## Fisher speaks to Muenster Chamber concerning legislative tort reform

The Muenster Chamber of Commerce monthly luncheon meeting heard several routine reports and an informative presentation by Gary Fisher of FMW Insurance Agency. Fisher spoke on the necessity and importance of tort reform in the newly-opened legislative session in Austin. He explained some of the causes and effects in our current suit-happy environment. Tort is a very old legal term having to do with the civil

court system and includes the various areas of liability. Insurance companies have offered liability coverage in the past but with the current tendency for so many cases going to court and so many of these drawing very large and excessive punitive damages, liability insurance is becoming very hard to get and expensive. The City of Muenster has had a lot of trouble finding liability coverage even with

their near-perfect record of no law suits. It is reported that the City of Dallas is currently operated without liability insurance.

Fisher said that we here in Muenster live in an isolated bubble in the civil court world. "People here don't bring suit but as near as Gainesville the courts are very liberal in their awards," he said. Citing a serious need for tort reform to bring sanity back to the courts, legal profession and in-

surance business, Fisher encouraged all present to contact their state representatives and senator on the subject. He recommended contacting the Texas Civil Justice League, a citizen's organization which will monitor and report on legislative progress and important voting times. ## Comanche Peak Nuclear Plant...

### New cost estimates announced

Revised cost and schedule estimates for the Comanche Peak Nuclear Plant have been announced by Texas Utilities Electric Company, parent of Texas Power & Light.

The new estimates are included in the company's revised resource plan for meeting area electricity needs through 1996. The plan is based on estimates of growth in TUEC's service area over the next decade and includes the company's plans for meeting increasing needs for electricity.

A detailed re-analysis, re-inspection and corrective action effort, which has been underway at Comanche Peak since late 1984 in order to provide all necessary assurances as to the safety of the plant, is continuing.

The company estimates that effort, plus all related plant modifications that are necessary and the licensing hearing process should be complete in time to support commercial operation of Unit 1 in early 1989. Unit 2 is not expected to be in full commercial operation until after the 1989 summer peak season.

If this schedule is achieved, it is estimated that TUEC's share of the total plant cost will be about \$3,300 per kilowatt of capacity, or \$6.7 billion, including interest on borrowed construction money of \$2.07 billion. Total plant costs associated with design and construction, excluding interest costs, are \$5.27 billion. The company does not plan to include any additional Comanche Peak costs in a rate increase request until Unit 1 is ready for commercial operation. The company believes that the initial increase that will be necessary to place Unit 1 in base rates can be held to about 10 percent.

The previous estimate, announced in November 1985, assumed Unit 1 would go into operation in mid-1987 and Unit 2 six months later. In July, however, the company announced that because of expansion of the reinspection and corrective action effort, Unit 1 would not go into operation until after the summer of 1988.

The reinspection and corrective action program underway at the plant is intended to address and resolve all concerns about its safety.

"The construction adequacy part of the program is essentially finished and the design adequacy review is in process," said Michael D. Spence, President of TUEC's Generating Division. "At the conclusion of this program, we will be able to assure ourselves and the Nuclear Regulatory Commission that all safety concerns have been identified and corrective actions completed. We are committed to making Comanche Peak one of the safest nuclear plants in the nation."

TUEC's new cost estimate takes into account the cost of money used to finance the plant's con-

struction, cost of the reinspection and corrective action effort, engineering and construction costs and ongoing expenses such as those associated with permanent plant operating personnel.

"Comanche Peak remains a cornerstone of the company's resource plan for providing reliable electric service in the future," said Spence.

"We serve more than 5 million people, or about one-third the population of Texas, and our service area continues to grow," he said. "Even with the economic downturn in the state, we are adding new customers at an average rate of more than 4,000 a month."

"Because of this ongoing growth, Comanche Peak remains an essential long-term source of the reliable electricity our customers need. The low-cost uranium it uses will help provide a stable source of electricity, as well as a needed diversity in our fuel supply."

In its revised 10-year resource plan, the company estimates it will need about 11.8 million kilowatts of new generating capacity to serve its customers by 1996. Conservation and load management

programs will be used to displace the need to provide new capacity for 17 percent of that increase. The remainder will be met as follows:

- \* 18 percent with the Comanche Peak Nuclear Plant.
- \* 19 percent with lignite-fueled generating units now being built.
- \* 19 percent with cogeneration and small power production sources.
- \* 16 percent with combustion turbines, which are natural gas-fueled generators used to meet peak demand.
- \* 11 percent from energy sources to be announced.

The company also reported that Unit 2 of the Twin Oak Plant in Robertson County will go into service in 1993 instead of 1992, and the single-unit Forest Grove plant in Henderson County will go into service in 1994 instead of 1993. In addition, the company will not build a fourth unit at its Martin Lake Plant in Rusk County. Texas Utilities Electric Company has three operating divisions - Dallas Power & Light, Texas Electric Service and Texas Power & Light - in addition to the generating division.

## Sales tax checks mailed

AUSTIN - State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$48.5 million in local sales tax to 1,038 cities that levy the one-percent city tax. Bullock said that the first payments for 1987 were down almost 9 percent as compared to last year's first payments.

Fort Worth's first payment in 1987 was \$2.1 million, a 10 percent decrease from \$2.3 million in 1986.

By comparison, Houston's check for \$7.6 million was the largest, down 8 percent from last year's payment of \$8.4 million. Dallas' payment was \$6 million, a 6 percent decrease from last January's payment of \$6.4 million.

January checks represent taxes collected on sales made in November and reported to the Comptroller by Dec. 20.

Reflecting the significantly decreased early Christmas season spending, payments made to Gainesville were \$45,301.18, a 18.59 percent decrease to date. Muenster's rebate check was \$5,036.63, showing a more moderate 9.11 percent decline. Lindsay's collections to-date are down nearly 20 percent. Their check totaled \$3,619.17.

106 tracts available Feb. 25...

# Texas Vets eligible to bid on forfeited tracts

Information on 106 tracts of state land included in a February high bid sale of forfeited Veterans tracts is now available to both Texas Veterans and the general public, Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro announced Monday.

All tracts are open to bids from the general public as well as Texas Veterans. Bids may be placed on more than one tract.

Located in 56 Texas counties, the tracts range in size from 10 acre tracts in several counties to an 80-acre tract in Yoakum County.

A public reading of bids submitted to the Texas Veterans Land Board will be held on Feb. 25, 1987 at 10 a.m. in Room 831 of the Stephen F. Austin Bldg. at 1700 N. Congress in Austin.

"I want to urge all Texans that have been looking for good land to take advantage of this unusual high-bid sale. Everybody has an equal shot at winning under this arrangement," said Mauro, who serves as chairman of the Texas Veterans Land Board.

"Naturally, there's an enormous interest in a sale of this kind," Mauro said, "so I urge you to get out as soon as possible, take a look at the tracts that interest you, and get your bids in."

The sale will be by sealed bid only with a minimum bid set by the Veterans Land Board. All bids must be received by the board before Feb. 25, 1987 at 10 a.m. at which time the bidding will close. Any and all bids received after that time and date will be rejected. Bidders need not be present at the bid opening.

Texas Veterans submitting winning bids will pay an interest rate of 8.75 percent while winning bids from non-veterans will pay 11.47

percent. Both will carry a 30-year assumable fixed-rate loan. A \$25 non-refundable fee on each tract bid has been set by the Texas Veterans Land Board.

Mauro emphasized that fewer than one percent of the more than 93,000 loans made through the Texas Veterans Land Program have resulted in forfeiture because of delinquent payments.

"A fair but aggressive policy toward delinquencies is necessary if we are to continue offering generous terms to our veterans through this excellent program," he said.

## England is site for CCC course

The only way to get to one class being offered this spring at Cooke County College is by air or sea. It's being held in London. That's right, merry old England.

Students who sign up for a special humanities course on the spring schedule can earn three full hours of college credit while joining CCC faculty member Paul Hutchins on a week-long trip to the United Kingdom during spring break.

Actual dates of the trip are March 12 through March 20, 1987.

It will be the fourth spring break holiday in a row that Hutchins has escorted a group of students, educators and travel buffs to London, and more than a few of them

have made the trip twice already. Hutchins explains that although persons going on the trip to London may earn college credit, signing up for the humanities course is not mandatory and that travelers who do not wish to earn credit are welcome.

One thing I have to emphasize is that space is limited," he stresses. "For that reason, I urge interested persons to contact me and reserve their places as soon as possible."

Total cost of the tour package is \$799 per person, and that covers both round-trip air fare and hotel accommodations.

An advance deposit of \$100 is payable at the time of booking with

Hutchins, and final payment is due by Jan. 26. A cancellation fee of \$75 will be assessed after the airline ticket is issued, and a \$50 land cancellation fee will be charged on cancellations from Jan. 27 through Feb. 9. After Feb. 10, the cancellation fee will be \$130 plus any hotel charges.

Hutchins says that persons making the trip must have a current passport. Since the process of getting a passport can take some time, he recommends starting it right away.

## Filing jointly can produce greater tax savings

(First in a series of Tax Tip articles provided by the Dallas Chapter of the Texas Society of Certified Public Accountants.)

Q: What are the tax laws concerning joint returns by married couples? Is it required that married persons always file joint returns, or may each spouse file an individual return? Under what circumstances would it benefit a married couple to file jointly or separately?

A: Married couples may file a joint return if they are not legally separated under a divorce or separate maintenance decree on the last day of the year. "Although a joint return is not required, it almost always produces tax savings over filing separately," says Vernon Walker, Taxpayer Education chairman for the Dallas Chapter of CPAs. "However, separate returns may result in a lower total tax if, for example, one spouse has substantially more medical expenses than the other." You should compute the tax both jointly and separately if there is any doubt as to which is lower.

The Sacred Heart Tigers rallied from a 14-point deficit to tie the

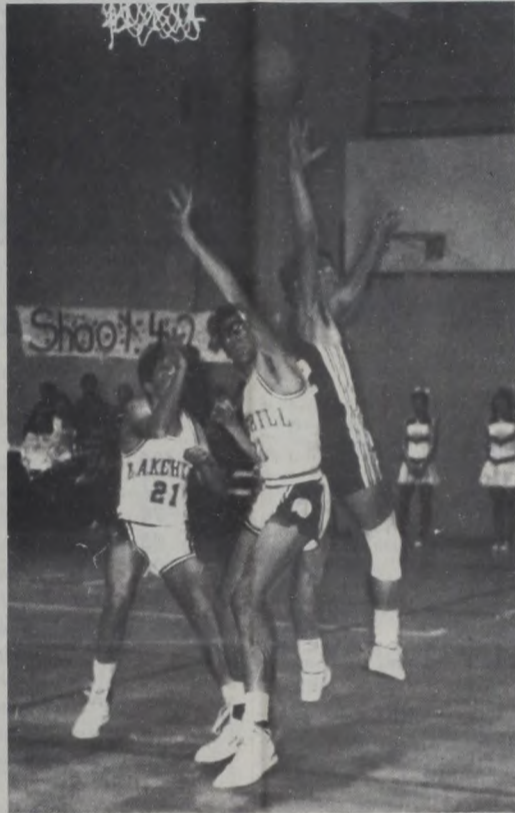

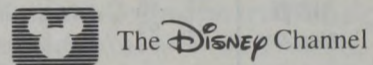
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## Texas A&M survey finds typical handgun owner middle-aged male

COLLEGE STATION — Most handgun owners are men, live in the South, are between 35 and 49 years of age and own only one weapon, according to a marketing survey conducted by two Texas A&M University professors.

"We did the study more out of curiosity than anything else," says Dr. William Pride who conducted the survey with Dr. O.C. Ferrell, both of Texas A&M's College of Business Administration. "There's been a lot of talk about handguns lately," Pride said. "We were interested in finding out something about the

profile of people who were most likely to own handguns."

The survey involved a random sample of 2,100 U.S. households and found that 18 percent of the respondents owned at least one handgun. While a quarter of the males surveyed owned a handgun, less than 14 percent of the females interviewed owned one, the study found.

The professors also found that ownership was lowest among people in the 18-25 age bracket and that ownership appears to increase with income.

# County Agent's Report

by Craig Rosenbaum

The wet cold weather is causing several problems in our small grain fields. Oats and ryegrass are probably receiving the worst from these adverse weather conditions.

Producers are noticing a purple and reddish tinge to oat and

ryegrass leaves. This condition is brought on by poor nutrient uptake. When weather conditions become wet, the root system of the plant is unable to take up phosphorus and other nutrients like nitrogen. The poor phosphorus uptake will cause the leaves to turn. This condition should change with drying conditions. Another cause for leaf color changes is by insects transmitting viruses. Once this happens, there is nothing that can be done. Hopefully, most of our color change is due to the wet weather.

In regard to insects, we are still seeing an increase in winter grain mite damage. Especially those fields that are young - either in the spike or one-to-two tiller stage - can receive fairly severe damage from these winter grain mites. Most of the mite damage generally is the most severe on grain growing on land planted in small grains in previous years. These mites feed primarily at night, and this is the easiest time to detect their presence by using a flashlight.

Again the larger grain should not be damaged due to its vigor. However, watch those young fields.

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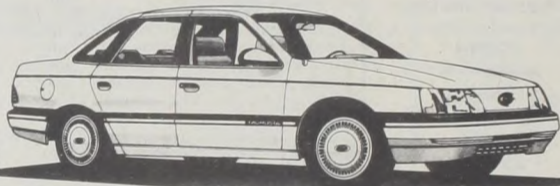
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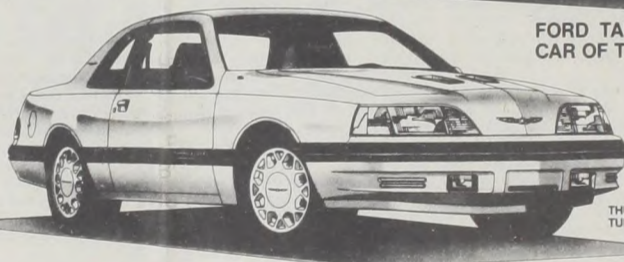
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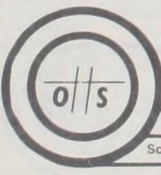
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
