# County unites with Saint Jo to promote Red River bridge

and county Junge Jim Robertson held a well-attended meeting Monday morning concerning the proposed Red River Bridge.

Texas Highway Department representatives Dale Cantrell and Leiland Jett explained the recent history of this latest effort as reported in The Enterprise last week. Then they answered questions.

There will be a meeting in Austin Jan. 27, 1988 at which interested parties may present their studies and opinions to the Texas Highway Commission. That is the focus of petitions, a cover letter and resolutions passed by the Cooke County Commissioners' Court and the Gainesville Area Chamber of Commerce supporting the bridge idea and the Highway Department's preliminary proposal that

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and positive action.

The meeting with the commissioners also revealed that if connecting roads to the bridge are designated Farm to Market, the county would pay for any rights of way and utility adjustments. It is hoped that possible donations of right of way will hold the cost down.

Council considers varied agenda

Residents from Oklahoma were present and reported that a study has been made and funds are available. They want a bridge, on a site that best serves all the people of the area, built with peaceful cooperation. Cantrell of the Texas Highway Dept. said, "We're just studying feasibility at this time. There will certainly be more coordination with Oklahoma if the Highway Commission agrees."

The January meeting in Austin is only to gather information to determine whether a bridge is to be built.

The project to install decorative street lamps on Highway 82 and Main Street in Muenster moved one step closer to reality in the City Council meeting Monday night. The councilmen agreed to match the \$500.00 per year pledged by the Chamber of Commerce toward maintenance of the lights, Project director Gary Fisher will continue to seek commitments for installation and power, then apply to the state for funds to purchase the the state for funds to purchase the

the state for funds to purchase the lamps.

Discussion continued next on the City Hall telephone system. City Manager Joe Fenton said problems continue to plague the system, especially with calls lost when put on hold. He blamed the old equipment and admitted that the telephone company, after repeated attempts to fix it, blamed the problems on user errors. Fenton has studied bids to replace the system with new phones from

either Muenster Telephone Corp., AT&T by Clifford Sicking or a system offered by Lehnis Perkins. Mayor Ted Henscheid questioned whether a new system was really needed and should be afforded. After further discussion, a motion was passed to purchase the current phone system from the Telephone Corp. and arrange for independent repair and servicing. Under the current offer from Muenster Telephone Corp., the system can be had for about \$120.00. The council felt that it was worth a try at

that price. They will save considerably on lease and maintenance agreement costs.

In other old business, the council approved renewing the lease on the ambulance station buildings and property for \$240.00 annually, commenting on the low price and possibility of future use.

New business concentrated on how to pay the balance still needed on the new fire truck. The contracted builder has surprisingly finished the truck very early and it should be delivered by Dec. 15. The



At that point, the alternatives were to return the matter to the courts or agree to leave the matter status quo for the present time. We retained the right to return to court in two years if we so desire.

It is a great disappointment to us that our subscribers are denied the use of the tower while we resolve the problem peacefully.

### **County Agent's Report**

by Craig Rosenbaum

Soil testing should be one of the first steps in planning your 1988 crop production program, and now is the time to collect soil samples from fields to be planted to spring crops.

The cost of a soil test is a minor

investment to make for the peace of mind it brings when faced with making fertilizer decisions.

making fertilizer decisions.

If a soil test indicates that fertilizer is needed to attain a desired yield goal, then its use is strongly recommended. Not fertilizing or reducing fertilizer rates may result in yield levels which will not generate enough income to cover basic production costs.

On the other hand, direct savings can result when a soil test indicates

can result when a soil test indicates that there are already adequate or near adequate levels of nitrogen,

near adequate levels of nitrogen, phosphorus, potassium or other nutrients to attain a desired yield. In either case, following soil test recommendations can effectively reduce the per unit cost of producing a commodity and in-crease the chances of making a prefit

profit.

Of course, a good fertility program can only insure optimum yields when other conditions affecting crop yields are favorable. A good plant stand, adequate moisture, good physical condition of the soil, and insect, disease and weed control are all important in obtaining profitable returns from money invested in fertilizer.

Crop producers who have not yet

Crop producers who have not yet

made a final decision about which crop to plant on which field should submit soil samples now and submit soil samples now and request fertilizer recommendations for several cropping alternatives per soil sample. This information can be helpful in making final

cropping decisions.

Soil sampling bags and information sheets can be obtained by contacting the County Extension Office.



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
