Hounds, Lynx Open At Home

The Spearman and Gruver gridiron elevens will both open with a home game this Friday night, September 6, each against a storied team of playoff vets, coming on the heels of a playoff 1995 year.

Last year, Spearman opened at Panhandle and came away with a hard fought 3 point victory. This year the Panthers will open the season in Lynx Stadium, bent on revenge. Panhandle went on last year to make the playoffs from district 2-AA, though they were beaten by three 1-AA squads, Gruver, Spearman and Stratford. Panhandle is again picked to make the playoffs this year, but tough Spearman isn't, the Lynx may be the higher ranked club, because they play in tough 1-AA.

Panhandle held a long skein of successive playoff appearances in the late 70s-80's, under Stocky Lamberson, and they certainly have a colorful, if not also tragic, lore.

Gruver opens against another AA team, like the Lynx and the Panthers, - a team that dealt the Hounds their worst football defeat in history. That was in 1971, 74-0, and that won't be the score this year. Canadian's Wildcats are coached by a former Hounds coach, David Flowers, and this is the first time the two teams have met since 1983, 13 years ago, a 28-7 Gruver loss. Look for the Hounds to come out Sky-High against this AA bunch, as the Hounds will be wanting to prove themselves in the pollsters eyes. Canadian was district champion in district 2-AA last year, and they are looking for big things. The games will be 8:00 starts, and you can read the exciting action in next week's Reporter-Statesman.

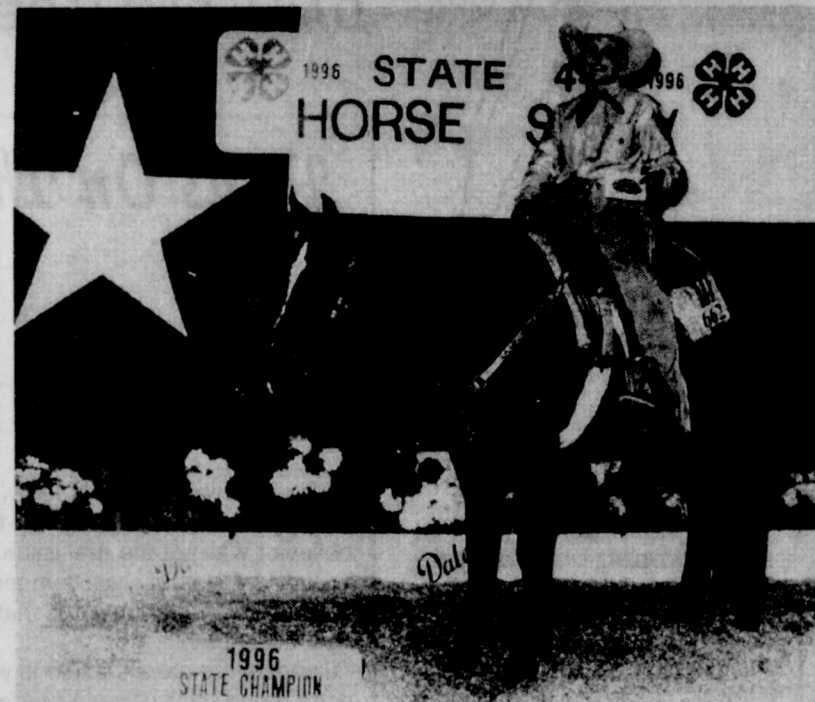


Tom Kirk and Blake Beedy rush to assist Clint Goodman as he prepares to break-up a pass play at the Highland Park scrimmage last Friday night.

Hansford County Does Well At State Horse Show



Travis Brown, representing Hansford County, won the State Western Pleasure Class at the State Horse Show held in Abilene, July 21-27.

Hansford County was well represented at the recent State Horse Show held in Abilene, July 21-27. This show is broken into two parts, the qualifying portion and the invitational. In order to compete in the qualifying show, the entrants first of all had to have been in the top twenty-five of their individual District Horse Show that was held earlier in the summer.

From the thirteen Districts in Texas, there were close to 400 entrants in the qualifying show with each class having 80-90 entries. Representing Hansford County, Travis Brown won the State Western Pleasure Class. In the Showmanship at Halter class, Travis placed sixth and Ashley Brown was twelfth.

Another aspect of the show is the futurity classes where the youth are solely responsible for the training of their horse. The two-year Pleasure futurity had three separate goes with three different judges. Ashley Brown placed sixth and eighth in this event. Along with the judged events, there are several working cattle events. In the Team Penning Event, Travis Brown, and Tracy Brown both of Spearman and Joe Pluchar from Canyon made up a team. The boys had two goes to try to pen their calves, but hope with more practice, will try it again next year.

With the help of Hansford County, District I was awarded the high point District of the Show.

Turner Commissioned As A Second Lieutenant



Chris Turner, of Spearman, was commissioned as a second lieutenant in the United States Army, Infantry on August 16, 1996. This commissioning coincided directly with his completion of the degree requirements necessary for a BBA in Management from Sam Houston State University in Huntsville, Texas.

In order to receive his commission, LT Turner was required to earn his bachelors degree and complete four years as a cadet in SHSU's Army ROTC program. While a cadet at

SHSU, Turner received numerous awards and participated in several activities to include 2 years involvement in the Ranger Challenge program, four year involvement in SHSU Schuder's Rangers (which he commanded in the fall of '95), and completion of the US Army Airborne School at Ft. Benning, Georgia. He completed 6 weeks Army ROTC Advanced Training at Ft. Lewis, Washington and served as an acting platoon leader in 3rd Armored Cavalry at Ft. Bliss, Texas as part of the Cadet Troop Leadership Training program in the summer of 1995. Turner also served as the Raven Battalion commander in the Spring of 1996, the highest rank and position achievable by a cadet at SHSU.

LT Turner's next step is to report to the Infantry Officer Basic Course at Ft. Benning, Georgia, followed by the US Army Ranger, Pathfinder, and Air Assault Schools. His first permanent duty station as a platoon leader will most likely be with the 82nd Airborne Division located at Ft. Bragg, North Carolina. Chris is a 1992 graduate of Spearman High and is the son of Loyall and Ginger Turner of Spearman.

How inadequate is this reply, from my point of view. The writer failed to recognize that the door-slaming behavior was not the real issue in this situation. To the contrary, the child was demonstrating his defiance of parental authority, and for that he should have been held accountable.

Instead, the parent is told to wait until the child is in a good mood (which could be next Thursday), and than talk about the dangers of door-slaming. It seems too clear that the child was begging his mom to accept his challenge, but she was in the other room counting to 10 and keeping cool. And let's all wish her lots of luck on the next encounter.

As I've stated, the great givers of parental advice have failed to offer a course of action to be applied in response to willful defiance. In the situation described above, for example, what is Mom supposed to do until Junior cools off? What if he calls her dirty names and whacks his little sister across the mouth? You see, the only tool given to Mom by the writer above is postponed reason. And as every mother knows, reason is practically worthless in response to anger and disrespect.

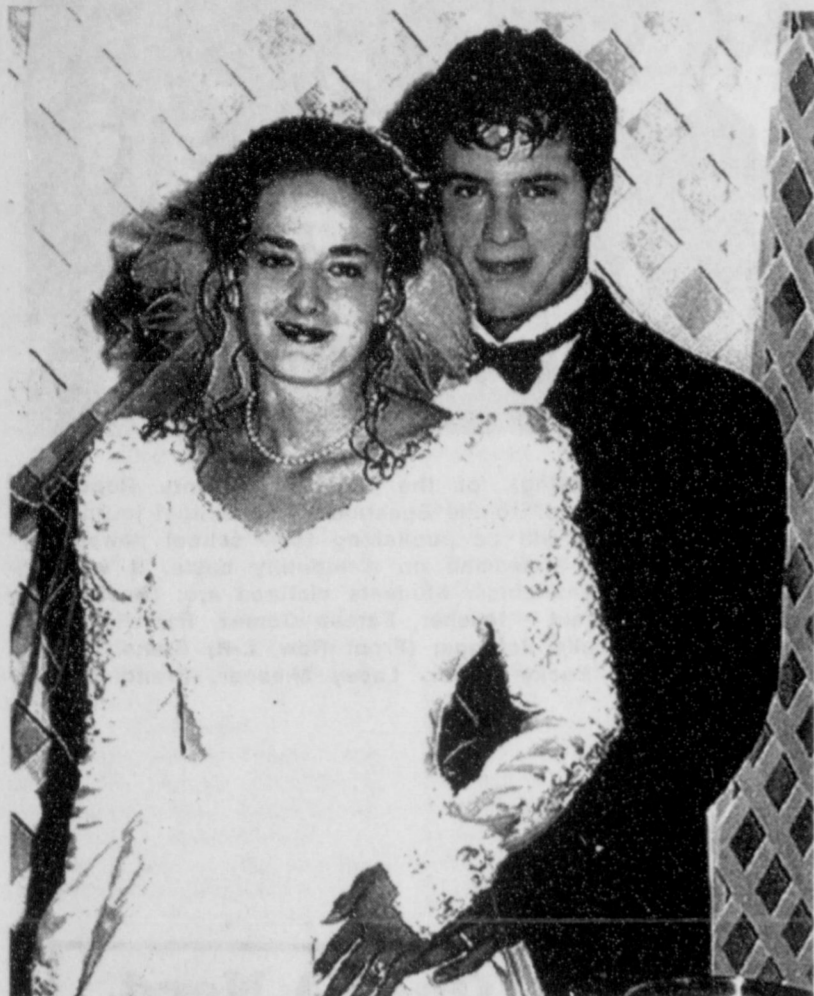

Sam's Corner

All of you who take the time to read SAM's Corner and look forward to it - please "bear" with me the next couple of weeks. I'm trying so very, very hard to cope and adjust, not only to having just sent my son back to the U.S. Marines in California, but also to being very sick and in a lot of pain. So, I started thinking about some of my childhood memories, and would like to share them. (I'll turn 49 on September 28th, so I've got a lot of "remembering" to think about!)

Anyway, here we go with my memories!

Awakening early on the farm to the smell of cured ham, cooking and coffee brewing. Walking through the stubble of the alfalfa patch to take water to the hired hay-bailers, and later to the cotton pickers and hoers.

Getting to go barefoot only when the first warm days of spring begin and getting to discard the awful long winter under suit (leggings). They were a necessity in the winter - the school bus would be so cold you could see your breath freeze (I was the first picked up in the morning!).

Cracking walnuts that fell from five huge walnut trees. Then picking the meat out to eat. Nothing was more delicious!

Eating watermelon under the same big walnut trees by the swing and getting sticky all under my chin and spitting the seeds out. Then later picking them up to keep and dry out so they could be replanted and grow again.

Making doll furniture out of anything and everything. Cutting out paper dolls and then cutting their clothes out from an old Sears & Roebuck catalog.

Wading barefooted in my grandpa's horse tank.

Making home-made ice cream in the cool water windmill room or cellar and getting to sit on the

padding crank-style ice cream bucket.

Sewing doll clothes from scraps Nannie saved me and dressing my cats up in doll clothes, then pushing them in my doll buggy.

Getting to play with another girl about once every 2 or 3 weeks until I started school.

We lived on a ranch way out in the boonies from Calarendon, so my pets were my best playmates. Mac was the closest friend I had. He lived on a ranch near ours, and we would see each other often and play, but Mac always got the better of me!

I experienced the heart wrenching pain of loss and grief when he was killed in a car wreck in high school. Mac was also Terry's best friend. (Terry would have been in the car also if he and his parents hadn't been going on vacation the next morning. If he had been I probably wouldn't have my Terry now! Two out of the five in the car were killed.)

Sitting on the fence during the milking process with a cup for warm milk. Gathering the eggs from under the hens at night; closing the chicken coop door; slopping the pigs.

Going for a ride with my wonderful Uncle Beatty Hillman and his girl, and not understanding why they always took me home early. (Now I know why!)

Dividing a nickel's worth of candy (the merchant always put in a lot more so I could share - I was the town's pet) with a visiting cousin or my two best friends (Chris McMurry - niece of The Larry McMurry, and Sandy Doyle - the vet's daughter). Getting double dip ice cream cones at the old soda fountain.

Hiding in Greta's (Sandy's pet Doberman) dog house all day and scaring the whole town! Taking dog vitamins her dad gave us because they were cheaper. (They seemed to work better!)

Getting patent leather shoes with red tops and tassels for Easter. (I always got a new pair of shoes, a dress and a hat at Easter.) New oxfords for school;

the smell of new leather; new school supplies.

Getting little colorful cards at Sunday School with Bible verses and pictures on them.

Hearing the long soulful whistle of the sleek "Silver Ziffer" (the long silver passenger train as it approached the old Clarendon depot). (I lost my hearing at the age of nine years old due to a reaction to a drug.)

Having my great uncle "Bubby" William Beatty visit with his wife, Aunt Dora, who he called Puss. (He drove the only Cadillac in Clarendon.) He would take me down to the barber shop and have my bangs cut by Frank, the old friendly, much loved, black barber. (My mom always fussed because my bangs were either uneven or too short.)

These are just a very few of the simple pleasures that thrilled me as a child.

I wonder if our young ones today react to such prosaic pastimes as playing with a ball, playing jacks, Nannie's wide, cool front porch, making mud pies, or playing in the rain? I still drool when I see all the beautiful doll furniture in stores, and am amazed even now at some of the intricate work or toys on display. Toys today leave little to the imagination. I wonder if today's children even have imaginations. I wonder if they are so thrilled with all the expensive high tech toys, VCR games, TV shoes, and locomotion, as we were with our

own inventions and imaginations. Somehow I think they are missing something very important. They are missing the important factor of not having to use their imaginations. What a waste!

To receive a store bought doll (Madame Alexander) or toy for Christmas. (I always knew where mama had hidden it!) This gave a thrill that today's children don't feel. To most of them everyday is Christmas. Oh, what they are missing. We lived for Christmas and Birthdays!

So, again I leave you in SAM's Corner, bringing back memories.

Remember with me and Smile, SAM
