of his own business ... a veteran of WWII with active duty in Japan ... participates in community and church affairs ... was a member of the original board of directors of Muenster Memorial Hospital ... a director of Muenster State Bank for the past three years ..."

He added, "Grewing was first elected to the Muenster City Council in 1958, serving until 1980. After two successful surgeries over a period of several years, he was elected Mayor, holding that position until recently. For 10 years of his 24 year council tenure, he was in charge of the water department and has been actively involved with the lake project since its beginning, to insure a water supply for Muenster's future."

"Grewing and his wife Florence have been married for 37 years, have eight children, and 21 grandchildren, all living in or near Muenster."

Accepting the plaque, Grewing expressed his appreciation and his oft-repeated words, "Muenster is my home. I want the best for it. I think you can see I'm interested in our town."

Willie Fisher and Wayne Kle-

ment, Jaycee International Senators, conducted the installation of officers. These are David Flusche, Jr., president; Kim Walterscheid, first vice president; Bert Walterscheid, second vice president; Shawn Flusche, secretary; Alan Miller, treasurer; Brian Herr and Neal Flusche, state directors; and Jim Endres, immediate past president.

John Pagel, a past president, led the Jaycee Creed as a devotional closing.

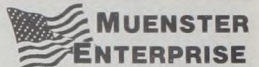
Special decorations and table centerpieces were original and unique models of Jaycee projects, designed by members and spouses.

Farmers Haul Out Binders As Grain Begins to Ripen

Fire Truck Arrives in Nick of Time to Save Truck for Joe Flusche

The fire truck was just in time to prevent the complete destruction of Joe Flusche's truck when flames were going strong in the cab and threatened to explode the gas tank Tuesday evening about 7 o'clock.

The fire started at Al Walterscheid's Machine Shop as Louis Roberg, while welding the frame, apparently got his torch too near the gas line. The torch cut the line and ignited the gasoline which began leaking out immediately.

After several unsuccessful attempts to extinguish the blaze the fire department was notified and Louis drove the truck out of the shop and towards the fire department. The machines met in front of Herr Motor Co., where chemical extinguishers were used to put out the fire.

Besides upholstery the fire ruined floor boards, floor mat, all wiring, and some of the more delicate controls.

Next week at this time a large percentage of the grain is expected to be in shocks.

In some few localities army worms are reported to be attacking the crops. No doubt this fact serves as an explanation for the appearance of binders in a few of the fields which still appear to be rather green.

Tourism work\$ for Texas

May 17-23 has been designated as Texas Tourism Week by Governor Bill Clements. The proclamation, signed April 3, cites tourism as "Texas' second largest industry, trailing only oil and petrochemicals in revenues generated for the State's economy. It is clear tourism is a crucial industry with the Lone Star State one of the most popular destinations in the United States."

The Governor concluded the proclamation by saying, "We, as Texans, must continue to inform potential visitors of the colossal assets this grand State is fortunate enough to possess. And we must continue to welcome our visitors with the friendliness and courtesy that typifies our world-famous Texas hospitality."

The theme of the week is Tourism Work\$ for Texas. A number of Texas cities will be conducting events aimed at heightening local awareness.

Out-of-state visitors to Texas in 1986 contributed \$3.49 in direct state taxes for every dollar spent attracting them, a recent study shows. The study also revealed that \$68 was the average daily expenditure, and 10.8 days was the average length of stay. The average state tax paid on normal expenses was 5.667 percent.

"This shows that funds spent attracting visitors to Texas are producing excellent results at a time when Texas needs all the tax revenues it can get," said Phil Davis, assistant director of the Texas Tourist Development Agency.

"And this doesn't take into account the ripple effect those visitor expenditures have on local economies."

A survey by the Institute for Communications Research at Texas Tech University reveals Texans recognize that attracting tourists and diversifying businesses are the two most liked alternatives for improving the Texas economy.

Although all options received a nod of approval from a majority of the respondents, increasing tourism was supported by 90.3 percent. This attitude is reflected in the new concept laid out by House Bill 4 which will give Texas the resources to compete for international and domestic tourists. "Competition for the tourist

dollar has intensified and forces Texas to work cooperatively to maintain its position in the marketplace," said Larry Todd, executive director of TTDA. Todd concluded by emphasizing the virtues of the state: the Texas mystique and the friendly people.

Governor Clements has also declared this week as Friendly Texan Week, and in the proclamation stated "Hospitality, neighborliness and helpfulness are important aspects of the heritage of all Texans."

"I encourage all Texans to be courteous and friendly to the 47 million out-of-state visitors expected in Texas this year, and all citizens of Texas should make these visitors aware that "Friendship" is our state motto."

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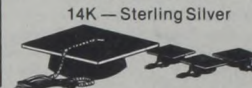

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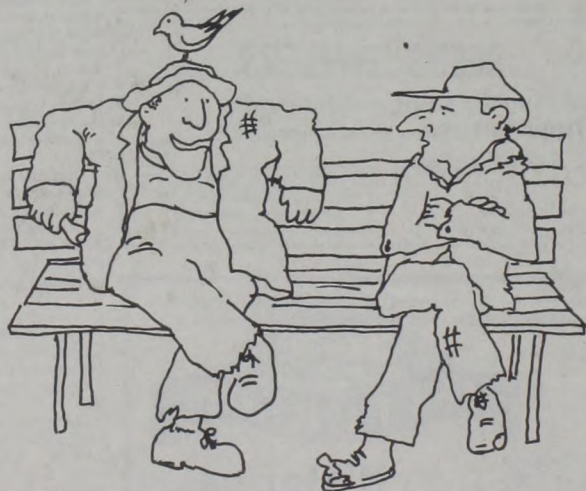

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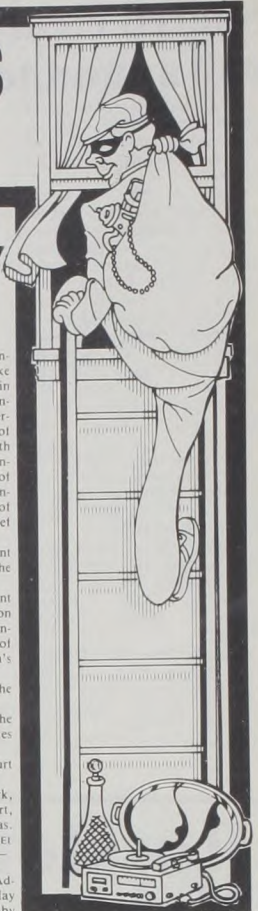

The competition continued in the rain, with no one able to get a good hold on the shot or traction in the ring. Tony Pollard of Meridian threw the winning toss of

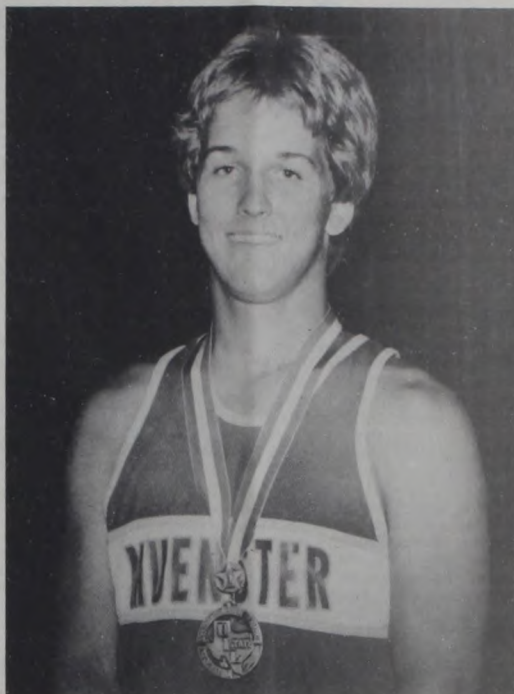

County Agent's Report

by Craig Rosenbaum

What miracle material prevents weed growth, conserves soil moisture, keeps soil at the right temperature, adds organic matter to soil, prevents the splashing of soil onto plants and fruit, and eliminates hoe fatigue? Mulch is this miracle material.

Mulching is a very important part of vegetable garden culture in most areas of North Central Texas. Mulching makes vegetable gardening a more pleasant and productive endeavor by reducing the labor required to control weeds while increasing the yield and quality of your vegetable and enhancing the appearance of your garden.

The best mulch material is clean wheat straw. There will be a good supply available around wheat harvest time. Wheat farmers often bale wheat straw for use later on. A four- to six-inch layer of straw will prevent weed growth.

Most home gardeners have a continuous supply of glass clippings during the growing season. Apply a three-inch layer of clippings on the soil surface around direct seeded vegetables soon after they germinate and around tomatoes, peppers, okra and squash after the soil temperature reaches 70°F. (21°C.). Additional layers of clippings should be applied as the season progresses.

Coarse leaves, collected the previous fall and composted through the winter, make a good mulch. Tree bark mulch gives the garden a neat appearance, but it is a relatively expensive form of mulch.

Black plastic film spread out on the soil surface with the film edges well anchored warms the soil in early spring and favors the early growth of the warm season vegetables: tomatoes, peppers, cucumbers, squash, melons, and okra. The plastic must be removed at the end of the season.

In the small home garden, organic mulches and black plastic mulch are more effective weed control than chemical weed killers. Chemical weed killers are quite specific as to the weeds controlled and vegetables spared. There is no single chemical that can be used safely in a garden with many kinds of vegetables.

The methods and timing of application for chemical weed killers are very precise. There is no room for error with chemical herbicides which are best used only by commercial vegetable growers.

Your mulched vegetable garden will amaze you with its productivity, beauty and economy.

GARDEN

Most pecans in the area are showing a good crop of nuts already. First spraying for the casebearer worm will probably be between May 27 and June 4. Use Sevin, Malathion or Zolone for control or give us a call if you are not already on our Pecan Spraying List.

Well, we all got a big rain and now the mowers are out everywhere. One of the main causes of engine damage in mowers is too little oil in the engine. 8 out of 10 mowers that come in our shop are almost completely out of oil. The next common fault is dirty or missing oil filters.

TIP OF THE WEEK: Advance your weedeater line a little more often and it will not be as likely to break off inside the head.

Ag diversification and profitability conference set for May 26

Producers wanting to evaluate the potential for increasing profitability and diversifying their farm operations by growing crops such as grapes, blueberries, nursery crops and gourmet vegetables will have a unique opportunity to do so on May 26.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service will simultaneously conduct 10 regional conferences on that date entitled "Horticultural Alternatives for Texas Agriculture" at key locations across the state.

Conference sites will include Dallas, Houston, Corpus Christi, San Antonio, Austin, Lubbock, Midland, Stephenville, Brenham

and Overton.

Portions of the educational program will be broadcast via satellite to each conference site. In addition, information concerning regional opportunities in horticulture will be presented by Extension specialists and industry leaders from throughout Texas.

Each conference will open with local introductions, announcements and a welcome. The program will begin at 8:45 a.m. with a discussion by Extension Director Zerle L. Carpenter, who will discuss "Diversifying Texas Agriculture - Potentials for Future Growth," followed by Dr. Lawrence Lippke, Extension economist-management, who will discuss "Horticultural Crops - Making the Right Decision."

After these two satellite presentations, the morning program at each site will focus on "Regional Opportunities for Horticultural Crops" and will be presented by Extension horticulturists,

economists and other production and marketing experts.

The afternoon program will offer a mix of local and satellite programming that covers direct and wholesale marketing of horticultural crops - presented by national, state and local authorities. Direct marketing topics will deal with "pick your own" operations, roadside stands, farmers' markets, marketing through retail outlets and pricing products for profit.

Other topics of interest to producers will include developing a business plan, identifying and evaluating potential markets, processed agricultural products for Texas and wholesale marketing techniques.

Producers who are unable to attend one of the 10 regional conferences, but who have access to a satellite dish, can view the televised program portions by tuning to the Westar 4 telecommunications satellite (Transponder 6 Direct).

However, these producers will not receive the localized, regionally-specific portions of the conference.

Conservation reserve program grows in Texas

About 2.3 million acres of highly erodible croplands in Texas have been enrolled in the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Conservation Reserve Program (CRP), federal officials said. Most of the CRP acreage is in the High Plains and Rolling Plains of Northwest Texas.

The CRP in effect pays farmers for taking erodible croplands out of production for 10 years and for planting the lands in permanent vegetative cover.

Ron George, CRP coordinator for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, said the program is an excellent opportunity for Texas landowners to create wildlife habitat on the unused lands. Landowners may lease CRP acreage to hunters for additional income.

"Farmers and ranchers will have another opportunity to enroll during the next sign-up period, July 20-31," George said. He explained that the USDA will pay up to 50 percent of eligible costs to establish trees and grass on the acreage placed in the reserve. These payments will partially reimburse farmers for the one-time costs of establishing required conservation practices on the cropland.
