

Jim Derington has been trying for a picture of the Park bobcat that probably dens east of the office on Horse Creek. Last week he added this picture to his collection of animal pictures. This is another of our elusive animals that I would like to

Remember Saturday, Feb. 3 cold, crisp, and sunny, but no wind? Jim chose that day to hike in Horse Creek Canyon looking for the bobcat den. He didn't find it, but he did find a porcupine in the entrance of a den. Females like this type of den as their maternity ward. I did find that porcupines mate in October but found nothing on their gestation period. The porcupine babies are very large in relation to the size of the mother. As their quills are a half inch long at birth, they are born in a heavy membranous sac so they don't injure the mother.

The cold weather froze most of the Lake, but the geese were able to maintain an area where they were really concentrated. The bald eagles

were reduced to eating goose instead of fish. Jim said they would pull out a goose from the flock and eat it on the ice close to the other birds. Tracks showed other animals, hungry for a fat goose dinner, working out on the ice in hopes of snagging a goose before they fell through

Museum Musings

reading the fiction book, Lady of No Man's Land, by Jeanne Williams. It takes place in 1884. It brings to life so much about the early Texas Panhandle. In this book Mrs. Williams mentions that the main character, Kirsten, meets Jim Cator and even stays at Fort Zulu one night with a

Kirsten first meets Jim Cator at a Christmas party, at the home of some ranchers. He told her he was building stone house beside Fort Zulu, as he was going to be married to a girl from England; this house would be for her. His brother, Bob, had already moved to Oregon. The brothers had ended their partnership. Kirsten liked Jim's British

In the last year, the Hansford County Preservation Committee "Museum," has added a glass case, donated by Jim and Laquita Evans of Gordon's Drug, to Fort Zulu to hold memorabilia from the life of the Cator brothers. There are pictures of Jim and Bert Cator, another brother, some original correspondence they received, and a silver loving cup that Jim Cator received from the First National Bank of Spearman for his services as the organizer and supporter of the bank.

The Cator brothers, Jim and Bob, came to America in 1871. Their father was a sea captain, but he did not want his sons to follow in his footsteps as he felt it took too much time away from family. He did not want this to happen to them. When they first came to Hansford County, before it was an organized county, they killed buffalo and sold the hides to make a living. When buffalo hides went down in value, they bought cattle.

Walls happened in 1874, Jim and County in her paintings. She Rob Cator were hunting buffalo. painted a picture of the original Fort

> The Cator brothers built the Zulu Stockade about 1875. This was the first building constructed north of the Canadian River. It was built of cottonwood timbers and logs. It's original purpose was for a shelter to live in, but also a place to sell groceries and supplies to buffalo hunters and traders. In 1880 it became the first post office in the unorganized area. Bob Cator was the first postmaster. At this time, Rutherford B. Hayes was president.

> The winter of 1883 was very severe in the history of the Texas Panhandle. The Cators lost almost their whole herd in that blizzard. The next spring, Bob, who was very discouraged, divided what was left of the cattle with Jim and moved to

> In 1879, Bert Cator and his sister, Clara, followed the older brothers to America. At first, Bert Cator caught, broke, and sold wild mustangs. He sold these to families of the area who needed riding horses.

In 1882, Les Cator came to America. He used his trade as a blacksmith in Dodge City, Kansas, but moved to Hansford in 1890.

The Cator brothers were quite an asset to Hansford County. Jim Cator helped organize Hansford County in 1889. He was elected first County Judge. He was sheriff from 1890 to 1892. Jim organized the first bank in Hansford county. Bert Cator was sheriff two different terms, 1893 to 1894 and 1901 to 1907. Les Cator was Judge of Hansford County from 1899 to 1900. He was also a member of the first jury of the Hansford County Court.

Gwenfred Lackey preserved When the Battle of Adobe several old buildings of Hansford

Zulu and the stone house that Jim Cator built for his bride. Joyce Johnson, of the Hansford Historical Committee, has also preserved Fort Zulu in a painting she did. These paintings are on display at the Fort Zulu Museum.

The Fort Zulu Museum at 28 S. Townsend has been constructed as a replica of the first Fort Zulu. It is as near a copy as could be built to withstand the elements. You are welcome to go by to see any of the Cator memorabilia that we have.

Marshall Cator, son of Bert Cator, has been a generous contributer to the Museum. We certainly appreciate all he has done to preserve the Cator history for Hansford County. He and Mary Cator Gardner, a descendent of Les Cator, toured the Museum when we had the opening of the Palo Duro School.

As I researched A Search for Opportunity. by Dotty Jones, Hansford County Volume I, and Hansford County Volume II, where most of this information came from, I realized there are many Cator descendents still living in Hansford County. I did call Gwen McLain, a descendent of Les Cator and talk to her. What an honor to know how your forefathers participated in settling this land!




than to beat Panhandle, but they don't want to settle for second place in district 1-AA in order to play the Pantherettes.






