day. In fact, the 30 were selected from the 12,000 observers who collect daily measurements of rainfall, temperature, and other meteorological data. In addition to making up the national climatic record, this information is valuable to various public and private users, including utility and construction companies, farmers, ranchers and urban planners.

Steve Moster was also one of five selected from the 30 national winners on Tuesday to be honored with the "Jefferson Award," named for Thomas Jefferson, a keen weather observer who is credited with making the first known meteorological observations, with instruments, in this country from 1776 to 1816. The other 25 observers received the "Holm Award," named for John Campanius Holm, who recorded the first weather observations in colonial America, near Wilmington, Delaware in 1644 and 1645.

Moster received the "Holm winners on Tuesday to be honored with the "Jefferson Award," named for Thomas Jefferson, a keen weather observer who is credited with making the first known meteorological observations, with instruments, in this country from 1776 to 1816. Thirty of the nation's top volunteer weather observers were honored on Tuesday, April 26, by the Commerce Departments' National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration for their unusual Administration for their unusual and outcome of the complete and the complet

Once a day, the volunteer observer records the weather at his home or place of work. At the end of every month, these measurements are mailed to the National Climatic Data Center, in Asheville, North Carolina, where they become part of the permanent record of the world's weather.

Many of the observers assist the

Many of the observers assist the weather service during times of severe weather by taking special rainfall, river level and other observations in remote areas. This information is vital to the National Weather Service's flood, and flash flood, warnings program.

Festival enters its 13 year! History of 'Fest recalled

Muenster's first attempt at a homecoming festival was a four-day event in April 1976. It was this community's salute to the country's Bicentennial.

It was also the first multi-day party since the young Muenster community's "Schützenfest," a three-day celebration that began

It was also the first multi-day party since the young Muenster community's "Schützenfest," a three-day celebration that began in May 1899.

The big event faded with the advent of Prohibition, and as interests changed.

Not until the Bicentennial did another community-sponsored party attract a concerted effort. Known as German Week, it was held on the parking lot in front of the Community Center. The 1976 version included two pageants, a flag presented after it flew over the national capitol, a Miss Muenster contest, won by Barbie Hess, and the first Fun Run that drew 251 runners. In its four-day stand, it drew about 5,000 visitors.

Favorite topic of conversation the next week was the expert handling of the crowds and the amounts of food and drink consumed — 93 kegs of beer and 3600 lbs. of sausage. Little did sponsors visualize the enormous growth they would handle in 1987, and anticipate in 1988.

By its second year, its name was changed to Germanfest and in its third year, the celebration was moved to Muenster City Park. Crowd guessers estimated the crowds at over 30,000 and 1345 registered for the Fun Run.

In 1979, weather worries began to haunt the Chamber of Commerce, with parking a major problem, using the detour on Hwy. 82 while the old overpass was removed.

Special community attention was directed to striving for an image promoting community interests, fire safety, traffic assistance, first aid, a warm reception and parking facilities rather than just reaping profits.

The Jaycees' new refrigerated trailer-truck was a big attraction with beer kegs inside, connected to spigots outside.

The weather merely turned nippy and food consumption burgeoned to 3400 lbs. of sausage; 500 lbs. sauerbrauter; 475 lbs. barbecue; 400 fryers; 160 lbs. connected to spigots outside.

A rexas Historical Marker was unveiled during the 1980 Germanfest. The visitor count passed 30,000. Food consumption was almost doubled. Entertainment features were high priority. Congressman Charles Stenholm was among the guests.

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Deadline for tax exemptions is May 2

Monday, May 2, is the deadline
for submitting applications for
several important property tax exemptions, according to officials
with the Cooke County Appraisal
District.

Homeowners can reduce their
property tax bills in 1988 by taking
advantage of partial exemptions
for residence homesteads. Application forms are available at the
CCAD office on California Street
in Gainesville.

Texas law allows homeowners to make a single, one-time only application for residence to make a single, one-time only application for residence homesteads. Taxpayers who have never received a residence homestead exemption on the home in which they were living in on Jan. 1, 1988, and those who became 65 or who became disabled during 1987 must apply this year to receive the exemption for 1988

Texas law provides several types ceiling.

of homestead exemptions for Farmers and ranchers may also homeowners, including two for be able to lower their tax bills, of-

those 65 or older, or those who are disabled.

disabled.

Homeowners who reached the age of 65 or older on or before Jan. 1, 1988 may apply for a special property tax "ceiling" for school district taxes.

While the market value of an elderly person's homestead may fluctuate with the market, the taxes due to the school district cannot increase. The ceiling is rescinded, however, if the owner adds an improvement other than normal maintenance or repair.

adds an improvement other than normal maintenance or repair.

New legislation provides an additional tax benefit to certain homeowners. If the surviving spouse of an over 65 homeowner is at least 55 at the time of the older spouse's death, and the death occurred after Jan. 1, 1988, then he or she can retain the tax ceiling.

ficials said. If their land qualifies for productivity valuation, commonly known as an agricultural exemption, the land will be taxed on its ability to produce rather than its market value. Agriculture exemption applications must also be filed by Monday. New agricultural applications must be filed if land has been either bought or sold during the tax year.

Veterans with a service connected disability can receive
property tax relief in 1988 by fill-

ing out an exemption application.

A veteran's application can claim the exemption on only one piece of property, such as a home,

The applicant must be a Texas resident in order to qualify, and must file the exemption application by Monday.

Property owners are reminded that they may be required to file exemption forms in more than one county if they own property under the jurisdiction of separate appraisal districts.





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Beef Checkoff goes for the gold

Like a fleet Olympic runner, the beef checkoff came out of the blocks full steam on Oct. 1, 1986. blocks full steam on Oct. 1, 1986. That was the date the nation's producers began contributing \$1 per head for research, promotion and education about beef.

Now the beef checkoff is entering the stretch run of its 22-month trial period as cattlemen ready for the May 10 vote on whether to approve it permanently.

prove it permanently

However, unlike that Olympian whose energy is spent as the finish line comes in sight, the beef checkoff's momentum becomes stronger as the referendum date stronger as the referendum date comes closer. Ongoing programs on national, state and local levels continue to encourage increased beef consumption. All these pro-grams are coming together to im-prove the profit potential of cattle production.

"Studies reveal that the number of Americans who believe beef fits

into their lifestyle increased from 59 percent in January to 64 percent in June," said Barbara Bayer of Muenster, Texas, chairman of the Cooke County Steering Committee. "Those who believe beef is an important part of a well-balanced diet increased from 51 percent to 56 percent. These increases show that every dollar checked off by cattlemen in this program is an investment that pays dividends."

In the first year of the pro-

pays dividends."

In the first year of the programs, checkoff dollars collected nationwide totaled about \$73 million. About \$5 million of this

million, About \$5 million of this amount came from beef and cattle importers. In Texas, checkoff dollars totaled \$12.6 million.

"The checkoff is structured so that all producers invest an equal amount for each animal sold in the program," said Bayer. "Importers and all producers participate. The law sets a 5-percent

needs within our state. The remaining 50 cents goes to the Beef Board for national programs.''
Major programs on both national and state levels resulting from checkoff dollars include:

from checkoff dollars include:

- Announcement of a working relationship to promote "heart healthy" diets between the American Heart Association, Texas Affiliate and the Texas Beef Industry Council.

- Cooperating with health professionals to produce brochures on the nutrition of red meat (distributed to 4.5 million supermarket shoppers), cholesterol and heart disease, and the truth about

common misconceptions of beef.

Getting the word out to the media that beef is back. More than 4,700 positive articles reaching approximately 371 million consumers have recently run in major prestigious publications.

Providing secondary and elementary school teachers with lesson plans, films, software and multi-media packages for the classroom. Through these tools, educators can instruct millions of students on beef's proper role in students on beef's proper role in

the diet.
Airing more than 500 television spots and 1,920 radio spots about beef. For instance, during the Winter Olympics coverage on ABC, beef checkoff dollars sponsored 19 commercials, one Olympic Diary, and one Olympic Moment. Overall, the beef ads have reached 94 million adults between the ages of 25 to 54.



By 1983, following months of intensive promotion, extensive improvements, new activities, entertainment, crowd accomodations and encouraging response to the German Fun Run, the crowd grew to 55,000.

Each year, entertainment and culinary delights aimed at emphasizing the ethnic German heritage and culture. The Fun Run became recognized as the second biggest in the state. Growth of Germanfest was phenomenal. Food consumption gained and quantities became almost repetitious, except that amounts always grew.

With the intention of fostering a more ethnic atmosphere into the festival, sponsors looked back into the original German Week in the Bicentennial Year of 1976, therefore keeping a better control on the nature of entertainment presented and kinds of

souvenirs becoming available.
Food, whether traditional, ethnic or contemporary, was always bountiful. Guests had ample reason to feel well-fed, delightfully entertained and royally treated. Germanfest bloomed, reflecting

In 1987, the Bike Rally grew to 2145 riders from the initial 119 riders in 1982. Entertainment was almost non-stop and hospitality was genuine. Total attendance was 46,627, down from 1986 but the Fun Run was up. Praise was heaped on Germanfest 1987. The

The subcommittee will study charges made at a recent hearing of the House Committee on Retirement and Aging that certain television advertisements of life insurance and Medicare supplement insurance are intentionally misleading.

"Our main concern is to protect."

'Our main concern is to protect the interests of Older Texans since they spend more on health care than people under 65. If these aggressive marketing practices are deceptive and illegally victimize our senior citizens, we will make strong recommendations that ap-

propriate protective legislation be passed," said Rep. Finnell.

Rep. Finnell noted that "celebrity endorsements," misleading information about Medicare benefits and other possibly unsergupulse processibly.

Medicare benefits and other possibly unscrupulous practices would be examined by the subcommittee.

"I find it unacceptable for insurance advertising to play on the fears and insecurities of retirees and people over 65. Those who resort to scare tactics and misleading solicitations must be held responsible for their actions," said Rep. Finnell, founding chairman of the House Committee on Retirement and Aging.

Crop Acreage Reports We are taking crop acreage reports with the computer this

We are also going to do this by appointment for our larger farms. If you have three farms or more, you should contact this office immediately, so that we can schedule a time for you to come in.

For the remainder of farmers, May 2 is the final date to report wheat, oats, barley, also ACR and CU, if you are participating in the program on these crops. If we are unable to take your crop report program on these crops. If we are unable to take your crop report due to heavy workload and lack of time, we also schedule you an appointment. We are trying this method for the first time and we are hoping it will benefit all of us. You should report your crop acreage even if you are not participating in the program. If you do not report your crops, this will result in the acreage and yield being considered zero.

Wheat, Feed Grain and Cotton Programs
Remember, to have a valid contract to participate in these programs, all landlord and other producer signatures must be in this office by April 29.

Provisions for Conservation Use

Acreage (CU) and ACR (layout, set aside)

ACR and CU acres may be grazed or hayed except during the five-month non-grazing-haying five-month non-grazing-haying period from June 1 through Oct. 31.

Producers who have failed small grains due to a natural disaster should not destroy this acreage without first filing an

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

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
