When it comes to economics we un into another question mark. Is the enormous raise in miners' wages consistent with current efforts to hold down inflation? Every day we hear that our one concern is to keep excessive money out of circulation. There are ceil-

ing prices to hold down the cost Minor injuries were suffered of living. Because, as the government says, we must not permit expenses to pass incomes. But at the same time the government sanctions the dumping of tremendous excess purchasing power on the retail market. Next it will have to sanction higher ceiling prices to absorb the purchasing power.

Meanwhile other industries will be making their demands. They will want to be on a par with the miners. And there you have a vicious circle, spiraling up and up. Higher wages followed by higher prices, then higher wages again to pay the higher prices. The farther it goes the worse it gets, the harder it will be to stop. And it's definitely started now.

All the while, look who is holding the sack. The poor devil whose wages are frozen at a low level. such as the soldier. Or the guy who skimps and saves for war bonds. One cannot keep up with the rising costs. The other finds Gieb and family. He has spent the that the dollar he saved has only half its former purchasing power. Maybe only a fourth or even a tenth

> As long as mankind has to have wars, why doesn't someone place them on a sound financial basis? If this is everybody's fight why don't we have uniform salaries, all of them based on the army's pay scale? That would stop inflation and strikes.
