Filing jointly can produce greater tax savings

Is it required that married persons always file joint returns, or may each spouse file an individual return? Under what circumstances would it benefit a married couple to file jointly or separately? A: Married couples may file a joint return if they are not legally separated under a divorce or separate maintenance decree on the last day of the year. "Although a joint return is not required, it almost always produces tax savings over filing separately," says Ver-non Walker, Taxpayer Education chairman for the Dallas Chapter of CPAs. "However, separate retur-ns may result in a lower total tax if, for example, one spouse has sub-tertiable tax market and the provided market and the provided market. Is may result a lower total tax m, for example, one spouse has sub-stantially more medical expenses than the other." You should com-pute the tax both jointly and separately if there is any doubt as to which is lower. which is lower

Texas A&M survey finds typical handgun owner middle-aged male

COLLECE STATION — Most hand-gun owners are men, live in the South, are between 55 and 49 years of age and own only one weapon, according to a marketing survey conducted by two Tesna A&M University professors. "We did the study more out of curiosi-ty than anything else," says Dr. William Pride who conducted the survey with Dr. O.C. Ferrell, both of Texna A&M's College of Business Administration. "There's been a lot of talk about hand-guns lately." Pride said. "We were inter-ested in finding out something about the

own handguns." The survey involved a random sam-ple of 2,100 U.S. households and found that 18 percent of the respondents owned at least one handgun. While a quarter of the males surveyed owned a handgun, less than 14 percent of the females interviewed owned one, the study found. The professors also found that owner-ship was lowest among people in the 18-25 age bracket and that ownership ap-pears to increase with income.
